With such a small workforce under immense pressure exacerbated by ever worsening flooding conditions, it was an amazing effort. Thanks must also go to all those outside Council and the LDMG who helped to rescue, evacuate, take care of pets left behind by those who evacuated, clean up and assist those who returned to re-enter their homes. Your generosity, compassion and willingness to step forward in a time of duress is to be commended and highlights to me why this is a great Shire - it's filled with great people doing great things for each other and the community. On behalf of Council and all of whom were assisted, including my family and myself, I offer my heartfelt thanks and gratitude.

Cr Clarke, CEO Dan McKinlay and myself, accompanied by Doomadgee CEO Troy Frazer travelled to Canberra at the earliest possible opportunity post flood and Burke also travelled to Brisbane at a later date (with Cr Murray travelling as part of our delegation this time) to advocate fiercely for Federal (and State) support to redress the circumstances we have found ourselves in post flood including, but not limited to, the need to improve core infrastructure such as roads, energy and communications.

#### **Temporary Housing for Flood-Affected Residents**

In the wake of the recent floods that have significantly impacted homes in Burke Shire, an initiative has been put in place to ensure that those facing displacement find some sense of comfort and support during these challenging times.

Residents whose homes suffered substantial damage and are unable to return have been offered a lifeline through temporary accommodation. This initiative recognises the immediate need for shelter for those grappling with the aftermath of the floods.

In a response to the housing crisis, caravans were deployed in late July, followed by the construction of cyclone-rated portable dongas on-site. This initiative extends its support to residents in Burketown and rural properties, ensuring a secure place to call home until early 2024. Local contractors within the shire played a crucial role in expediting donga installations.

The Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA) has been instrumental in funding this vital initiative through the Counter Disaster Operations (CDO) Funding stream.

As residents rebuild their lives, this gesture provides a stable foundation for facing the challenges ahead.





#### **Health and Wellbeing Precinct: Shaping a Vibrant Future**

In the heart of Burketown, an ambitious project is underway to enhance our community's health and recreational facilities—the Burketown Health and Wellbeing Precinct. This proposed development, situated southwest of the Council Administration Office on the corner of Burke St and Sloman St, aims to elevate the quality, safety, and accessibility of our recreational spaces.

Council, in collaboration with a Consultant Designer, has crafted a master plan that envisions a transformed recreational hub. The existing site features a sports court (basketball/tennis) and a gym. To add more diverse recreational opportunities, the master plan





introduces exciting additions, including a 6-lane 25-metre swimming pool and a vibrant Splash Park.

The Burketown State School played host to an engaging community consultation event on February 14, 2023, where the future of the Health Precinct's water park was shaped by none other than the children themselves.

Council representatives, Kimberly Chan, Jenny Harders, and Shannon Moren, met with the children to discuss the theme and colour scheme for the water park. The children, buzzing with creativity, generated four exciting themes: barramundi, crocodiles, turtles, and dinosaurs. Dividing into groups, they further developed their ideas, crafting imaginative drawings that captured their vision.


Names for the water park were also proposed, ranging from the adventurous "Burketown Wildest Water Park" to the playful "Wet & Wilder." The children's enthusiasm and creativity during the consultation were truly inspiring.

While the design is in its early stages, the Health Precinct promises to transform Burketown into a standout destination in the Gulf. The envisioned facilities, including the Splash Park, Playground, Shade Structure, Security Lighting, and Plant Room, aim to create a dynamic community space.

Council is actively seeking external funds for Stage 1, focusing on the construction of the Splash Park & Playground. Additionally, plans are underway to engage qualified contractors for the Design and Construction (D&C) of Stage 1. This crucial phase will set the groundwork for a community facility that aligns with our collective vision for a healthier and more vibrant Burketown.

As we look forward to the unfolding chapters of this exciting project, stay tuned for updates on the transformation of Burketown's Health and Wellbeing Precinct. Together, we are shaping a brighter and healthier future for our community.

SELECTED HEALTH AND WELLBEING PRECINCT SITE AND MASTER PLAN DEPICTING STAGE 1 AND STAGE 2

#### **Culvert Upgrade Completed at Doomadgee East Road**

At Doomadgee East Road, Culvert 15A underwent a transformative upgrade to bolster stormwater drainage. The project included the construction of a reinforced concrete box culvert and elevating the road level for improved resilience. With a total investment of \$870,000, encompassing the culvert and 112 metres of raised road pavement, funding from DTMR ATSI TIDS (2022/23 and 2023/24) was instrumental. We're pleased to announce that the project has reached practical completion, achieving a 100% success rate in fortifying our infrastructure.

#### **Connectivity Boost for Burketown and Normanton**

Great news for Burketown and Normanton communities! The Burketown and Normanton-Kennedy project is set to deploy 226 km of fibre optic cable, creating a vital link between these Northwest Queensland areas. This initiative aims to establish a fibre loop encompassing Northwest Queensland, providing additional network redundancy to 780,000 residents across 15 Local Government Areas.

The project's main goal is to ensure reliable communication for 66 percent of Queensland by offering multiple paths for connectivity. This redundancy is crucial for maintaining uninterrupted communication among communities, businesses, and emergency services, ensuring connectivity even during disruptions.

Beyond improved connectivity, the introduction of fibre optic infrastructure is poised to stimulate economic growth. Businesses, especially those reliant on data communication, will benefit from faster, more reliable internet connections. This development could lead to the emergence of new industries, increased investment and job opportunities in the region.

Enhancing network resiliency, the project plays a vital role in disaster preparedness. In the face of natural disasters like cyclones or floods, a resilient communication network becomes a lifeline. The deployment of fibre optic cable is a significant step forward in strengthening the region's ability to respond and recover from such events, supporting emergency services and relief organisations.

In summary, the Burketown and Normanton-Kennedy project is a substantial development for the serviced communities. With fibre optic deployment and supporting infrastructure, the initiative provides additional network redundancy and resilience to a significant portion of Queensland. This will benefit numerous Queenslanders, improving connectivity, fostering economic growth, and enhancing disaster preparedness in the region. We eagerly anticipate the positive impact this project will have on Burketown, Normanton, and the surrounding areas. The build for this fibre backhaul line is estimated to commence in April 2024. Stay tuned for further updates!

#### **Clean Sweep Complete!**

Thanks to the assistance of Doomadgee Aboriginal Shire Council and their new street sweeper, our urban area's kerbs and channels have received a thorough cleaning. This ensures optimal drainage flow, especially during rainy days. A big thank you to Doomadgee for their invaluable support! The operators from Doomadgee will use this experience as further training on the new equipment.



### **PROJECTS UPDATE**

#### Revitalising the Albert River: Wharf Precinct Update

Exciting transformations are on the horizon as we embark on the creation of a vibrant community space along the scenic banks of the Albert River. The \$1.3 million project, a collaborative venture funded by Council, Works for Queensland (W4Q), and the Mental Health Package, is poised to bring a refreshing change to the area.





Stage 1, encompassing picnic shelters, an amenity block, landscaping, lighting, surface treatments, a car park, and potentially a playground with a shade structure, has progressed to the tendering phase after completing detailed design work. Anticipated to commence post-wet season, the project is slated for completion in two to three months. Pictured are indicative views of the Wharf Precinct, Stage 1.

#### Completion of Burketown Aerodrome Fence Relocation

Ensuring the safety of our skies, the Burketown Aerodrome Fence Relocation project is now successfully concluded. With a focus on enhancing safety measures, the initiative involved the removal of 81 metres of the old fence, making way for the construction of a robust 91-metre section at the northeast end of the runway. Jointly funded by the Remote Airstrip Upgrade Program (RAUP) Round 9 and Council, the project reached a 100% completion milestone, contributing to a total cost of \$151,000. This marks a significant step toward fortifying safety protocols at the Burketown Aerodrome.

#### **Empowering Efficiency: Automation Upgrade for Water Systems**

In a significant stride toward modernization, Council is embarking on a transformative project to automate its Water and Wastewater systems. This comprehensive initiative involves upgrading the water intake points in Burketown and Gregory, along with a full-scale enhancement of the Gregory and Burketown Water Treatment Plants.

The primary objective of the project is to establish a cutting-edge system that allows for remote monitoring and operation of the Council's Water and Wastewater facilities. This shift toward automation promises heightened operational efficiency, minimises potential disruptions, and ensures prompt alerts in case of faults or issues within the system.

The upgrades at the intake points and Water Treatment Plants' mark a crucial step toward a more sustainable water supply for the community. The revamped system introduces constant automated water quality monitoring, facilitating early detection and swift rectification of any defects or issues.

This ambitious project is part of a holistic approach, coupled with two additional endeavours—the Water Source Inflow Upgrade (Gregory & Burketown) and SCADA Upgrade Projects. The combined budget for these three projects is set at \$2.6 million.

To bring this vision to fruition, a Design and Construct (D&C) Contractor has been engaged. The contractor has already completed the design phase of the Burketown Water Treatment Plant upgrade, upgraded water intake points and pumps, and enhanced the Gregory Water Treatment Plant, with the exception of the raw water storage system.

With a planned completion timeline within this financial year, Council is committed to ushering in a new era of efficiency and reliability in its Water and Wastewater infrastructure.



#### **Line Marking Transform Streets and Gregory Airstrip**

In a visual transformation, fresh lines now grace the streets of Gregory and Burketown, adding both clarity and vibrancy to the community. Completed in November, this project has defined parking and refuelling bays outside the Gregory Downs Hotel and brought renewed visibility and safety to Burketown's give-way intersections. The vibrant centerline on Musgrave Street and the crisp, white lines defining wharf parking bays contribute to a more organised and visually appealing streetscape. This comprehensive line marking initiative enhances both aesthetics and safety on Burke Shire roads.

The safety and efficiency of aerial operations at Gregory Airstrip also received a significant boost through a successful line-marking makeover. Completed as part of a comprehensive repainting initiative, the project addressed badly faded line markings, ensuring optimal visibility—especially critical during Royal Flying Doctors (RFDS) landings. Meticulously marked runways and aprons represent a renewed commitment to safety, marking a noteworthy milestone for Gregory Airstrip and ensuring the continued safety of RFDS operations in the region.



## Transformative Progress at Archie/Dinner Creek

Works on elevating Gregory Lawn Hill Road for rainy season accessibility and enhancing sight distance has progressed throughout the year. This \$5M initiative, funded through TIDS, R2R, PACP, and Council, progresses with significant advancements. The focus now shifts to concluding earthworks and pavement construction, bringing us closer to the targeted project completion date of mid-December 2023.

#### Burke Shire's Resilience and Progress: Budget Highlights

Our Shire, alongside the rest of Australia, endured severe impacts from massive monsoonal flooding in February/March 2023. The aftermath caused record-breaking damage, and a full recovery is expected to span several years.


Financial sustainability remains a challenge for smaller councils like Burke. Relying heavily on Federal and State grant funding, Council has embraced innovation and responsible fiscal management. Over the past three years, a focus on financial sustainability has yielded positive results, with funded depreciation rising from 4% in 2021/2022 to 40% in 2023/2024, totaling \$2,390,965 for capital expenditure.

Council's Federal Assistance Grant has also increased, from \$4.754 million in 2022/2023 to \$6.330 million in 2023/2024, contributing to future sustainability despite inflationary challenges, supply chain issues, and labour shortages.

The 3.5% rate increase in this year's budget, conservative compared to other Councils, ensures pensioners continue to receive a 20% rate concession. With a capital budget of \$22.785 million, including crucial road repairs post-flooding, Council aims to secure grant funding for 79.9% of these projects to maintain operational sustainability.

Key projects, such as the Health and Wellbeing Precinct and Children's Water Park in Burketown, align with Council's vision for a stronger, more resilient Shire. The Housing Strategy, divesting housing stock to staff, empowers the local economy and promotes communal sustainability.

In summary, this budget addresses the financial pressures faced by communities, aiming to build a more liveable, resilient, and accessible Shire.

#### **Reflecting on Lessons Learned: Burke Shire Local** Disaster Management Group Gears Up for the Wet Season


Shire Local Disaster Management Group (LDMG) monsoonal flood that struck the Shire in early March. times ahead.

## Thai Chicken Satay with Peanut Sauce

#### Marinade for chicken

- 500g chicken thighs cut into small pieces
- 1/4 can of coconut milk
- 1 tbsp curry powder
- 1 tsp white sugar
- 2 tsp red curry paste
- 1 tsp salt

Mix all ingredients in a bowl or plastic bag, add chicken and marinade for at least 1 hour or overnight.

Thread chicken onto skewers and cook on BBQ, grill or stove. Soak Skewers for 2 hours if cooking on BBQ.

#### Sate sauce

- 3/4 can of coconut milk (rest of opened can)
- 2 tbsp red curry paste
- 3/4 cup (180g) natural peanut butter
- 1/4 cup (50g) white sugar
- 2 tsp soy sauce (preferably dark soy)
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 tbsp cider vinegar (or plain white)
- 3/4 cup (185ml) water

Add all ingredients into a pan on medium heat. Stir ingredients together and simmer to form a thick sauce. Add water if the sauce is too thick.

#### **Pickled cucumber:**

Slice cucumber.

Mix together 1/4 cup rice wine vinegar and 2 tsp of white sugar.

Pour over cucumber and toss to coat.



#### To serve

Serve with jasmine rice cooked according to package instructions.

Optional extras:

- Fresh chilli
- Coriander
- Crushed roasted peanuts
