Message from the Mayor Annie Clarke

Global warming has really confused me now. Where are the incredible northern wet seasons and multiple cyclones which were predicted for Northern Australia? After all the 'hoo -ha' and now that the carbon tax is in there doesn't seem to be any speculation regarding the matter at all. However, a late 'wet' will be better than none at all, and we still have March in front of us. Having said that, the country is in good order and cattle are in good order.

It does go to prove that our road system is still grossly inadequate when a relatively small amount of rain fall, combined with a poor and late amount of work on our Main Road (State responsibility) resulted in the Shire having to have a resupply. If only all State Govt. Depts. were as efficient and well organized as EMQ the emergency services department!

Thanks also to Burke Shire Staff who make the resupply happen. Burke Shire is recognised State—wide for its efficiency in operations. I also thank the Councillors for being involved not only in the decision making and the setting of policy, but for being involved and visible in the Community.

It is also appreciated that some locals are taking the time and interest to attend Council meetings and can develop an appreciation of the variety and volume of the Shire's deliberations, which has resulted in the progress and financial stability of our Shire. Council encourages everyone to take the opportunity to get the exposure to the decision-making process, so you get the facts first hand, and you don't have to speculate on the suppositions of the uninformed views that get bandied about.

Some work has been started on the roads and Councillors and staff have been busy with forward planning for the 'dry' season. Thanks to one and all for keeping the

Shire moving, particularly now that an organisational timetable and stability has been achieved, and our local Staff are now in the position of giving the best advice so that proper planning is achieved, and with a clear budget framework to work to. An internal engineering audit is being conducted currently; it is an independent report card on process and practices, but it does give clear indications of what is working well and recommendations for improvements. All Local Governments are required to conduct independent audits across the whole of their operations.



There are interesting times ahead; planning for events including ANZAC day, Gregory Downs Jockey Club Races over the May weekend which has Family orientated theme and a well funded program, the Order of the Outback Ball at the end of June and the 90h anniversary of the CWA. Meetings have been well attended with plenty of fresh faces at the table and some fabulous ideas. Willing volunteers have put their hands up to take on various tasks to help out, and the Staff has responded brilliantly to the extra roles they have taken on. It is satisfying to be involved in all these works in progress. The beautifully bound and restored Cemetery Register is back with us and is splendid. Work is progressing on documenting names, GPS positions of graves and repair of the headstones, and the experts in this area will be in the Shire soon to complete the works in Gregory and Burketown. If anyone has any additional information on any burial sites in the Shire could you please contact the Shire Office so our records are as comprehensive as possible.

From the Acting Chief Executive Officer's Desk

This is my first article since being appointed as Acting Chief Executive Officer in November 2011 and there has been a lot of hard work and long hours put in by your Council and staff to overcome past practices and move forward for the betterment of the community we serve and the assets controlled.

Council has been subjected to increased scrutiny over the last couple of months and I wish to allay any fears and comments circulating within our community that past practices in no way reflect the current operations of Council. Council has had to take some serious action to cease those past practices, when their suspicions were confirmed, and are now moving forward in accordance with current legislation and industry standards.

Council is investigating the re-transmission of TV services in Burketown and Gregory so that our community maintains control and is not subject to exorbitant maintenance charges.

Council recognises the need for additional residential blocks to be made available to our community and as such has called tenders for the sale of 5 Council owned vacant blocks of land so as to give our residents the opportunity to purchase and build a residence on these blocks.


Council has been approached numerous times over recent periods by persons enquiring about industrial land and to this extent and realising that Council's Town Plan needs to be reviewed next year Council has agreed to the conduct of a land use study which will allow for the identification of suitable land for industrial business and residential within our two townships.

Council has received positive feedback from its 2012 Australia Day Ambassador, Ms Alison Alexander who expressed appreciation for the way Alison was received into and treated by our Community. Alison was impressed by the way the Day was organised and I wish to congratulate all members of our community who were involved. I also congratulate all the recipients of the Australia Day Awards.

Council is becoming increasingly concerned at the way the public toilets in Morning Glory Park and at the Airport are being used and abused and has decided that the doors will be locked from 6pm to 6am each day in order to ensure our staff are not subjected to the filthy condition that the toilets are being left in by some persons within our Community. Should this practice continue then there will be no alternative than to close the toilets. I ask for your support to ensure that the toilets are not left in the conditions that have been experienced over recent times. The Police have been informed and will take action if the culprits are detained. The swimming pool is locked from 8.00pm till 7.00am because of the actions of some people. I wish to remind the users of the pool there are conditions applicable to the use and should there be anyone found to be disregarding these conditions then further action will be taken. The facilities are provided for the enjoyment and use by everyone so please do not let your actions mean that the facilities will not be available to everyone.

Council would like to thank Skytrans for their co-operation in producing the Burke Shire Newsletter quarterly and for their continued support to the community organisations in the gulf.

Burketown Barramundi Restocking Facility

On the weekend of 18 &19 Feb 2012 an estimated 10,000 barramundi fingerlings were transported by boat from the GBRA Hatchery at Karumba to Burketown. These fish have been placed in the grow-out tanks at Burketown where they will be raised to a larger size prior to being released into the Albert River. The fish will be released progressively, because as their size increases the holding capacity of the tanks will reduce and the numbers will need to be kept at an optimal level.

For those who are interested it is intended to hold an open day at the Grow-out Facility in the near future so you can come along to see firsthand how the operation works and perhaps learn more about the signature fish species of our area. This event will be advertised locally through normal channels.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Council, VMR and all volunteers for helping transport and care for the fish to date and I would also like to invite anybody who would like to volunteer their time to help with the operation of the Grow-out Facility to contact me for a spot on the work roster.



Gregory Landcare

The Gregory River Landcare Group has a busy year planned for 2012. We have recently applied for funding from a few different sources and aim to undertake another weed eradication project in and around the town camping zone and over the extensive area of the Gregory town Common. We will be partnering with Burke Shire Council to undertake this project.

We are going to assist Southern Gulf Catchments with a large scale aerial and ground survey of the Gregory River from Riversleigh, heading north along the river. This will result in a better and accurate mapped record of the distribution and density of weeds on the Gregory River. And will allow us as a group to plan and coordinate projects and on ground work with landholders, and other stakeholders to ensure the long term sustainability and protection of the Gregory River.

Weeds the Landcare Group will target include Rubber Vine, Belly Ache Bush, Parkinsonia and Mesquite. We are looking forward to a productive and busy year ahead.

CWA Recipes

Mango Fruit Cake

Ingredients

1x 425g can of mango slices in natural juice (I just measured out the equivalent fresh – used really ripe/bruised ones so that there was lots of juice falling in the bowl and also helped them break up when boiling so no real mango pieces in the cake just flavour and moisture)

500g dried missed fruit

- $^{1\!/_{\!2}}$ cup water (added a little extra to allow for not as much juice)
- $1\,\,{}^{1}\!/_{\!2}$ tspns bicarb soda
- 1 ½ cup SR Flour
- 2 lightly beaten eggs

<u>Method</u>

Grease a loaf pan and line with baking paper.

Combine mango, mixed fruit and water in a large pan. Bring slowly to the boil and simmer uncovered for a couple of minutes, cool.

Add in lightly beaten eggs and stir to combine and then add bicarb soda.

Lastly quickly stir in sifted flour and pour mix into prepared pan.

Cook in mod slow oven 160° for about an hour or until cooked (check after about 30 mins).

Yummy!

Mango Jam

Ingredients

10 mangoes – nicely coloured but firm

- 2 cups water
- 4 cups sugar

<u>Method</u>

Skin mangoes, cut flesh from seeds and dice. Need about 4 heaped cupfuls. Add water and boil for 15 mins,

Add sugar and continue to boil for another 20-30 mins.

Test to see if jellies on a cold saucer. Bottle while warm.

Mango Weis Bars

Boil 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups sugar + 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups water for 5 min or until starting to thicken. Chop and blend 2.5kg mangoes until smooth.

Add cooled sugar mixture and 2tbsp lemon juice to pureed mangoes.

Save 2 cups of mango mixture and add to 600mls thickened cream.

Put mango mixture in big tray (I used large baking tray) and freeze this layer.

Pour cream mixture over top and freeze.

Slice into bars and eat!

Regulated dogs

The Animal Management (Cats and dogs) Act 2008 introduced a state wide approach to the declaration and control of dangerous, menacing and restricted dogs, collectively designated as regulated dogs on 1 st July 2009.

The act outlines conditions for keeping regulated dogs including requirements for enclosures, muzzling and effective control in public.

A state wide regulated dog register has been established by the Department of infrastructure and Planning for local governments to more effectively manage and monitor regulated dogs.

In Queensland there are three types of regulated dogs:

- · Dangerous dogs
- Menacing dogs
- $\cdot \operatorname{Restricted} \operatorname{dogs}$

Dangerous dogs

A dog that has attacked a person or animal or has behaved in a threatening manner can be reported to the local council and may – after assessment by an authorised local government officer – be declared dangerous.

Dangerous dogs must be microchipped, wear an ID tag, be kept in a prescribed enclosure with a sign, be kept under effective control, be desexed and wear a muzzle in public.

Menacing dogs

If you know of a dog that shows menacing behaviour you can report it to your local council. After assessing its behaviour the authorised local government officer can declare it as a menacing dog.

Menacing dogs must be microchipped, wear an ID tag, be kept in a prescribed enclosure with a sign and be kept under effective control.

Restricted dogs

A restricted dog declaration can only be made if the local government is satisfied the dog is of a breed prohibited from importation into Australia under the Customs Act 1901.

A local government can also prohibit certain breeds (or cross breeds) of dogs in the local government area under a local law. The decision to make such a law is at the discretion of each local government.

To ensure the safety of the community, owners of regulated dogs are required to meet certain conditions.

Restricted dogs must be microchipped, wear an ID tag, and be kept in a prescribed enclosure with a sign, be kept under effective control, be desexed, wear a muzzle in public and have a permit issued by council.

Requirements for regulated dog enclosures

The regulated dog must- unless there is a reasonable excuse – be usually kept in the enclosure, which must:

(a) Be child proof

(b) Stop the dog from leaving the enclosure

(c) Must not be built or situated in a way that requires a member of the public seeking access to the front entrance of a dwelling house to go into the enclosed area

(d) Must be at least 10 square metres and can not include any area that is a swimming pool or area surrounding a swimming pool or all or part of a building usually used for residential purposes

(e) The walls of the enclosure must be at least 1M high above ground (if the dog is 8kg or less) or at least 1.8 M high above ground level (if the dog is more than 8 kg)

(f) The enclosure must be made of firm and strong materials.

(g) The walls may include a perimeter fence for the revelant place or an exterior wall of a structure if it complies with the enclosure requirements.

(h) The enclosure must include a weatherproof area appropriate for a dog.

(i) The enclosure must include a gate and must not have a vehicle entry gate

(j) The gate must be childproof, self-closing and self-latching and comply with the other enclosure requirements

(k) The enclosure may have another gate that is not self-closing and self-latching if it is not a vehicle gate and complies with the requirements for the enclosure walls and is kept securely locked whenever it is not in immediate use

(I) A sign/notice must be placed at or near each entrance to the place where the dog is usually kept notifying the public that a regulated dog is kept there

Review and appeal

If you receive a regulated dog declaration notice you can apply to your council for an internal review of the decision. You also have the right of appeal to the Queensland Animal and Administrative Tribunal if you are not satisfied with the internal review.
