Mayoral Budget Statement—Councillor Annie Clarke

At its Wednesday 19 August 2009 Ordinary Council Meeting Burke Shire Council adopted the 2009-2010 budget. Budgeted operational expenditure for the year is to be in the vicinity of \$10.5m. Councillors take their financial responsibilities to the Shire, our communities and future generations very seriously, particularly with reference to the massive flooding and stock losses this last wet season. As such we have endeavoured to develop a budget that is realistic and responsible.

As a Shire we strive to remain debt free and have focused this year on completing capital projects all ready underway. This will in no way inhibit our intentions to move forward with identified new projects and their planning. Council intends to continue living within its means.

Given the current economic climate it is inevitable that Council is experiencing a rise in the cost of doing business and as such Council must pass these increases onto rate payers so that service delivery levels and current standards are maintained. In doing this Council has endorsed a 5.3% increase in General Rates and Utility Charges, in line with the Council Cost Index as published by Local Government Association of Queensland.

In context this will mean a typical rates increase in residential rates, after discount, for Burketown serviced properties of \$102.04 and \$74.50 for Gregory. This amounts to a weekly increase of \$1.97 and a \$1.44 respectively.

Ratepayers across Queensland have experienced rates increases from around 5%-6% through to percentages in the high teens.

While there will be rate increases in the future Council believes that the State Government land revaluations of Burke Shire, scheduled for next year, may trigger changes to the overall rating system for the next financial year being 2010 – 2011.

Learn to Love Constructive Feedback

Council intends to provide a level of customer service that does not give rise to complaints. That said we all know there are going to be times when we fall short of the mark. When those 'lessons' occur Council has given an

undertaking to acknowledge the rights of people to provide feedback, both positive and negative, on Council services.

To this end in March 2009 the Complaints Policy was revised and a Register was established. This has been done to ensure that, to the greatest practical extent, any complaint is dealt with fairly, promptly, professionally, in confidence (subject to any legal requirements) and in a manner respectful to the complainant.

Thus we get to learn from our mistakes, improve our systems and better meet the needs of our ratepayers and the wider community.

A person may make a complaint or provide feedback in any of the following ways ...

- by telephone
- in person to a Council officer
- by email
- in writing

All written matters, both good and bad, should be addressed to the CEO. The writer's contact details should be included so Council can contact them to address the matter. More complex complaints are preferred in writing so that details are recorded to assist investigation.

Each month the number and nature of complaints will be highlighted in a report by the CEO to the Council Meeting. In this way your elected representatives are able to monitor and comment on organisational performance.

So, got something useful to say or an issue to raise ... lodge your complaint and allow us to learn and improve from the experience.

News from Around Council

In this new addition to the newsletter there will be highlights from the various areas of service Council provides to our communities

- Council has taken up the offer of Emergency Management Queensland to assist with the preparation of a new Disaster Management Plan. This will be a good opportunity for the membership and functioning of the Local Disaster Management Committee to examined and clarified.
- Russell Cunningham has successfully completed the first phase of his Work Place Health and Safety
 Officers accreditation and is now on the second phase of his accreditation. Congratulations Russell! A
 number of documents are now being prepared by Russell for the Work Place Health and Safety
 System using Safeplan2.
- Council's Engineering section is operating to capacity. Graders are working on maintenance and have completed obliteration of Corrugations on Lawn Hill to Riversleigh and Lawn Hill to Gregory Road junction at Lawn Hill.
- Aerodromes are operating satisfactorily and the line marking following the reseals at Burketown facility is programmed for late August / early September.
- Council will soon be advertising for a Customer Services Officer for our Burketown offices. The job will be advertised on the usual notice boards and in the local paper.
- The Burke Shire Pool is once again open and available for use. The card system is currently non-functional so users are being issued with a key for the padlocked gate. When using the pool please be sure to lock the gate, even while you are inside and of course when you leave, as we do not want unaccompanied children accessing the pool without adult supervision.

Council Meeting In Brief

Here are some of the matters and decisions made at the August 2009 Ordinary Meeting of Council. Remember the full transcript of unconfirmed minutes can be found at www.burkeshirecouncil.com

Mayoral Report

The Mayor, Councilor Annie Clarke delivered a verbal report on various matters and expressed her heartfelt thanks for the personal efforts made by Cr Camp to represent Council and region at the last Northern Gulf Catchment meeting with the State Government delegation to discuss the effect of the recent flood event on the region's properties.

Ergon Energy Request

Ergon Energy have approached Council to determine if they can utilise part of the Council controlled land next their power station in Burketown for the storage of additional fuel for the power station to better "flood proof" the power stations fuel supply over the wet season. A proposed draft licence to allow this to happen was presented.

Council decided to advise Ergon Energy that, given the essential nature of power supply to the area, Council supports their request to utilise part of the land described as Lot 19 on CP B13620 for fuel storage and ancillary storage for the adjoining power station subject to the following conditions being meet:

- a) Ergon Energy obtaining the appropriate Development approvals (MCU, ERA, BA, Reconfiguring a lot etc) and securing appropriate tenure (Freehold) of the land for Council to allow this to proceed;
- b) Council obtaining Ministerial Approval to dispense with the tendering requirements for the lease or licensing of this part of the land or, in the absence of such approval, tendering out the lease or licence of that part of the land for the purpose sought once appropriate tenure is obtained for the land;
- c) an appropriate negotiated lease or licence agreement being entered into between Council and Ergon Energy for the part of the site required by Ergon Energy.

Tourism Grant

Advice has been received from Russell Boswell, Manager Savannah Way Ltd, of the details of the new Minor Tourism Infrastructure Grants for up to \$50,000. Russell has advised that Savannah Way Limited could make applications on Council's behalf or work with Council to develop proposals, provide letters of support for accessing the grant. Applications close 3rd September.

Council decided to utilise Savannah Way Ltd to lodge and application for the following projects in order of priority:

- Making safe the old Albert River Bridge for pedestrian/recreational use traffic (drop down railings etc) and the provision of solar lighting for the area
- Update interpretive signage
- Caravan dump spots Adels Grove/Lawn Hill
- Directional Signage Tourist ventures

Burketown Rural Fire Brigade

A request has been received for Council to service the Burketown Rural Fire Brigade vehicle. Council decided to provide the assistance sought provided the cost of same is recorded as a Council donation and the Burketown Rural Fire Brigade acknowledge Council's assistance to the brigade.

Savannah Way Ltd

Council has renewed it's membership of the Savannah Way Ltd.

Council Meeting In Brief Continued ...

Rating Matters – Advice from the Crime and Misconduct Commission

That Council note the advice from the CMC that Council's differential rural rating system does not give rise to any suspicion of misconduct and that Council has given a full explanation of the rating system in use in its circular to all Shire residents in June 2009 and that Council is of the view that this explanation satisfies the CMC's suggestion that such an explanation be provided to Council's property owners.

Reallocation proposal for the TIDS funding

Council endorsed the allocation of part of the 2009-2010 allocation of TIDS category C funding totaling \$1,184,000 to include the following four (4) specific projects on the Roads Alliance LRRS (Local Roads of Regional Significance) Gregory-Lawn Hill Road as follows:

- 1 Survey Planning and Design Immediately West of the Century Mine Road turnoff (\$39,000)
- 2 Immediately West of Big Archie Creek Upgrade Pavement to Sealed Standard (\$750,000)
- 3 Invert Upgrade at Little Archie Creek to have a concrete overlay (\$147,500)
- 4 1km section fronting Adel's Grove Tourist facility (\$247,500)

Budget papers for 2009/2010

The budget papers for 2009-10 were presented and adopted by Council.

Dog Registrations

Registration renewals are well underway and Council thanks those responsible dog owners who have already renewed their registrations.



There seems to be some confusion with the fees associated with dog and cat registration. The fees are as follows:

Cats: \$10

Dogs desexed : \$10

• Dogs intact: \$50

Dogs deemed as 'regulated dogs': \$200

It should be noted that Council currently has no regulated dogs on the books. A regulated dog is one that, through due process has been deemed to be a menace or danger to the community, or is defined as a restricted dog under the Customs Act 1956 by definition of it's breed.

No active house to house inspections is planned at this time however it is noted that there is a rising dog population in Burketown and this has been commented on. though there have been no actual complaints lodged at this time.

Burke Shire Council Housing and Community Housing

Over the next six to 12 months a real effort is going to be made to bring back into use houses that have outstanding maintenance issues. One of Council's biggest issues in attracting quality staff to work for the organisation is housing. We just don't have enough and some of what we do have needs work.

In 2006 Council commenced work on what was to be pensioner units in Musgrave Street. These units were constructed with general council funds, not specific grant monies associated with our senior community members.

Once built it became apparent that some design issues had been over looked. The bathrooms and entrance ways in particular were not 'senior friendly. Thus a practical decision was made to utilise the units as accommodation for council officers. This has assisted Council with recruitment in recent months.

Council is aware there has been some anxiety in the community with the use of these units for council officers, but given our dire housing shortage Council feels this was the best way to utilise these units.


Gumbummunda (Albert River) Bridge Update

There is much interest in the community with regards the works being undertaken at the Gumbummunda (Albert River) Bridge site. Next week should see the installation of the guardrails completed.

Right now Council is sourcing relocatable amenities, being a unisex toilet for the park site. Relocatable picnic tables and seats should be arriving any day now. The idea is to have these facilities on removable slide frames so they can be moved out for each wet season and re-installed after the waters have subsided.

Steel for safety/handrails for the Old Bridge is being fabricated.

Stained Glass & Copper Foil Workshop

Burketown & Gregory

Burke Shire Council is holding a workshop to learn the craft of stained glass & copperfoil. A 7 day workshop will be held from Sunday 6 September to Saturday 12 September 2009 at the Burketown Shire Hall and a 4 day workshop to be held at the CWA Hall at Gregory from Sunday 13 September to Wednesday 16 September. Dermott Clifford will be conducting the workshop and has conducted workshops in Normanton over the last 2 years.

The course is limited to a maximum of 20 places – 10 during the day & 10 in the evening for Burketown and 10 places in Gregory. Classes will be held 4 hours during the day and 4 hours in the evening for those who can't attend during the day. Cost to the public is tool hire & price of materials used which ranges between \$50 to \$150 depending on the projects you choose. To learn the basics of stained glass & copper foil usually takes up to 20 hours so attendance times can be flexible depending on your progress.

If you are interested in learning these crafts or require more information then please contact Cheryl Portch at Council Office on Ph: 4745 5100 during work hours. A non-refundable deposit of \$50 will need to be made to confirm your place. This can be either posted or paid in person at Council Office. Eftpos & credit card facilities are now available.

You should have gloves, safety glasses & apron to participate. Dermott will have extra safety gear that can be purchased at cost price at the hall. Dermott will also have extra glass, materials & tools that can also be purchased.



Introduction to Burketown's Occupational Therapist

My name is Beau Sheppard and I am the Occupational Therapist that visits Burketown every 6 weeks. I work for North West Queensland Primary Health Care and I travel to rural and remote communities within the Gulf region. I began working with North West Qld Primary Health Care in January of this year, and I often find that I have to explain my role as an Occupational Therapist. Occupational Therapy or O.T. has many roles to offer in supporting people young or wise within their community.

What is Occupational Therapy?

"The primary goal of occupational therapy is to enable people to participate in the activities of everyday life" (World Federation of Occupational Therapists). Referrals can be from people across the lifespan - including infants, children, adolescents/youth, adults, and older persons. Occupational Therapist's work together with people in their homes, school, workplaces, and other community settings, including hospital and community health care environments.

Children often develop at different stages and while there is no right or wrong way, there can be times where one on one assistance and activities designed to improve specific areas of development are needed. Children can find the classroom environment and certain tasks overwhelming especially when there is something that is blocking their ability to carry out these tasks. Fine motor skills i.e handwriting & using scissors, along with difficulty copying from the board or book when writing i.e writing backwards or outside of the lines can be an indication of visual and or motor planning issues. Specific activities and extra time spent in these areas can assist the child to keep up with their classmates.

OT's assess and prescribe equipment such as wheelchairs, 4 wheeled walkers, and other mobility aids. We can also assess the bathroom and toilet for grab rails, or for major modifications i.e removing step over bath tub or to measure for ramps at the front or back or the house. We work alongside builders for Dept of Housing, Home Assist Secure, private contractors and equipment suppliers to ensure all recommendations for our clients are within relevant guidelines to ultimately achieve better access and safety for the person within their home. Home modifications may be necessary for people in rehabilitation after physical injury which can include hip/knee replacements and spinal cord injuries. Hand splinting and therapy is another role we can provide to assist people to recover from injury or aid in early symptoms of arthritis. Ergonomic assessments, return to work programs and providing strategies for managing everyday tasks in the workplace during your recovery can also be provided by an Occupational Therapist.

As case managers working in mental health the focus of our role is assisting and empowering people to manage everyday activities such as budgeting, maintaining their home environment, learning coping strategies together with social and community integration.

I hope this article has given you some insight into the role of an occupational therapist and that you keep us OT's in mind when you need a hand to keep up with everyday life.

The North West Primary Health Care team travel to Burketown with allied health staff traveling on alternating trips every three weeks. The allied health team include a Podiatrist, Psychologist, Occupational Therapist, Speech Pathologist, Physiotherapist and an Indigenous Liaison Officer. We provide individual client treatment and group health promotion activities such as health screenings and school sessions for child health.
