Message from the Mayor



I would think that the departure of the Mash/Marshall family has left a gap, but with fond memories.

I think that the gap w a s filled comprehensively by

Rob Noble, Acting CEO and his lovely wife Veronica. Burke Shire was twice blessed with their arrival and the way in which they joined into the community. The added bonus was their kindness in using their skills in helping staff and others individually in realizing their strengths and others' strengths and a way of working together as a team. I, on behalf of the Community can only say simply 'thank you' but it is meant most sincerely. We are the richer for having got to know you.

Our very comprehensive interview process for our new CEO was the most efficient one in which we have been engaged. The very thorough process has resulted in Council welcoming Gary and Jennifer Letts to the Shire. Gary commenced as the Burke Shire CEO on the 13th of October and he and Jennifer have made a mammoth effort to arrive in Burketown. We welcome you Jennifer and Gary and look forward to a bright future full of possibilities.

The Federal elections are over, and we congratulate our long serving Federal Representative Bob Katter. An appreciation for the extraordinary efforts by Bob over those historic days of sorting which party would govern is the fact that the Prime

sent 'a warm letter to Bob Katter, saying that his North Queensland electorate of Kennedy would receive a large slice of regional funding.' Our thanks go to Bob, but the hard work is in front of us and the Shire will need to be project ready to benefit from this. A number of funding rounds have been announced including energy and health. Council will be making submissions to those. There will also be projects of regional significance which we will pursue through our regional local government body Gulf Savannah Development. The Federal organisation Regional Development Australia will play a most significant role in the future of the North-West region.

Cr Forshaw and I attended the Local Govt. Association conference in Mackay. Whilst the majority of the conference speakers focused on urban issues, in my view, there were many opportunities for us to highlight issues with the relevant departmental people and other service providers. Cr. Forshaw with her natural aptitude for technology found information regarding the digitalisation of television and financial impact on rural and remote people who will have to bear a cost in the transfer from analogue. unlike our city cousins. Roads and energy, as well as transport issues were followed up on particularly the decision on our funding for flood damage. Acting CEO Rob was able to get an answer following the information we brought home. The Shire has approval for some \$30 million of rehabilitation works on our roads. Our resolution in having callitrope declared a

weed of national significance was endorsed by Conference and will be pursued by the Local Government Association.

We have renewed our membership with Gulf Savannah Development at the meeting in Normanton in September. The open forum gave us updates on State Govt policies and programs and Cr. Forshaw and I were able to get information from several departmental people in relation to camping in the riverbed at Gregory, water issues, the Savannah Way with a potential development of a Morning Glory Festival. The energy meeting which was held on the next day had serious representation from Ergon, Office of Climate change as well as other organisations with a passion for an alternative energy provision. There are several actions which will be followed through and I am feeling very positive about the objectives being able to be achieved. Power provision for Gregory was a main topic for discussion. The next GSD meeting will be on Mornington Island next month.

Funding for some solar panels for the Burketown Kindergarten has been announced. A submission was driven by Gulf Savannah, through an energy committee that is a sub committee of GSD.

I am the spokesperson for GSD on the committee and Council's representative and I submitted the idea which was well received by the Kindergarten Executive. This project will produce some cost savings to help the Kindergarten to remain viable

Council's audit has been conducted and it is reported that the Council has been properly managed in accordance with the requirements — a very pleasing result.

I also attended the AGM of Southern Gulf Catchments with co-Director Megan Munchenberg. Megan is the Community Rep and I am the Local Government Rep. Landcare matters were discussed, the battle of weeds is well documented. SGC is looking to develop an opportunity to provide expertise for environmental impact assessments for industry, to continue to work with all industry by providing programs to work for those industries and to assist the communities, particularly volunteers to achieve environmental projects both locally and regionally.

The remainder of October and November will be equally busy with NQLGA meeting in Port Douglas where Council will debate a number of resolutions. I will let you know the outcomes in the next go round. I am also attending the MITEZ meeting as the Burke Shire Council rep which is the other regional organisation which give tremendous support to the Burke Shire residents in our campaigns of roads, energy and communications.

Copy book writing was a big hit with the kids especially trying to master the nib pen and ink. A couple of old slates with slate pens were obtained for the kids to practice on.

Thank you to Almora and Floraville station for supplying old school books, desk and a replica steam engine for the kids to see.

To see if the seniors were on their game a sum was given out to all the seniors, a simple addition but the sum was in pounds, shillings and pence. All the seniors got the answer correct however there was a small suspicion of collusion occurring.

Before lunch the Burke Shire HACC clients acted out a small skit of a typical class room day scene with their HACC Coordinator – Pam de Joux acting as the teacher, complete with cane. The clients dressed up in old school pinafores that they made. They also made replica school bags out of cardboard and did their hair in piggytails.

To top off the show, Josie Restall from Wernadinga Station played a tune on her violin. Josie was learning to play the violin over the radio through School of the Air.

Lunch was provided to all that attended and included old favorites like brawn, and desserts such as sago, junket, bread & butter and rice puddings.

After lunch the kids sat down with the seniors and asked questions about their school days. The kids got to see some old currency notes and coins that Elva Portch had saved over the years.

It was a good day had by all that attended, Seniors were the star attraction and the students had a very informative day and our Councillors got to intermingle socially with both young and old.

Vacation care programs ran in Burketown, Karumba and Normanton for the past September school holidays, with a variety of activities and skills for the children to try and enjoy. In the first week of the holidays the programs had a total of 301 children attend. This was a record for the programs.

Police Beat - Restrain your Child!

There is new legislation regarding fines for not having your child in the proper restraints while driving. Both Burketown and Doomadgee police are enforcing these rules so be aware as it could cost you \$300 or more if caught.

There is a program being run through Doomadgee Council and QAS to supply free child seat/restraints to eligible recipients. Please contact Doomadgee Council for more information.t

Some adults mistakenly believe that holding their child in their arms, or including the child in their seatbelt can prevent injuries in a crash. Your body could crush the child if they are sharing your seatbelt. The strength needed to hold a baby in a 50 kilometre per hour (km/h) crash is equivalent to lifting a large washing machine.

A guide to child restraints It is now the law for all children under seven years old to be correctly restrained according to their size and age.

Age	Indicative weight	Child restraint
0-6 months	Less than 8 kg	Rearward facing baby capsule or infant restraint
6 months- 1 year	8-12 kg	Rearward or forward facing infant restraint
6 months- 4 years	8-18 kg	Forward facing child restraint with built-in harness
4-7 years	14-26 kg	Booster seat with lap-sash H-harness or a booster seat with a secured adult seatbelt
