RANGER'S REVIEW



Bufo marinus

The cane toad (Bufo marinus) is not a declared pest in Queensland so there is no legal requirement to control them. The original consignment of cane toads arrived for Hawaii in 1935 and released into the cane fields of Queensland. It was hoped that the toad would control Frenchi and Greyback beetles, pests of economic importance to the sugar cane industry. By 1941 however, it had become evident that the cane toad was exerting only limited control over it's intended prey. This was because Greyback beetles are only rarely in contact with the ground and Frenchi beetles invade cane fields at a time when toads are absent due to the lack of protective cover.

The cane toad has a wide-ranging and indiscriminate diet, and it was not solely dependant upon it's intended prey. The unlimited food source, suitable environment and low rates of predation allowed dynamic reproduction and spread. Toads were recorded in Brisbane only 10 years after release. The cane toads advance is only limited by environmental factors, such as the availability of water for breeding, tolerable temperatures, suitable shelter, and an abundance of food. Toads at the frontier of their range of expansion may be larger than those in established populations. This is most probably due to greater food supply, combined with a lower incidence of disease.

In comparison with native frog and toad species, adult cane toads have a distinctive head and face, and are large and heavily built creatures (adults may grow to 20cm). The hands and feet are relatively small and lack discs at the tips of the digits. Webbing is absent between the fingers but is distinct and leathery between the toes. Colouring on the dorsal (upper) surface may be brown, olive-brown or reddish-brown. The ventral (underneath) surface varies from white to yellow and is usually mottled with brown... Warts are present on all cane toads, however males possess more than females. Warts are dark brown at the caps.

Mating can occur at any time of the year and is only dependant on available food and permanent water. The mating call is a continuous purring trill that sounds like a running motor. In situations where females are scarce or absent, male cane toads may have the ability to undergo a sex change to become fertile females, however this has not been proved. Both cane toads and native frogs spawn in slow moving or still water, but their eggs can be easily distinguished. Cane toad eggs are laid in long, gelatinous "strings" with the developing tadpoles appearing as a row of small black dots along the length. The strings are unique to cane toac with native frogs laid in clusters, generally appearing as blobs of jelly attached as mounds of foam floating on the water surface. I comparison with the native species, can toad egg production is dynamic and a single clutch can contain up to 35 000 eggs. Any cane toad eggs found should be removed from the water and allowed to dry out. The cane toad is the only species in Australia that has a pure black tadpole, native frogs have lighter-coloured undersides with a great range of colours and markings. (cane toad tadpoles may turn paler colours to almost transparent at night). The cane toad tadpoles are small and usually congregate in vast slow-moving shoals. This "shoaling" behaviour is uncharacteristic of most native species. .Further, unlike cane toad tadpoles nati species develop lungs at an early stage and periodically rise to the surface in order to exchange their lung gasses. Thus large groupings of tadpoles which do not break the water surface for air indicate cane toads. Bufo marinus produce venom glands occurring in most of the skin on their upper surface. The venom is concentrated in the parotid glands as creamy-white solution, which is released when the animal experiences extreme provocation or direct localized pressure, e.g. grasped by the mouth of a predator. The parotid solution is highly toxic and when ingested it produces drastic acceleration of the heart beat, shortness of breath, salivation and prostration. It is extremely painful if accidentally rubbed into the eye. Ingestion of toads by domestic and most native animals can result in death. In some recorded cases death has occurred within fifteen minutes. All stages of the cane toad are poisonous and most native frog larvae and many aquatic invertebrates are dramatically affected by their presence. Cane toads are voracious feeders that consume a wide variety of insects, frogs, small reptiles, mammals and even birds. Perhaps the onl limiting factor to the prey taken is the width of the cane toad's mouth. It has been suggested that the cane toad competition for foc and breeding grounds has been responsible for reducing the populations of some native frogs. However many native frogs are arboreal (tree dwelling), and so occupy different niches. Neither do cane toads have the native frog's ability to "shut down" during dry seasons when resources are limited. Cane toads readily eat animal and human faecal material and, in areas of poor hygiene, they have been known to transmit disease such as salmonella. CSIRO are investigating organisms for biological control. However exhaustive testing would be necessary to ensure that viral or bacterial agents are cane toad specific and not harmful to native species. Freezing is a humane form of treatment. As a reaction to cold the toad initiates dormancy, and eventually dies in its sleep

Rangers activities

• Rubbish bins are provided in most of the favorite fishing/ camping spots – please place your rubbish in the bins provided or bring your rubbish back to one of the excavated rubbish dumping points and leave the area clean and tidy for the next person.

• Weed spraying (Rubber vine, Calotrope, Mesquite and Prickly acacia) is continuing in problem areas on Council controlled land and Council road reserves.

• 1080 baiting was carried out throughout the Shire in May, If you take the family dog onto one of these properties be careful a some of these baits may be still active.

• Burketown cemetery - recent unmarked graves in the cemetery have been identified and we have now obtained plaques to be placed on these and the remaining graves that just had grave markers on them, these will be placed flush with the ground as in a lawn cemetery and will facilitate easier mowing and maintenance around the sites.

About – Michael Keenan

Michael Keenan is a fifth generation cattle and wheat farmer from the high plains south west of Coonabarabran. He has one of those lean Irish faces and a deeply furrowed brow. Great grandfather James Keenan arrived in Sydney from Ireland in 1825. He was a second son on the family farm, and in those times in Ireland, it was join the priesthood or migrate to America or Australia for those not destined to inherit land. William Wentworth, the colony's famous early settler and explorer soon employed him. Wentworth commissioned James to form pastoral stations in the Macquarie river valley (reference to James Keenan---Australian Men of Mark.) In the 1840's James purchased his own run known as Keenan's Bridge, near Orange. In the 1920's the Keenan family moved 250 kilometers north and acquired two properties---Myall Plains and Biamble, in the Castlereagh River loop. Michael grew up on Myall Plains, rock climbing in the Warrumbungles and riding in picnic races.

Life on the land used to be fun. His mother use to say that he learnt to track before he could talk. Reared in the bush as an only child, Michael rarely saw other children until he was sent away to a little school run by Irish Nuns.

Upon his return from Queensland Michael met Sarah (he's always loved her name) at a Merriwa bachelor and spinsters ball. Always called Sal, he loved her soft voice and zest for life. They danced the night out and Michael visited her in Sydney. When they married Sarah was just 20 and Michael 23.

The love of the land is clear in Keenan's writing. He wasn't an author before, though he'd written two manuscripts, which lay untouched at one publisher or another. The desire to write had been nurtured in correspondence courses but had never bloomed. Shortly after leaving the property to go droving in Queensland, during the mid 1990's drought, he began to keep a diary and was amazed how fate provided an increasing tempo of excitement and real life drama. "The first book simply fell into my lap."

In October 2000 Mike was the subject of the ABC television program ---"Australian Story," which focused on the theme of his first book---"The Horses Too Are Gone

In 1971, bushman Jack Camp went mustering wild cattle - 'cleanskins' - in a vast and isolated stretch of the Kimberly coast. 


TROY CASSAR –DALEY VISITS BURKETOWN

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Woodslake Restoration Project

As previously advised, the Carpentaria Land Council Aboriginal Corporation prepared an application for funding through the NHT programme for the restoration of Woodslake to its previous natural ecological conditions. The project aims to increase the depth of the lake system by excavation of the lake bottom; prevent further siltation via runoff from upstream waterways transporting sediment into the lake; revegetate the foreshore; eradicate any weeds adjacent to the lake; fill erosion areas and revegetate and fence off the lake to prevent stock and feral animals entering the lake itself.

The application is still be assessed by the Federal Department of Environment and Water which processes NHT applications. A response is expected shortly.

The project is being heavily supported by Burke Shire Council who has pledged to assist with the provision of machinery and operators to conduct the excavation works.

The Envirofund programme is designed to encourage volunteer community participation and we hope to see many of you lend a hand when the opportunities arise. In particular those with fencing experience will be more than welcome as it is estimated that there will be 23km of fencing required.

Already many individuals throughout the community have offered to volunteer their time for this worthwhile project.

BURKETOWN AQUATIC FACILITY

The construction of the Aquatic Facility in Burketown has commenced. The construction phase will take about 12 weeks. The facility will be constructed on a section of the former Burketown State School oval.

Once completed the community will have a great facility for swimming and water activities.

A plan of the facility can be viewed at the Shire Office in Burketown.

The aquatic facility includes a number of prefabricated fibreglass pools of different sizes. These will be available for different uses. If you want to swim there is a lap pool. If you want your toddlers to play in the water, there is a toddler's pool. If older kids want to muck around in the water then there are dedicated pools for them to do so without being a nuisance to others.

Kids that cannot swim will now have the opportunity to learn.

The concept of these pools was devised based upon need, potential use and the most cost effective way for Council to fund and manage the pools. Some people may want a large 25m pool but who pays for the construction of this?; who pays for the significant cost of operating and maintaining a larger pool?; and the soil in Burketown is not conducive for a large concrete pool – in a few years time the concrete will be cracking and tiles falling off and this will then become a cost burden on the ratepayers.

An operational and management plan of the new aquatic facility is currently being put together. Once finalised this will provide how the facility will be operated, including access and cost of use. A main portion of this plan is to make adults responsible for kids that use the pools.


