A MESSAGE FROM the Mayor

As we near the close of another year it's clear that 2024 has continued, just as its predecessor did, to present significant challenges for our community. The impacts of the devastating monsoonal flooding earlier in the year still resonate throughout the Burke Shire. Full recovery will take years, and back-to-back flooding events have extended the amount of time it will take to fully restore our infrastructure, businesses, and communities. Queensland is one of the most disaster-prone states in Australia, with 66 of its 77 local councils activated for disaster assistance this last year. In response, it's crucial that we consistently and constantly continue to voice the need for betterment funding to enhance resilience for our communities at every available opportunity.

The state's recent change in government, potentially, brings new opportunities for local betterment projects, with fresh sets of eyes and ears on which to emphasise an increasing need to focus on (and fund) the resilience of each community's infrastructure. The focus must be on strengthening local communities and ensuring our infrastructure can withstand increasingly frequent and severe weather events. To this end, Burke Shire Council has made rebuilding our road infrastructure a top priority.

Below is an update on key recovery projects and progress to date.

The Council crew have been busy across the Burke Shire, focusing on the DRFA repair works to facilitate the ongoing delivery of the 2023 DRFA program. They have been working on Five Mile Rd, before moving onto Mellish Park Rd.

Package 4 – Burketown and Gregory Streets Restoration Contractor: Stabilised Pavements of Australia Pty Ltd Completion: 24 August 2024 Expenditure: \$3,093,653

Package 5 – Doomadgee Lawn Hill Rd Restoration Contractor: K & G Booth Pty Ltd Expected Completion: Scheduled for December 2024 Expenditure: \$1,613,804.26 (as at October 2024) Awarded Contract Value: \$2,841,391

Concurrent to road restoration works, there is a major focus on design works. In particular, design/s for the Floraville Road Restoration Works and the Burketown Airport Runway project. These are being progressed with Council's Engineering Consultants NorthLane and the Queensland Reconstruction Authority.

The main aim for the Truganini Crossing is to significantly decrease the period this crossing gets cutoff in the wet season and for the Airport Runway to become more robust and resilient in the face of inundation.

Tourism numbers have yet to recover from the multiple blows of successive floods and the ongoing damage to key tourism assets such as Boodjamulla National Park, Adel's Grove and the Riversleigh World Heritage Area and roads closed for extended periods.

Visitor numbers at the Visitor Information Centre from April to September of 2021 to 2024 highlight the effects of external factors and the reopening up of borders post Covid pandemic closures. In 2021 and 2022, numbers were notably influenced by increased domestic travel within regional Australia due to international travel restrictions, which drove more Australians to explore local destinations. Comparatively, recent numbers reflect the impact of flooding, and the lack of resilient infrastructure, on visitor turnout as follows:

Visitor Information Centre- numbers of visitors April to September:

- 2021 3,909 visitors
- 2022 3,342 visitors
- 2023 1,608 visitors
- 2024 1,755 visitors

Council adopted its 2024/2025 budget in late July. This was the first budget of the newly elected Council and was prepared at a time where there were ongoing significant economic challenges facing not only our Shire but the nation as a whole.



Key points include:

- Council worked hard to absorb inflationary costs whilst also maintaining existing services and keeping this year's rates rise as low as possible. Council continues to face the same inflationary challenges as everyone else, including, supply chain issues, accommodation and housing shortages and labour scarcity. Ongoing financial sustainability is a continued major challenge for smaller councils such as Burke Shire Council, which has a very limited rates base (12% of total council recurrent revenues for 2024/2025).
- Improving the Shires financial sustainability remains, as always, a major focus of Council and we continue to see the positive benefits of measures and controls implemented in previous years. For example, our level of funded depreciation has increased significantly, from 4% in 2021/22 to 41% in 2024/25, enabling us to allocate \$2.40 million in capital expenditure from depreciation.
- Council's rate increase for 2024/2025 was 3.6% for all ratepayers. This was in line with CPI and below the average rate increase across Councils' budgets Queensland wide. Pensioners will continue to receive a rate concession of 20% of the general rate and utility charges, excluding water consumption and Emergency Management Levy, to a maximum of \$500.00 per year.
- Council is continuing to advocate for increased grants from both Federal and State Government to ensure we can deliver the services and programs they are shifting onto our shoulders. A major positive impact on Councils future sustainability was the increase in our annual Federal Assistance Grant allocation which increased from \$6.54M to \$8.28M over the previous financial year (26.6 % increase).

With the Shire suffering isolation for an extended period, two Wet Seasons in a row, several Health and Wellbeing activities were initiated during the year, in response to the resulting individual, familial and communal stressors witnessed.

- \$31,850 in grant funding was received for sports • equipment for the Burketown Gym. Our gym is the envy of many smaller communities. Its Burketown community estimated to have utilised it approximately 2,000 times this year. A number of boot camps and other group fitness activities The Local Disaster Management Group remains were held in Burketown and Gregory.
- Council released the tender for the Burketown Health and Wellbeing Precinct Stage 1-Splash Park and Playground-this project has a value of \$4.552 mill. Council continues to seek funding for this project to proceed.

- A Mental Health First Aid Public Workshop facilitated by RFDS was held in early November.

Council continues to roll out its Housing Strategy which to date has been very successful and seen the sale of I wish you and your families all the best for the festive six houses to staff raising \$325,000 to 30 June 2024. This strategy creates a powerful platform for local personal, communal, and economic empowerment whilst also contributing to the growth of the rating base. Council has also been selling residential blocks Mayor Ernest Camp

in Gregory, generating \$325,000 in sales revenue to date. Funds from the sales are earmarked for the construction of a new depot at Gregory, strategically located near the Water Treatment Plant.

Due to the large fuel load, as a result of the big Wet seasons, our Shire (and indeed much of the North West) has been hit by massive bushfire events. I acknowledge and thank those Rural Fire fighters, stations, road contractors and volunteers who worked mightily hard to control the blazes and protect homes, stock, wildlife and assets in challenging conditions.

Finally, I remind all residents that the wet season is not far away. The Local Disaster Management Group will soon meet to prepare for the wet season. By the time this newsletter is published a "Get Ready" public event will have been held in Burketown and Gregory. While information about preparedness for an emergency event and how to ensure households are prepared for the upcoming wet season will be shared at those events, information will also be available on Council's website. 

Burketown Wharf Recreational Ground Project Update -**Exciting Progress!**

We're pleased to share new updates on the Burketown Wharf Recreational Ground Project. Significant progress is being made each week, and we are on track to deliver this exciting new space for our community by Christmas, weather permitting. Here's the latest on what's happening on-site:

Shade Structure Installation Underway

The footings for the shade structure have been poured, setting a solid foundation for the structure. Additionally, the shade structure kit has now arrived in Burketown, and installation is in full swing. We anticipate the structure will be fully installed by 20 November, ready to provide shelter and a welcoming area for gatherings.



The design of the toilet block has been finalised. Footings for the toilet block are expected to be poured by the end of November, ensuring they are set in time for the arrival of the toilet block kit. scheduled for late November. With these elements in place, we're confident the toilet block will be ready soon, aligning with the project's timeline.

On Track for Christmas Completion

The entire project remains on schedule for completion before Christmas, bringing Burketown a fantastic recreational area for residents and visitors alike. We're excited to see the final touches come together and provide a beautiful, functional space that our community can enjoy.

Burketown Airport Road Upgrade Project Update

The Burketown Airport Road Upgrade Project is engineering but also the comprehensive construction advancing steadily in enhancing flood resilience and road safety for this essential link between Burketown Airport and the township. Seasonal flooding, especially due to the nearby Albert River, has historically impacted access to the airport. Recognising the need for reliable access during flood events, Burke Shire Council developed a robust design solution to elevate road immunity against floodwaters.

Flood Impact Assessment Findings

A recent flood impact assessment evaluated the proposed upgrades for their effects on local flood behaviour. The assessment confirmed that raising the road and upgrading the culverts improves flood resilience during the 1% and 10% Annual Exceedance Probability (AEP) events, with no adverse impacts on the Wills Developmental Road. However, minor permanent ponding may occur upstream due to the design, which channels most floodwater through Lagoon Creek.

Project Scope and Objectives

The scope of work for the Burketown Airport Road Upgrade Project includes not only design and of reinforced concrete box culverts at two critical locations along Airport Drive, specifically at Chainages 140m and 350m. These upgrades will reduce flood impact, prevent seasonal disruptions, and improve road longevity.

The main construction activities, in addition to geotechnical and flood modelling completed during the design phase, are as follows:

- Airport Drive Chainage 140m
 - » Installation of new culverts (supplied separately) with inlet and outlet protection.
 - » Reshaping creek batters and adding protective measures for erosion control.
 - » Pavement construction, including provisional layers of "special embankment" material as required, and installation of road furniture.
- Airport Drive Chainage 350m
- » Similar culvert installation with protective inlet and outlet works.
- Additional batter reshaping and protection.
- Pavement construction, including provisional embankment material and installation of road furniture.

A critical component of the construction is developing and implementing a traffic management plan, ensuring safe access throughout the project with sidetracks at each worksite.

The new road is shifted by approximately 1m to the west, due to lifting the road height and battering on the opposite side of the powerlines. As part of culvert replacement works, the existing road on the culvert approaches is diverted to connect to the new alignment on top of the culvert. The road will be straightened as part of the final stages of the road upgrade works, when funding becomes available and after Airport Runway Upgrade works completion.

Current Progress

With both culvert installations complete, the project is advancing to finalise the remaining works, including rock beaching, batter protection, and creek reshaping. Completion of these tasks will enhance the road's resilience and provide reliable airport access, particularly during flood events.

Gregory Amenity Block Upgrade



We're excited to share the latest on the Gregory Amenity Block Upgrade Project, which is almost completed and set to offer an improved facility for residents and visitors alike. This project involved replacing the old toilet block, with a block including two shower units, enhancing comfort and accessibility for all.

Project Scope

The upgraded amenity block includes two units, one dedicated female and one dedicated male toilet and shower unit. Additionally, the old toilet block was successfully sold, contributing to the community's sustainability efforts.

Project Progress

The new amenity block is now complete, with only the final labeling for male and female units remaining. While the facility is ready and available for use if needed, Council plans to officially open it for public use after the wet season. This approach aims to keep maintenance and cleaning costs minimal, especially given that another shower unit is located adjacent to this block and can serve the community's needs in the interim.

The new amenity block is designed to enhance convenience and ensure accessibility for all, providing a fresh and welcoming facility for the Gregory area.

Burketown Revitalisation Project: Progress Continues!

We're excited to bring you the latest updates on the Burketown Revitalisation Project. As our team works hard to bring new vibrancy and essential improvements to our beloved town, we're pleased to share some recent milestones and upcoming steps.

Construction Funding Application Submitted

A key part of making this project a reality is securing construction funding. We're pleased to announce that the funding application has been submitted and is currently under review. We remain optimistic about receiving the necessary support to move forward with construction in the near future.

Final Drawings in Progress

Our engineers and planners are working diligently to finalise the detailed drawings for the revitalisation project. These drawings are the blueprint for the changes and improvements that are planned, and


this step brings us one step closer to construction.

Electrical Design Expected in December

In line with our project timeline, the electrical design is progressing well and is expected to be completed by December. This will ensure that all electrical aspects are in place to support our revitalisation efforts, including new lighting and power solutions for enhanced safety and functionality.

Approved Concept for Hospital Road Intersection

The draft concept for the Hospital Road intersection, shown in the image below, has been reviewed and approved for detailed design. This new design aims to improve sight distance and intersection safety by realigning the intersection to a 90-degree angle, creating a compliant T-intersection. These changes will ensure a safer, more efficient flow of traffic and enhance pedestrian safety.



Truganini Road Culvert Replacement Project Update

The Truganini Road Culvert Replacement Project is nearing completion, addressing a critical access route to the Albert River Wharf and boat ramp, which traverses low-lying tidal flats at Beacon Pile Gully. The Level 2 Bridge Inspection report identified severe deterioration of the existing culverts and reinforced the urgency of replacement of the compromised culvert structures with concrete box culverts.

The project scope includes installing new 1800x1200x2400mm reinforced concrete box culverts. Given the importance of maintaining access during construction, tenderers were tasked with proposing traffic management solutions with preference on the option of installation of an elevated platform to limit road closures, ensuring minimal disturbance to the ground, and minimal disruption for users accessing the Albert River Wharf.

The primary culvert replacement work is now complete, with only batter protection remaining. Additionally, replacement of the adjacent causeway is underway and anticipated to finish by 20 November. These enhancements will ensure a safer, more resilient structure for road users, preserving access to this vital community resource.

Floraville Road Reconstruction Project Update

Progress on the Floraville Road Reconstruction Project has been strong, with substantial sections completed since roadworks began on 23 September. This project focuses on restoring the first six kilometers from the Shire boundary westward, part of ongoing efforts to improve Burke Shire's road network.

To date, the first and third kilometer sections have been completed and sealed, while pavement placement for the fourth and sixth kilometres is nearing completion. Work on the second and fifth kilometres is also underway, with the entire project anticipated to wrap up by mid-December, weather permitting. Traffic management measures remain in place, and we thank the community for their continued patience and support as we work to improve our region's infrastructure.

Creative Workshops Bring the Shire Together






First Aid Training Brings Lifesaving Skills to Burketown

GET COOKING

Ingredients

- 150g Jasmine rice (¾ cup; or alternative rice)
- 1 cup water
- 1 Lebanese cucumber
- Coriander
- 2 Garlic cloves
- 2 Chicken breast fillets
- 10g Sri Lankan curry powder (2tbs; or alternative curry powder on hand)
- 90g mango chutney (4-5 tbs)
- 2 tsp white vinegar •
- 1tsp sugar ٠
- 1 tbs oil
- 2 tbs mayonnaise

Method

Step 1 - Cook rice


Rinse the rice until the water runs clear. Put in a small saucepan with 250ml (1 cup) water, cover and bring to a simmer over medium heat. Reduce the heat to low and cook for 12 mins or until tender and the water is absorbed. Turn off the heat and stand. covered, for at least 5 mins. Fluff the rice with a fork.

Step 2 - Pickle cucumber

Meanwhile, thinly slice half the cucumber on an angle. Coarsely grate the remaining cucumber. Pick the coriander leaves and finely chop the stems. Combine 2 tsp white vinegar and 1 tsp sugar in a large bowl and season with salt. Add the sliced cucumber and coriander stems and toss to combine. Set aside to pickle, tossing occasionally, until needed.

Step 3 - Marinate chicken

Crush 2 garlic cloves. Put the chicken flat on a board, put your hand on top and halve horizontally into fillets. Combine the curry powder, half the garlic and 1 tbs vegetable oil in a large bowl and season with

salt and pepper. Add the chicken and turn to coat. Combine the mango chutney and 2 tsp water in a separate bowl and season with salt and pepper.

Step 4 - Cook chicken

Heat a medium frypan over medium-high heat. Cook the chicken, turning regularly, for 3-7 mins until browned and just cooked through. Add the chutney mixture and cook, turning, for 1 min or until the chicken is glazed. Remove from the heat. While the chicken is cooking, combine the grated cucumber, remaining garlic and 2 tbs mayonnaise in a bowl. Season with salt and pepper.

Step 5 - Serve Up

Thickly slice the chicken. Drain the cucumber, reserving the pickling liquid. Add the coriander leaves to the cucumber and stir to combine. Divide the rice, chicken and cucumber salad among plates. Top with the mayo mixture and drizzle with the reserved pickling liquid. Enjoy!

Step 6 - Make it yours

Feel free to add salad goodies from your veggie drawer to the cucumber salad, such as mint, carrot, avocado or tomato.
