Message from the CEO



Hello there and welcome to the first 2010 edition of the Burke Shire Council Newsletter. I find it hard to fathom that we are in the second month of 2010 already. Really, where does the time go?

I trust you all enjoyed the delight that is Christmas and the fun of New Year. We had a quiet family Christmas here in Burketown and enjoyed every moment of it. No driving, no rush, no hassle! I have to admit I did not even see the New Year in

In this edition we have featured a round up of the Christmas happenings, recent Council decisions and a look at what the month of March holds for the Shire and our communities.

On a serious note we have already had two declared events in the Shire. The rains in early January bought some mid level flooding and road damage, while Cyclone Olga blew Burketown about a bit late in January. So while the road network has suffered to the tune of about \$14million worth of damage, there was thankfully, no loss of life or significant destruction to private property.

In the pre event preparation for Olga I was greatly impressed by our residents and staff alike who took on roles and activities to prepare our community for a possible evacuation. When Olga arrived she was a bit of a fizzer, and we had no need to leave our homes. My boys remain disappointed to this day that they did not have a sleep over at mummy's office.

In case you missed the numerous flyers and public notices issued pre Olga the three evacuation points for Burketown are: I) the Council Administration Office 2) the Police lock up 3) the toilet block at the Burketown school.

I would also like to thank Emergency Management Queensland Mount Isa office for their constant phone calls during the alert period and their follow up after the event. As it is we are still flood bound here in Burketown and with the assistance of officers and retailers I have just signed off on our first resupply operation.

We are not out of the cyclone season as yet so I would urge that those of you who need to, to make those last few preparations that might make the difference should a relative of Olga's come crashing down on us.

Another issue I would like to touch on, and ask for your assistance with, is dogs in townships. While I am a dog person and love dogs to pieces, I don't appreciate unaccompanied dogs roaming the towns causing problems for walkers, runners and push bike riders alike. Think of our kids here. Dogs are pack animals, they like to protect their patch and children can sometimes become the unfortunate victims of often serve attacks. Even if no skin is broken the psychological damage of a 'near miss' is enough to stop a child wanting to walk a certain way home from school or ride their bike down a particular street.

If your dog is unregistered and outside of your yard Council will impound the animal, hold it for several days then destroy it. I understand this will raise the ire of some people, but if Council has to choose between the personal safety of our residents and visitors, or the rights of dogs and dog owners, we will chose to put people first.

On a brighter note I am pleased to say that about 98% of Council officers attended training in January on how to manage conflict and confrontation both in the work place and in their day to day lives. The day long session was facilitated by Victoria Rose and used the Skillpath training program.

The training was well received and an eye opener to many in attendance. Council will continue to make training investments in our staff as an essential part of personal growth and professional development. While Victoria was in town we also put the office and administration support staff through their paces to become front office super stars. Councillors were also able to hone their communication skills in an afternoon workshop with Victoria.

So as we move on into and through the wet season I wish you all well and trust you will stay safe and dry over the next few months. It is lovely to see the 'green' side of the Shire as grasses, trees and shrubs burst into life, along with the amazing bird life that the wet attracts.

Council Update

Community Well-being

- The pre season meeting for the Local Disaster Management Group was held in Burketown on Tuesday 24 November 2009.
- Council has nominated Councillor Murray and a Council officer to participate on the Skytrans Air User Group.

The Environment

- The Office of Clean Energy and Burke Shire Council are progressing the Burke Shire Energy Conservation Pilot Project.
- Council has applied for a grant from The Low Carbon Diet Community Funding Program.
 This program is designed to help communities implement the Low Carbon Diet throughout their local area. This is a means of encouraging Queenslanders to work together to reduce their carbon emissions and contribute to the global climate change solution. Central to the success of the Low Carbon Diet is community members working together to motivate each other to set and reach their carbon footprint reduction goals.
- Mosquito fogging is underway in Burketown and Gregory.
- The second coordinated 1080 baiting program for Burke Shire properties was done in late 2009

The Road Network

- Graders have now completed works on TIDS Projects, Rural Maintenance and NDRA Flood Damage.
- The project at Adel's Grove is now 100% completed, having had a primer chip seal and 2 coat final seal.
- Survey data pickup for the next section of the project design work has been competed between Century Mine turn off and Big Archie Creek on Lawn Hill Road.
- Reconstruction from Big Archie Creek for 5kms has sub grade formation completed and base course is placed, a further 1km has progressed to a sub grade formation stage.
- Doomadgee Road East 5kms has sub grade formation complete and base course is in place.
- Flood Damage restoration of Bitumen surfaces on Floraville, Wills Development Road 78A, and Doomadgee Roads along with concrete flood way repairs to the Leichhardt Crossing (Floraville Road) and Gregory Crossing (Doomadgee Road) was completed towards the end of 2009.

- Rural Access Road Flood Damage restoration has been done on Morella Road with a small amount of rural maintenance funding assistance also.
- Gumbummunda Bridge received its final cosmetic touches. The new River side park amenities have been fabricated and galvanised.

Services

- Town Water Supplies are providing the normal abundance of water and operating to the required quality required for drinking water
- Gregory Raw Water pumps have been replaced.
- All parks and gardens are being maintained to satisfactory standards, the water feature in Morning Glory Park has been delayed due to appropriate resource shortages.
- Sewerage System operations are maintaining services with minimal maintenance issues.
- Aerodromes are operating satisfactorily with no issues to report.
- At the Burketown Aquatic Facility (Swimming Pool) some artificial grassing of internal areas is planned for installation soon and access rails are being made for all the pools in the complex.

- Australia Day celebrations were held on the 26 of lanuary
- 2010 Citizen of the Year was announced the recipient was Sue Clarke
- 2010 Junior Sports Person of the Year was announced – the recipient was Matthew Douglas

- In November 2009 Council adopted an Asset and Services Management Policy
- Council are currently carrying out repairs to the fire damaged house in Gregory Street, Burketown. Council are also renovating the two houses in Sloman Street to bring them back up to a suitable standard.
- Under section 236A of the Local Government Act, Council is required to make a resolution to authorise remuneration payments to Councillors each year. The Local Government Remuneration Tribunal makes a determination of remuneration levels based on the remuneration payable to a member of the Queensland Legislative Assembly. This year Councillors have chosen not to adopt the increase as set by the Remuneration Tribunal, and instead to adopt annual remuneration at the 2009 level. As such no increase in remuneration is payable to Councillors for 2010. This position was adopted in light of the current economic climate.


Economic Issues

Working with Burke Shire Council

Frequently Asked Questions and Answers

Burke Shire Council is always on the lookout for motivated and skilled people to join our workforce. Here are the answers to some common questions asked about Council and being employed by Council.

How do I get a job with Council?

If you don't see a job advertised for Council then the first step to gaining employment with Council is to fill out an employment application, get one from Council. This can then be sent to Council along with your resume and a cover letter.

If a job is advertised follow the instructions in the advertisement.

What do you want in my Resume?

Your resume does not have to be a novel, two pages is fine. State your name and current address and phone contact details. Include your work history, tell us who you have worked for, how long and what you did in that job and why you left.

If you have not worked before tell us about your education and other skills you have, like being a well organised person.

What is a cover letter?

A cover letter should be a short letter introducing yourself to Council. You can say what jobs you would be happy to do and when you are available. Always mention your contact details, phone included.

What Next ...

If you have skills that we need you will be asked to come to an

interview. This is normally with two people who already work for Council, one would be a manager. They will ask you questions about work you have done, your education and skills. You can use this time to tell us about yourself in more detail.

If you don't have the skills we are looking for you will get a letter saying thanks, but no thanks.

And Then...

Once you have your interview and if it goes well you will be placed on the casual list. The job is usually casual at first, unless you answered an advertisement for a specific job. When you are placed on the casual employment list Council will then call you when work is available. Before you do your first day you will normally have an orientation session and learn about workplace health and safety.

What might be available right now...

Right now Council would be keen to hear from people with the following skills:

- High level secretarial and administration experience
- Economic Development
- Marketing and Communications
- Payroll and HR experience
- Road Construction
- Engineering Skills
- People with Plant Operator Experience and qualifications (tickets)

What is Council like to work for?

Burke Shire Council is a small, remote local government. We operate in a small community where the efforts of Council are

highly visible and scrutinised by ratepayers and residents. Employees should understand that in many ways the work done by Council here is more obvious than in larger towns and cities because what we do is so crucial to basic expectations, like having decent roads to travel on.

Burke Shire Council is the second largest employer in the Shire and nearly everyone who lives in the Shire knows several people, if not more, who work for Council.

Burke Shire Council also takes on a much wider role in the community, given our remote location and small population base. This includes running community activities such as the Art and Craft Show, Australia Day and Anzac Day ceremonies. In an effort to attract, retain and

engage the best staff possible Council wants to be a workplace where:

- An honest day's work is the norm and highly productive people are valued.
- Extra effort is recognised and acknowledged.
- There is harmony within teams, and office politics don't rule the day.
- Officers support each other's efforts and contribute to the overall achievement of Council's commitments to the community.
- There is room for personal and professional growth.
- There is an understanding of work – life balance.
- Traditions and culture are respected.

- I. Breathe
- 2. Remain relaxed
- 3. Don't take comments personally
- 4. Mirror actions
- 5. Listen
- 6. Show empathy
- 7. Use humour gently and with caution, one person's 'funny' is another's 'not so funny'
- 8. Say 'no' diplomatically
- 9. Ask questions
- 10. Remain objective

Exhibition marks 10th anniversary of Bringing them home Report

The State Library of Queensland's travelling exhibition, Broken Links: the Stolen Generations in Queensland marks the 10th anniversary of the Bringing them home Report into Indigenous child separation and is currently on show at Burketown Library.

State Librarian Lea Giles-Peters said Broken Links explores the history of the Stolen Generations in Queensland, and the effects this had on many Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islanders over generations.

This moving exhibition portrays the history of Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islander child removal through records and documents held at the State Library and other institutions, and through five very personal stories of Aboriginal children who were removed from their families between 1930 and 1973," she said.

Lance Riley, Ruth Hegarty and Doreen Cockatoo were taken from their parents and sent to live in dormitories on missions and reserves during the 1930s and 1940s.

After years of being put under duress by officials, Pamela Croft's mother finally agreed to allow her child to be adopted in 1960.

In 1973, Sharon Kinchela and her siblings were removed from their mother and after being in institutional care for some years, were told their mother had died. It was not until 1977, when Sharon's mother was finally permitted to collect her children that they realised she was alive.

"These people and their families have agreed to share their stories in the exhibition in the hope that this history will never be repeated," said Ms Giles-Peters.

"In this exhibition you hear the personal accounts of children who

were removed and read the documents that allowed this to happen."
