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2008 Local Government Elections

Mayoral Report

Congratulations to the Burketown Fishing Competition Committee for an absolutely wonderful event over the Easter period. Sunday night was a well organised thoroughly enjoyable event. Well done and thank you.

I welcome all who were elected and send thanks on behalf of the Community to those retiring Councillors who have contributed their time and wisdom to get our Shire to where it is today. Thanks to Irene Marshall who was our longest serving member, Kenny Booth for his 7 years and Murrandoo Yanner for his 3years. Our induction day was attended by family, friends and office staff. Faye and Doug Jones attended and Doug kindly gave us a lesson on our roles for and in the community and took his wisdom from a bible reading, reflecting on the laws handed down through the 10 Commandments. His prayer for the good of the community through sound decision making by the Councillors elect was a good and proper start to this term of Council. Thank you, Doug and Faye. It is interesting to note that Cr Tonia Booth is third generation of the Booth Family represented on Council. (To the best of my knowledge) On behalf of the newly elected Council I am sending out thanks to one and all for the efficient, well conducted occasion the elections turned out to be. Without the interest of the candidates who nominated and the voters who selected the elections would be a non-event. Thank you all sincerely. Council has already decided to address the problems that arose over that period with the Electoral Commission and the Government. These include the return of a polling booth, the timing of the election and our basic democratic right to have our say and to make sure it is actually achieved. Since the finalisation of the election the new roles under amalgamations have begun. Even though we have not been amalgamated we are down to five Councillors and the job is in front of us.

Since the departure of our previous CEO Craig Turnour who was farewelled with numerous tributes including the gift of a painting of the Burketown Aquatic Centre from Burke Shire and the Community, thanks and lots of memories we welcomed the arrival of Mr. Paul Maberly to act in the position of CEO until Council has decided who will fill the role permanently. Paul has decided to accept another position at home and we wish him well in his new endeavours, as he is leaving at the end of the week. Oliver Pring has been appointed acting CEO whilst we readvertise the position. Thank you to all the staff who have maintained the works over this transition period.

The Premier called all Mayors to Brisbane for a briefing and we were informed, instructed and lectured by the speakers and put on notice to make things work and seize opportunities. Premier Anna Bligh spoke on the amalgamations and how this action would give amalgamated Councils "grunt". I was able to ask the question how do the 'squealers' (the not amalgamated) then get to the grunt stage. This got a laugh but the Premier spoke to me privately and invited us down for a meeting with her on all the issues. Deputy Premier Paul Lucas, Minister for Local Government Warren Pitt, Federal Minister Albanese, and Minister for Transport, Local Government and Infrastructure ask us all to work with Government for our communities and take advantage of opportunities that will be available. I was able to attend an Alcohol Management meeting at the invitation of Mornington Island Mayor Cecil Goodman. Only the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Mayors had been advised that the meeting was on. I was able to make the point that we were under the legislation as well and should naturally have been included. It was heartening to hear the discussion and the criticism that whilst alcohol has been a problem it is not the only item that needs discussion. The mood was one of getting on with the jobs that need to be done, and the ability to do so developing commercial opportunities to become self-sufficient, potentially using some of them as opportunities to solve the problems.

Ranger Russell Cunningham and I are meeting with DPI to discuss the Caring for Country, the Burke Shire Pest Management Plan and potential models for engaging the community. We are looking forward to a forum with DPI in mid-May bringing quite a road-show for our information. Council will be attending the Community Forum in Richmond on the 7th April, a pre-start RoadTek meeting in Cloncurry on the 9th April, a Council meeting on the 10th April. The 13th April – 19th April I will be attending AgForce and LGAQ Infrastructure and Development meetings in Brisbane. Our local Member Betty Kiernan offered her congratulations and we had a lengthy discussion and a meeting will be set up while I am in Brisbane. We try to capitalise on the time away by lining up as many items as we can. It means I have to do fewer trips, but with the new regime Councillors will be sharing more of the load as well. On the 21st of April Kath Logan, Chair Gulf Board of the North Queensland Area Consultative committee is hosting a meeting of the Board at Century. Both Cr Tracy Forshaw and I are members and will be attending. I am attending the Council meeting of NQACC in Hughenden on the 23rd April and will be back to attend Anzac Day. We then look forward to the May long week end with the canoe race, Gregory Races and Bull ride. If anyone reckons they are bored they certainly don't reside in the Burke Shire.

It is fantastic to see the road works well underway and the improvement to the roads thanks to the road crew and the people who keep them going. Parks and gardens and are one of the many compliments that I receive constantly both here and Gregory. I must comment on the extraordinary efforts put in by Elvee Portch and Don McEvoy in relation to getting the Gregory water right and to thank them.

Finally, I will be spending more time in the office and am available to meet with anyone. If you would like to discuss any matter with me please call the office to make an appointment.

Carpentaria Land Council Weed & Fire Report

Six fulltime Gulf rangers have started work for the Carpentaria Land Council and been working on the Rubber-vine infestation along the Albert River in the town area. The Rangers have been applying a cut and paste method to the rubber-vine and using an herbicide called Vigilant to kill the weed. Over the next couple of years we will put hot fires through this area to kill any seeds. The rubber-vine work will continue for the next month around town so if you can please notify your children to keep out of the area on the eastern side of town and we will notify you as soon as the area is safe for the kids to enter. It looks like the wet season has just about finished for the year and with the high temperatures still around the grass is starting to dry off already so it is time to start looking at putting in fire breaks around your properties to protect yourselves from wildfires.

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RANGER'S REVIEW



With the continuation of the wet season and the increased activity of our bird life it is an opportune time to enlighten residents on one of our shires bird species.

Bower Birds

Of the 3 species of bowerbirds found in the wet tropics only the **great bowerbird** has been identified in the gulf savannah and the Burke Shire in particular.

Mimics - All the male bowerbirds are known to mimic other birds, usually as part of their courtship display. From September to February each year they liven the bush in the vicinity of their stages, giving an impression of countless species of birds in full song. The males sing for much of the day and it is thought that the mimicry component is used specifically to attract females. However, the loud songs also seem to function as an advertisement of territories to other males since a bird will stop now and then to listen for its neighbors. Females of the great bowerbird are also known to mimic when disturbed at their nests. They usually choose to mimic predatory birds but can also produce cat and human noises (one great bowerbird near a quarry, can mimic the noise of rocks being thrown into a trailer and a two-way radio)

Bowers – Bowers are not nests but display areas, built by male bowerbirds to attract females for mating. Females choose their mates after carefully inspecting the structure and decorations of each bower (rare items gain bonus points) as well as the male's plumage, his display and his vocal repertoire. Males with the best displays get to mate with the most females – in any population only a few experienced males, with the most impressive bowers, may actually father the young, this creates much competition with males actively destroying the bowers of rivals and stealing trophies. This forces the victims to spend more time on rebuilding and less on seducing females. Following his conquest, the male bowerbird takes no further interest in the female or his offspring. In contrast to their mate's elaborate structures, the females build rather ordinary cup or saucer nests made from twigs. Our species of bowerbird build avenue bowers. Thin sticks are neatly arranged in an upright position, forming two parallel walls, looking almost like a couple of old-fashion brooms sticking out of the ground with a narrow passage between. Decorations are mainly arranged at each end of this avenue, the great bowerbird choosing pale objects such as bleached snail shells, stones, bones and soft drink ring-pulls as well as green fruits (and often shiny objects stolen from homes). Further adornment is added by the males 'painting' the inner walls of the avenue with plant matter and saliva. Interested females enter the avenue, where mating takes place, after which she may be promptly chased away to leave the bower free for further seductions.

Visiting bowers – People are fascinated by bowers – but may unintentionally create a situation where all the bird's hard work is in vain. Bowerbirds put an immense amount of effort into their creations, spending up to 20 years building, renovating and decorating. A good bower is the key to a male's breeding success – as long as the females come to visit him. Females however, are shy and if a bower is frequented by potential predators, such as humans, they may stay away. The sad result is that the most spectacular bowers, which attract most human visitors, are the most likely to be a waste of effort. Having invested so much time and energy the males often cannot afford to start anew. If you want to visit bowers, or take others to visit them, please put the needs of the birds first. Time your arrival carefully so that you visit the bower in the middle of the day. The females visit for mating in the morning and evening, so visits between 11 am and 2 pm will help minimize this disturbance. Try and stay at least 5m away from the bower and make your visit brief. By hanging about, trampling and dropping rubbish you may not only scare away females but also alert potential predators to the bower's position. I trust this gives you some insight into this resourceful bird and look the other way when he picks the green fruit from your fruit trees to decorate his bower.

- Barramundi Growout facility is progressing well with all of the equipment being ordered, shed flooring is being put down in conjunction with the new treatment plant concrete pour.
- New park table and chair setting installed in park near the Info Centre to replace the timber one that had fallen apart with dry rot.
- Table and Chair setting placed in Gregory Airport waiting shelter.
- Gazebo for the Pensioner Units has arrived and waiting for labour to install. All rubbish bins out and local dumping points dug ready for the influx of visitors

To ALL Rural Fire Brigade Members,

Queensland Fire & Rescue Service – Rural Operations in conjunction with Air Services Australia – Aviation Rescue and Fire Fighting wish to provide further training that will compliment the Remote Airport and Aircraft Fire Fighting Training held during May 2007.

This current round of training be inclusive of some "<u>Refresher Training</u>" and a "<u>Real Life</u> <u>Exercise</u>" at each location and could be included as part of CASA requirements on Local Governments / Councils as the Airport Owners to run an exercise Bi-Annualty.

Target airports that will undertake this training are:

With the closure of the CDMA network extended to April 28, (AREA) residents who have yet to recycle their soon to be redundant CDMA handsets can still do their part for the environment by recycling them now.

Burke Shire Council is part of MobileMuster, the official recycling program of the mobile phone industry. They're reminding residents to recycle their old CDMA phones, batteries, chargers and accessories at their nearest collection point or post them free of charge to MobileMuster to stop them ending up in landfill and harming the environment.

MobileMuster will recycle all CDMA mobiles handed in and recover over 90% of the plastics and metals. The recycled materials can then be turned into plastic fence posts, jewellery and stainless steel products.

As a community it is important to conserve our environment and by recycling old mobile phones, batteries, chargers and accessories we are reducing our demand on natural resources, saving energy and helping protect the planet. Mobile phones, batteries, chargers and accessories are not biodegradable and should not be thrown in the rubbish bin as they contain small amounts of potentially harmful substances that could pollute our environment if they end up in landfill.

By leaving a redundant CDMA handset lying around at home or the office, tonnes of useful metals like copper, gold and silver, as well as plastics are going to waste," said Rose Read, Manager of Australian Mobile Telecommunications Association's (AMTA) recycling program. "Recycling these materials means the CDMA mobile you are using today could be part of a plastic fence post you are installing next year, or the jewellery you buy your loved one on their birthday," said Rose. "I'm encouraging Burke Shire residents to round up and hand in their redundant CDMA mobiles now and do something positive for our planet" concluded Ms Read.

CDMA handsets, batteries, chargers and accessories can be recycled at Council's office in Burketown.

IN THE EVENT THAT IT IS DECIDED TO EVACUATE RESIDENTS TO CENTERALISED LOCATIONS THE FOLLOWING WILL APPLY:-

THE FIRE TRUCK WILL SOUND IT'S SIREN THROUGH THE STREETS TO INDICATE THAT IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT ALL RESIDENTS SHOULD MAKE THEIR WAY TO THE FOLLOWING CENTRAL AREAS (IF YOU NEED ASSISTANCE TO DO THIS PLEASE CONTACT THE COUNCIL OFFICE).


