Burketown Health Clinic Opening

The new \$3.95 million Burketown Primary Health Clinic is officially open for business following a visit by Queensland Health Minister Lawrence Springborg.

The Burketown Primary Health Clinic project comprises a new clinic building with an adjoining new four-bedroom residence for the Director of Nursing and a separate adjoining one-bedroom unit for relieving staff.

"The new clinic includes a resuscitation room, two consultation rooms, reception and waiting area, an undercover ambulance bay as well as various utility and storage rooms and staff offices," Mr Springborg said.

He said Burketown was the second new primary health clinic to be officially opened in the North West this year. The \$2.41 million Dajarra Primary Health Clinic was officially opened in February.

Both the Dajarra and Burketown project were funded through Queensland Health's \$297.5 million Area Health Services Demand Management Program. Mr Springborg said Queensland Health was committed to delivering improved health services to North West Queensland residents.

"All these works that are under way in this region, are a clear indication of Queensland Health's commitment to delivering quality services to all residents of the North West," he said.

"We recognise that the increasing demand for health services is a decentralised State like Queensland requires the expansion of health care services so more patients can get treatment closer to their homes."

Mr Springborg also visited the Cloncurry, Mount Isa and Mornington Island hospitals on the tour day tour of North West Queensland.

At Cloncurry he saw progress on the 6.86 million, 10-bed, residential aged care facility at the local hospital, due to be completed in early 2013. Mount lsa's hospital is currently more than half-way through a 65.2 million redevelopment.

Message from the Mayor Ernie Camp

The storm season is once again upon us. There have been some good falls accompanied by good lightning strikes and so fires. Now is a good time to do a good back yard cleanup — in preparation for further storms, cyclones and mosquitoes.

It has been great to see the bitumen making its way towards Burketown. By the end of 2013 we should have bitumen access all the way to town thus reducing the periods cut off over the Wet and improving the community's wellbeing. It has been a long time coming and I thank all levels of government for their efforts in the last couple of years to make this a reality.

Our roadworks staff have been hard at work on the local roads ensuring they are in as good a shape as possible in the lead up to the Wet. The Parks and Gardens are also looking great and I often hear compliments on the green and clean spaces in both Burketown and Gregory. The office staff have also been toiling away ensuring that all legislative requirements are met and sourcing all available funding opportunities.

With the imminent closure of MMG Century and the impact this will have on the region I welcome the decision by the State Government to allow the recommencement of uranium mining. Given the potential resource reserves within our Shire this may be the potential opportunity to fulfil some of the gap left by the shutdown of Century and maintain jobs and investment in our region.

The Shire has seen the official opening of the new Burketown Health Centre by the Minister for Health Mr Lawrence Springborg and Paul Woodhouse Chair of NW Hospital Board and the opening of the revamped Gregory Health Clinic by Dr Don Bowley OAM. Both these facilities will now offer greater opportunities to access allied health professionals closer to home.

The new facilities are wonderful – they are a great asset but not as great as the staff these assets were built to support. After two recent incidents involving 10 stitches, 3 missing teeth, a busted lip and an evacuation I can personally vouch for the usefulness of the new clinic and the fantastic nursing care provided in Burketown.

I was honoured to be made chair of Gulf Savannah Development (GSD). Even though this takes more of my time away from my family and business, and is an added responsibility, I think it is worth it. I believe the Gulf's strength lies in regional unity — we do have common problems but not always common solutions. However, together we have a better chance to achieve the best possible outcome for the majority.



Recently Council provided the community with the opportunity to see "Chasing the Lollyman". It was an enjoyable play and Council hopes to be able to provide further cultural opportunities in the future.

Council is also busy, along with community volunteers, organising this year's Community Christmas in the Park event. I look forward to seeing you and your families in December for an evening of carols, the jolly man in the red suit and relaxation in the Morning Glory Park.

Congratulations to the Gregory/ Lawn Hills SES Group who were announced as the State winner of this year's Unit/Group of the Year and awarded the Director General's Cup.

It is great to see a remote area group recognised for the hard work they do in often trying weather conditions and without the infrastructure/service backups eg mobile phones that many others are able to utilise.

From the Chief Executive Officer's Desk John Page

Where has the year 2012 gone and where are we heading in 2013 I ponder in writing this article.

A new era is underway in Burke Shire with the encouragement and assistance with business development following the upgrading of MR78A, Burketown to Gregory Downs Road. The potential for additional businesses in both Burketown and Gregory Downs will provide an immense benefit not only to our community but all that transgress our Shire.

Whilst recognising that there are differing views on Uranium mining Council sees the immense benefit to our Shire through these mining ventures. The availability of shale gas and the potential for the provision of additional power supplies will also provide benefits to our community

Council recognises that without available land for both residential and industrial development the potential for additional business and growth is curtailed. You would be aware of the prices paid for land at the recent auction conducted and Council is working with Native Title Groups so that more land can be released and prices will stabilise.

In order to improve the facilities available to our community Council has been successful in obtaining a grant of \$1 million from the State Government for a Community Centre incorporating a new hall, library and disaster coordination centre utilising Council chambers and building onto and utilising the existing administration building.

Council has made application for the required licences to retransmit digital television to Burketown and it is believed that the decision should be known in February. Investigations and quotes are being obtained for similar services to Gregory Downs.

There have been the following staff movements:

Mr Neil Klemola commences as Works Manager on 2nd January, 2012. Neil comes to Burke Shire from South Australia with a wealth of experience in the private sector and

new ideas to work with Council in the provision of new Burke Shire infrastructure whilst maintaining existing infrastructure. Council is committed to ensuring the infrastructure is maintained to the required level and not let run down

Ms Kahleela Marshall, Ms Nakischa McKean, Mr Earl Marshall and Mr Jeremy Booth have commenced duties also.

A new Enterprise Bargain Agreement has been developed and will be voted on by staff next week. The Agreement, whilst a long time coming, will be of benefit to the Shire by increased productivity and efficiency gains identified by staff and management. One of these measures has been the closing of the cross strip at the Burketown Airport.

Council is exploring other ways of increased productivity and efficiency gains with the Value for Money concept. Council believes that there will be savings which will ensure the sustainability of Burke Shire Council.

Council's Annual Report for 2011/2012 has been adopted and is available for viewing on Council's website and I recommend it to all residents as it gives an overview of Council's operations and achievements during the year.

In closing I thank the Mayor, Councillors and staff for the support and assistance in 2012 and look forward to an exciting year in working with Council and staff in leading Burke Shire into the future and extend best wishes to everyone for a safe and enjoyable festive season.

From the Burke Shire Ranger's Desk

Use of SODIUM FLUOROACETATE (1080) to Control wild dogs, feral pigs and feral cats in the Burke Shire.

Burke Shire Council like all Local Government authorities are responsible under the Land Protection (Pest and stock Route Management) Act 2002 to ensure that a responsible and effective Pest Management plan is in place to target priorities for pest management of declared pests identified within the Shire

Land owners also have an obligation under the Act to take reasonable steps to keep land free of declared pests unless the owners hold declared pest permits allowing the pests to be kept on their land ie. deer farming.

As part of Councils activities in the management of declared pests together with local pastoral property owners/managers, under take coordinated 1080 baiting campaigns twice a year to control Wild dogs, Feral pigs and Feral cats in the Burke Shire.

These campaigns are also coordinated with baiting in neighbouring shires to get a more consistent coverage and to maximize baiting results. Baits are injected at three central baiting points within the shire.

Burke Shire council's second round of 1080 baiting for 2012 concluded on the 5th of November, during which a total of 6650 kg of meat was injected.

Properties that have participated in the baiting program will have warning signs posted at all points of entry to their property.


Adult Book of the Month

The friendship that develops between these three women, who meet in the strangely beautiful but desolate landscape of the opal fields, helps them resolve and come to terms with the next stage of their story.


Non-Fiction Book of the Month

In 'More Chook Wisdom' you can expand on your knowledge, inspiration and ideas for keeping chooks.


There's natural health care, tips on chook pens to build or buy, and best of all, loads of user experiences from people living the chook lifestyle right here and now.



Burke Shire School Updates

Burketown State School

Burketown State School has established a productive partnership through the "XO-OLPC Project this year, with Doomadgee State School. One Laptop Per Child is a National initiative to put internet enabled laptops into the hands of students in remote parts of Australia.

Doomadgee students have travelled to Burketown this year to lend their expertise as "XO Champions and Mechanics". The XO Laptop program has taken off at Burketown State School this year, with all students finally receiving their laptops.

XO Mechanics not only possess all the skills necessary to competently operate the laptops, but furthermore have the skills and knowledge necessary to reinstall software, replace screens and keyboards and run hardware tests to diagnose problems. This in turn gives these students the opportunity for pathways into higher education and employment that they did not have exposure to a few years ago.

The first "XO Mechanics" from Burketown State School have been selected to complete the training based on attendance, behaviour and quality work in the classroom. These students will take the skills and expertise they have learnt today and pass it on down to all the students at Burketown through peer tutoring.

The peer tutoring between students at Doomadgee and Burketown State School is also impacting on the skills and confidence of Doomadgee State School students. Neil Ewing, who has successfully trained many of the XO Mechanics at Doomadgee State School, says that "not only is it a great partnership between the schools, it is also great relationship building for our students. Our students form great friendships through the coaching of their skills and in turn become more confident with their own ability."

Former Assistant Director General for Indigenous Education and Training, Mr Ian Mackie, who is currently working with both schools on attendance and leadership strategies, says "this is a wonderful partnership that is seeing students in the remotest part of the state using cutting edge technology."

The XO Laptop project is establishing and consolidating partnerships with schools where distance and remoteness have always been issues.

The students from our school who have completed their training will receive certificates and an XO toolkit on a school parade in the weeks to come.




Gregory Landcare

Burketown Barramundi Restocking Facility

Through a Memorandum of Understanding between the Burke Shire Council and the Burketown Barramundi Fishing Organisation Inc., I am happy to report a successful season of rearing barramundi fingerlings obtained from the Gulf Barramundi Restocking Association hatchery at Karumba for release into our local waters.

With the generous help of many volunteers and the financial support of the Council, approximately 5,000 barramundi fingerlings were raised over a period of about three months from as small as 2cm weighing only a few grams up to 22.5cm and 130+grams before they were released into the Albert River.

The fingerlings were released over the two weekends of 29th April and 4th May into the Albert River making the brackish water at the Eight Mile their new home.

I would like to take this opportunity to convey my sincere thanks to all those volunteers, the Council and the VMR for supporting this project and we look forward to another successful season next year.



Home & Community Care Update

Our meetings are held at the CWA/Sports ground in Gregory every second Thursday on Clinic Day weather permitting.

Our first two meetings bought us one new client with another possible one early next year. A visit into Bidunngu sparked interest in what HACC does in communities and although there were no eligible clients at present, I will be calling regularly and keeping them up to date on what's happening.

With the wet season fast approaching and roads becoming messy, the meetings at Gregory will be held over until next year. The clients that we have out there will be kept in touch by regular phone calls and sent DVD's/ audio books and crafts to keep them occupied throughout the wet months.

Gregory Health Clinic Redevelopment

On the 2nd of June at 3pm the people of Gregory Downs and surrounding region came together to open the Redevelopment of the Gregory Health Clinic. Over 70 attended to mark the event. The MC was Sue Clarke who introduced RFDS Senior Medical Officer Dr Don Bowley who delivered a speech retracing the history of the clinic and thanked all the organisations and people who supported the project.

The building was then opened by Gregory CWA Clinic Coordinator Tracy Forshaw. Local Member Rob Katter and Burke Shire Council Mayor Ernie Camp then congratulated the community on their achievement. The building was then blessed by Sister Irene followed by the official cake cutting.

The original clinic building was officially opened on the 17th August 1996 by the Reverend Fred MacKay who was the Reverend John Flynn's successor as Superintendent of the Australian Inland Mission. The building consisted of a small donga with 2 consulting rooms, a small toilet and an old generator which was erected thanks to the support of Qld Health and Burke Shire Council.

At that time it was decided to name the clinic building after the legendary Qld RFDS Doctor Tim O'Leary (1925-1987). He joined the RFDS in 1953 and tragically later that year his first wife Renee was killed in an RFDS aircraft accident which also seriously injured him. Undeterred following his recovery he continued to work for the RFDS and cared for the people of Queensland's outback for the next 27 years working from RFDS bases in Cloncurry, Mount Isa, Charleville, Cairns, and Charters Towers. So when it came to naming the redeveloped building it was decided unanimously that it would remain the Tim O'Leary Building in his memory.

By 2009 the building was showing its age and leaked in the wet season and was too small to accommodate the increasing number of health providers wishing to service the people of Gregory and Bidunggu.

The Gregory CWA and RFDS decided to address this problem and with the wonderful support of the Australian Government, Qld Government, many organisations, and the people of Gregory the building was successfully redeveloped. The redeveloped Tim O'Leary Building has 4 air-conditioned



consulting rooms, a kitchenette, a toilet with access for disabled people, a great covered waiting area, and a brand new modern generator.

Turn heat to low and simmer uncovered 10 mins or until mix reduces and thickens. Add 2 teaspoons brown sugar and 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar. Stir until sugar dissolves. Season with salt and pepper and serve hot.

Roma Quiche

Ingredients: 3 grated zucchini, 1 large chopped onion, 3 rashers bacon, chopped. 1 cup grated cheese, 1 cup sr flour, half cup oil, 5 eggs beaten, salt, pepper, mustard.

Method: Combine all ingredients and pour into a well greased dish (16cm x 26 cm). Put in oven for 30 - 40 minutes.

On the first of March this year Queensland Transport increased the penalties for learner drivers. If you drive a vehicle as a Learner without a supervisor the demerit points have increase from 1 to 4.

Learner drivers also no longer have the option of a good driving behaviour period.

This means learners driving without a supervisor:

- Will have their licenses suspended for three months.
- If you accumulate 4 or more demerit points in a 12 month period your license will be suspended for 3 months.
- As a result the date that the learner can apply for their provisional license will be delayed.

A Supervisor is any person who has held an open license for the class of vehicle the person is learning to drive for a least one year.

The School has a speed restricted School Zone on Beames Street. The speed limit is 40km during the hours of 7am to 9am and 2pm to 4pm. Please be mindful of your speed during this time.
