## Council Update

#### **Community Wellbeing**

 Mayor, Councillor Annie Clarke has been in communication with Dr Dennis Pashen with regards the establishment of a Burketown Remote Area Nursing Scholarship. Council is investigating the proposed scholarship concept and report back to Council with regards implications for Council. This role would be placed at the Burketown Hospital.

#### The Environment

• The Department of Environment and Resource Management have released the Draft Queensland Coastal Management Plan for public consultation. The plan and supporting information can be viewed online at www.derm.qld.gov.au/coastalplan . Council will make a submission and express concern regarding blanket statements that will impact on the future economic and social wellbeing of the shire.

- The Office of Clean Energy and Burke Shire Council are progressing the Burke Shire Energy Conservation Pilot Project.
- The Burke Shire Council Drought
   Management Plan (DMP) was adopted by
   Council. The plan does have some fairly
   demanding requirements regarding water
   usage and restrictions however it has been
   designed that there is provision for adequate
   allowances of water to keep a desirable
   green look about the towns with some
   management and logistical manoeuvres. The
   Council endorsed the DMP acknowledging
   that as a revisable document and ongoing

monitoring and changes may be required from time to time.

#### The Road Network

- Council has endorsed the expenditure of the \$600,000 Category FTIDS Funds for 2009-2010 on the 5.0 km section starting at 51 kms from the Doomadgee-Gregory-Burketown intersection and finishing at 56 kms from the said intersection of the Doomadgee Road East.
- There are several roads within the Shire that will qualify for NDRRA Flood Damage. The submission for the first phase of the event is now complete and submitted to the Departments of Main Roads and Local Government for consideration by

- Emergency Management Qld (EMQ) and total approximately \$8million.
- Council have learnt that restoration works planned by Main Roads are to be undertaken immediately at Beames Brook Bridge. Councils will communicate with main Roads it's extreme disappointment that no contingency plan has been made to allow access for vehicles over 25 tonne to continue during the planned two month restoration works. Further, that Council emphasis the economic and social impact this will cause for the communities of the Burketown, Gregory and Doomadgee, during the crucial dry season. Also the added expense and imposition this will bring to service providers such as long haul transporters and the likely outcome that they will pass these costs onto consumers. Council recommends the installation of a Bailey bridge for the duration of the restoration works.

#### **Events**

- Council sponsored a one colour page in the Mount Isa School of the Air annual school magazine for the cost of \$75.00.
- Council approved the Burketown Rodeo Committee request for in-kind assistance for rodeo preparation to a dollar value of \$1500.00 ex gst
- Council donated \$75.00 to the Gregory Downs School P&C towards its Trivia Night that was held on 31 October 2009.
- Endorsement of the allocation of proceeds from the auction at the 2009 Arts and Craft Show was: The Royal Flying Doctors Service – 60% The Burke Shire Christmas Celebration – 40%

#### **Administrative Matters**

- Council is tidying up some matters in relation to a trust fund that was established some years ago. Unclaimed sale of land proceeds amounting to \$17,958.01 have been forwarded to the Public Trustee as is required under Legislation. A request to transfer the Senior Citizens fund raising amount of \$793.30 to HACC funding be approved.
- A meeting of the trustees of the Burke Shire Emergency Trust Fund is to be called to finalise some remaining details.

#### **Economic Issues**

• The Department of Environment and Resource Management (DERM) is seeking public feedback on a stakeholder-led review into the management and use of the stock route network (SRN) in Queensland. The review is proposing a number of fee changes, which are outlined in the RIS—Stock Route Network Management Regulation 2009. DERM consulted a panel of stock route users and managers on the proposed recommendations. Council is seeking assurances from the Department of Environment Resource Management that no stock routes are to be closed under the proposed RIS State Wide Stock Route Network Management Regulation 2009. Further Council is seeking clarification as to which stock routes within Burke Shire are to be designated active and inactive. To this end a representative from DERM is coming to speak to Council and interested property owners at the November meeting.

#### **Telecommunications**

- Council is writing to Optus requesting an update with regards their current plans for service provision at Burketown.
- Council is writing to Telstra highlighting the lack of engagement from Senior Officers regarding requests from community groups relating to phone services for Gregory.
   Council is requesting that Telstra provide an update regarding their current plans for service provision at Gregory.

#### Gregory

At a previous Council meeting a decision
was made to call for Public Submissions on
the proposed name change of Gregory
Downs to Gregory. Submissions were called
for by September 30 2009. Council will now
write to the Department of Environment
and Natural Resource Management
requesting that under the Q I 50
Celebrations Program and after due
opportunity for and consideration of
comments from residents that Burke Shire
Council request that the township of
Gregory Downs be renamed as Gregory.

### Councillor Travel for Delegations, Meetings and Training

- The Mayor, Councillor Annie Clarke attended the Southern Gulf Catchments AGM - Saturday 26 September at Hughenden
- The Deputy Mayor, Councillor Ernie Camp and Councillor Tonya Murray, together with the CEO and the Director of Finance and Community Services attended a training day in Mount Isa with regards the new Local Government Act and it's implications.

The Citizen of the Year awards are presented to individuals whom have made a noteworthy contribution to the community during the current year and/or given outstanding service to the local community over a number of years. Whilst the awards recognise outstanding personal achievement they also celebrate the remarkable contributions individuals are making to their community.

The Junior Sports Award is presented to an individual who has made a noteworthy record of achievement in sport or has made a significant contribution to sport as a coach, official or administrator.

## **Building Bridges**

The Governor of Queensland, Her Excellency Ms Penelope Wensley opened the Gumbummunda River Bridge on 26th October 2009.

The community turned out in force to see Her Excellency cut the ribbon with George Watson, School of the Air senior student Roy Fisher, Burketown School captain Aiden Portch and Gregory School captain Nicole Forshaw.

Our Mayor, Councillor Annie Clarke, Deputy Mayor, Councillor Ernie Camp, Councillor Tonya Murray and Councillor Tracy Forshaw were thrilled that the community of Burke Shire were there to celebrate this feat. One hundred and fifty guests walked the bridge with the Governor.

The Gumbummunda Bridge is a great achievement for the shire. The bridge builders, Nelmac were also here for the bridge opening.

In a real act of generosity Nelmac Directors pledged a donation of \$2000.00 to the Burketown School.

There were many other distinguished guests, including representatives from our traditional owner group, elected representatives ans senior officers from Carpentaria, Croyden and Cloncurry Shires, the General Manager of Skytrans and of course the families and communities from all around Burke Shire.

A lovely dinner was served on the bridge as the sun was setting over the river. All guests received a golden water bottle to commemorate the opening of the bridge. An event like this doesn't happen very often in small remote areas and to have had this experience is something for everyone to remember for a very long time and be proud of.





## **Gulf Future visions**

Around 60 people participated in the Gulf Future Visions workshop held in Normanton on 14 October. The purpose of the workshop was to identify factors likely to shape the Gulf economy into future decades, and to identify opportunities and challengers arising from these future trends.

#### The Future of Agribusiness

Prominent company Director and former State treasurer, Keith De Lacy, said that global "food security represents a much greater challenge for mankind than carbon pollution", and told participants to prepare for the soft commodities boom (particularly food and fibre products).

To meet the challenge Keith said there needed to be increased productivity (science, GM crops etc), removal of trade protectionism and more efficient use of the world's water. He encouraged the Gulf to focus on its strengths (lifestyle, environment and resources). He said the Gulf's water resources are a "massive asset in a hungry world" and said that the Gilbert River irrigation proposal had "great potential, but many challenges", and to make sure it had an economy of scale.

### **Demographic Change** and **Economic Trends**

Economist and futurist, Kim Houghton, forecast that the global recession will last longer than the 'downturn' in Australia. He challenged the Gulf economy to diversify, add value and seek flowon benefits from larger projects (egmines). At the Gulf Small Business Forum on 15 October, Kim urged

businesses to plan for changes in their main markets. He presented data showing that while there has been increased demand for low quality and high quality products across Australia, there has been a decline in demand for mid-value products. Kim said while it is hard for small business to compete with the big chains in the low value market, there are great opportunities for small business to compete in the high value markets – including in the Gulf.

#### Sustainable Futures for Gulf Aboriginal People

Academic and consultant, David Martin, exhorted the Gulf community as a whole to work together to address the socioeconomic disadvantage we facing Gulf Aboriginal people. He outlined the youthfulness of the Gulf Aboriginal population and forcast that the Gulf Aboriginal population is likely to increase as an overall proportion of the Gulf in coming years. He urged the Aboriginal community to embrace education to equip their leaders for the challenges ahead.

#### **Political Perspectives**

Local State MP, Betty Kiernan, and Federal Senator Jan McLucas, both spoke about their Government's support for the region and their interest in supporting the outcomes of the workshop. Carpentaria Shire Mayor, Cr Fred Pascoe, Burke Shire Deputy Mayor, Cr Ernie Camp and Etheridge Shire Mayor, Cr Warren Devlin, outlined their vision for the Gulf – and the need to align that local vision with national and global realities.

#### **Outcomes**

In the afternoon, participants discussed how we could respond to some of these future trends and came up with the following:

- Investigate export opportunities into Asia for the Gulf (esp.primary industries)
- Redevelop the Gulf Regional Development Plan, with full indigenous participation, to plan how we adapt to these future trends
- Hold a Gulf Renewable Energy Summit in 2010 to investigate alternate energy options
- Promote sharing a business experience and sharing of information through establishment of a Gulf Chamber of Commerce.

### Introducing GWEN


Gwen is the Gulf Womens Email Network and she was officially launched at the Gulf Small Business Forum in Normanton on 15 October 2009.

## **Vacational Care**

The Vacation care program will start on Monday 7th. Dec. and run through until the 18th Dec. There will be a break then until Jan 11th and will run through until Friday 22nd. Jan.

There will be a structured Learn to Swim program for all children attending the program. There will be a schedule and progress documented for any parent to discuss with the coordinator of the vacation care program. If possible there will be scheduled times within the program for infants water familisation . While the children are having free swim time, parents with smaller children will be offered the opportunity to take some training in getting their younger children familiar with water. If they are already confident then extra activities to develop more water skills can be shown.

There will be two brand new bikes given away to two children of Burketown. The bikes will be prizes for the children who attend the program , (each day you gain points), their behaviour at the program , plus a small series of handicap races (worked on age) over 400 metres. The Bikes will be awarded in the January program so there will be records kept and a notice board style advertising of points for all to see.

The bikes will be brand new Fluid Mountain bikes and will be sized for the particular winners.

Each Friday there will be a BBQ lunch done for the children and their parents or care givers. The BBQ will be simple but it is aimed at getting people to the program to see what the children do and how they spend their time. But more importantly it is hoped that adults will be available to share play time with the children. Every Friday the program will be a half day finishing by 2:00pm. at the latest

It is proposed that a Hairdresser attend the program during the second week of Dec to target the girls with deportment activities , hair care and so on. For the boys hair care and if parents allow, hair cuts

The program will have new toys plus cushions are being made for a TV Quiet area to be in the hall for DVD/TV area that will be comfortable and cool for the kids.

There will be craft activities, with a Christmas theme as well as cooking, slime, sports and other attractions.


Friday kicked off with the first round of the open bull ride, poddy ride and entertainment till late.

## Mosquito Fogging and Control

Council will be commencing mosquito fogging for the 2009/10 wet season in Burketown, Gregory & Rural Properties. The fogging will usually be undertaken in the mornings, between 4:30am and 6:30am, on days when the wind conditions permit. In the townships there may be additional fogging of an evening if mosquitoes are present in large numbers. Residents are requested to ensure where practical their houses be closed up for the duration of the fogging.

In the case of Rural properties Council is offering a free "fog" and limited distribution of pellets to those rural properties that may be interested. Should you wish to partake in this service (or have any queries in respect of it) please contact Council's Ranger, Russell Cunningham, at this office and register your expression of interest.

Subject to weather it is expected that this will be actioned over the next few weeks (some prior to Christmas and some in early January 2008).

The extent of the fogging in the build up to and through the wet season will depend on available funds and the extent of the mosquito problem.

In addition to this fogging, there are a number of actions that can be taken by residents to prevent mosquitoes from breeding and your cooperation in attending to these is requested. These include:

- emptying outside containers of water daily
- · filling pot plant water trays with sand
- checking that gauze on rain water tanks is brass, copper, aluminum or stainless steel and of aperture diameter no greater than Imm mesh
- preventing water from ponding in holes by filling them in
- · keeping long grass mowed
- wiping all containers of any debris, especially if black, blue coloured eggs around Imm in size are present.

#### Burketown Swimming Pool

The key card entry to the Burketown Swimming Pool is in the process of being fixed and will be operational on December I 2009.

## Introduction to Burketown's Occupational Therapist

My name is Beau Sheppard and I am the Occupational Therapist that visits Burketown every 6 weeks. I work for North West Queensland Primary Health Care and I travel to rural and remote communities within the Gulf region.

I began working with North West Qld Primary Health Care in January of this year, and I often find that I have to explain my role as an Occupational Therapist. Occupational Therapy or O.T. has many roles to offer in supporting people young or wise within their community.

What is Occupational Therapy?

"The primary goal of occupational therapy is to enable people to participate in the activities of everyday life" (World Federation of Occupational Therapists).

Referrals can be from people across the lifespan - including infants, children, adolescents/youth, adults, and

adolescents/youth, adults, and older persons. Occupational

Therapist's work together with people in their homes, school, workplaces, and other community settings, including hospital and community health care environments.

Children often develop at different stages and while there is no right or wrong way, there can be times where one on one assistance and activities designed to improve specific areas of development are needed. Children can find the classroom environment and certain tasks overwhelming especially when there is something that is blocking their ability to carry out these tasks. Fine motor skills i.e handwriting & using scissors, along with difficulty copying from the board or book when writing i.e writing backwards or outside of the lines can be an indication of visual and or motor planning issues. Specific activities and extra time spent in these areas can assist the child to keep up with their classmates.

OT's assess and prescribe equipment such as wheelchairs, 4 wheeled walkers, and other mobility aids. We can also assess the bathroom and toilet for grab rails, or for major modifications i.e removing step over bath tub or to measure for ramps at the front or back or the house. We work alongside builders for Dept of Housing, Home Assist Secure, private contractors and equipment suppliers to ensure all recommendations for our clients are within relevant guidelines to ultimately achieve better access and safety for the person within their home.

Ergonomic assessments, return to work programs and providing strategies for managing everyday tasks in the workplace during your recovery can also be provided by an Occupational Therapist.

As case managers working in mental health the focus of our role is assisting and empowering people to manage everyday activities such as budgeting, maintaining their home environment, learning coping strategies together with social and community integration.

I hope this article has given you some insight into the role of an occupational therapist and that you keep us OT's in mind when you need a hand to keep up with everyday life.

The North West Primary Health Care team travel to Burketown with allied health staff travelling on alternating trips every three weeks. The allied health team include a Podiatrist, Psychologist, Occupational Therapist, Speech Pathologist, Physiotherapist and an Indigenous Liaison Officer. We provide individual client treatment and group health promotion activities such as health screenings and school sessions for child health.
