Australia Day in Burketown



The community of Burke Shire celebrated Australia Day with a jam packed program, starting with a cricket match in the morning, with Mark "Spiegel" Judge taking out the Man of the Match trophy.

The cricket was followed by a Car Rally, with over 15 teams trying to solve a series of cryptic clues which lead them to all manner of destinations in and around Burketown.

The Rally raised plenty of money for the local Kindergarten. The major prize was taken out by Cameron Ketchup and Kahleela Marshall, who cruised past the other contenders by collecting special bonus points for spotting and gathering Australian Flags that were planted in locations around Burketown.

After the last of the lost Rally Drivers returned, residents and visitors assembled at the Council office for the Australia Day Flag Raising Ceremony, where Mayor Cr. Ernie Camp addressed the importance of flying the Aboriginal and Torres Straight Island Flags alongside the Australian Flag on Australia Day as a means of recognising the past and the promise of the future:

"We should take advantage of the opportunity provided by Australia Day to look at the past, acknowledge it and learn from it but do so only briefly for we don't have the luxury of time to ponder. We need to firmly keep both eyes on the road ahead to ensure our future actions leave a better tomorrow and bring a strong community for our youth for our destiny lies with them."

Council has made a submission to the Joint Select Committee on North Australia White Paper with a view to highlighting the potential of our Shire and the North as a whole with particular emphasis on the need for infrastructure to meet our current and emerging needs — infrastructure such as power, communication, roads, education and health — to ensure future sustainability and enable the fulfilment of identified potential.

GSD also put in a submission on behalf of its members that reiterated many of the points in our Submission. As Chair of GSD I, along with the CEO and Deputy Chair of GSD, have been involved, alongside MITEZ and key major local industry representatives in North West Qld Strategic Development Study meetings over the past year.

There is a workshop coming up on 11 March in Mt Isa at we will be looking at the submissions and comments made during the information gathering sessions and then prioritising and narrowing the focus of regional development requirements.

This in turn will create a final robust document that highlights the region's potential and identifies requirements to meet that potential. The target audience will be government and commercial investors.



Gulf Savannah Development (GSD) is entering an exciting new era. It has just appointed a new CEO and is transitioning its office back to the Gulf region.

The Small Business Advisory Service is continuing its good work supporting Gulf businesses and I know Annie has plans for a visit and workshop in the coming months.

Council has resolved that over the next four years it will seal from Doomadgee back to the Northern Territory border.

We are also seeking to engage with our Local Government counterparts over the border regarding sealing on the NT side as well with the relevant NT Minister to develop mutually beneficial relationships.

Planning for the new Community Hub is well underway with contracts awarded. Weather permitting the new building should be complete by the end of Winter.

The new building will incorporate a new hall, meeting rooms a coordination centre for local disaster management and offices suitable for use by visiting professionals. It is going to be a piece of infrastructure the whole community can use and be proud to have ownership of.

As always I am available should you wish to speak with me regarding Council matters and I am often in town at the Council office if you would like to speak with me in person.

I wish you all the best for the coming months and look forward to seeing you and sharing my great barra stories – and not about the ones that got away!

Burke Shire Council Update

COMMUNITY WELL-BEING

The pre season meeting for the Local Disaster Management Group was held in Burketown on Wednesday, 20th November, 2013 and the LDMG was stood up and met on Monday, 3rd February, 2014 when Tropical Cyclone Fletcher threatened.

Council will be making a submission to the Department of Transport who are presently calling tenders for regional airline routes including Burketown. Council will be raising issues such as subsidised fares and eligibility, reintroduction of User Group Meeting etc.

Council has to commence a major review of its Town Planning Scheme. Council has installed flood cameras at the Beames Brook and Gregory River (Tirranna) Crossings and these will be linked to Council's website.

THE ENVIRONMENT

Mosquito fogging and misting was carried out in the latter part of 2013 and will recommence in both Burketown and Gregory shortly. A coordinated 1080 baiting program for Burke Shire properties was done in late 2013

Council is organising quotations for an initial clean-up of the Burketown Landfill. This will be the first stage in a progressive plan to reach full compliance.

THE ROAD NETWORK

Council staff completed the seal of approximately 10kilometres of Doomadgee West Road from the Northern Territory border east in the latter part of 2013; The restoration of flood damage in 2012 and 2013 has been completed. Assessment of damage following Tropical Cyclone Fletcher will be assessed when staff can carry out inspections.

Maintenance works continue on Camooweal Road. Gregory to Lawn Hill Road. Maintenance grades have been conducted on all shire roads and when the weather permits opening grades will commence; Council assisted Doomadgee Aboriginal Shire Council with road and street sealing works.

SERVICES

Town Water Supplies are providing the normal abundance of water and operating to the required quality for drinking water — an upgrade to the Burketown Water Treatment Plant will occur shortly. An extension of land has been applied for the Gregory Water Treatment Plant and the plan is for two (2) extra tanks to ensure at least 4 days supply should a malfunction occur.

All parks and gardens are being maintained to a satisfactory standard; Sewerage System operations are maintaining services with minimal maintenance issues; Aerodromes are operating satisfactorily with no issues to report; Aquatic Centre working well however patronage has been down due to weather. Trees and shrubs will be planted at the Burketown Cemetery in the upcoming program — Council is embarking on a program for the placement of plaques and the identification of graves at the cemetery as well as the upgrade of the notice board. Town Entrance signs will be installed on the approaches to Burketown and Gregory in the coming months.

Council accepted the tender of Richardson Builders for the design and construct of the new Community Hub to be constructed in Sloman Street. Work is scheduled for completion by the end of August, 2014.

Negotiations are being held between the Traditional Owners and State Government on land tenure issues.

COUNCILLOR TRAVEL FOR DELEGATIONS, MEETINGS & TRAINING

Councillor Camp and Poole attended Gulf Savannah Development Inc meeting. Councillor Camp attended the North West Strategy Meeting. Councillors will be attending an Elected Members Update at Normanton on 13th March, 2014. Council is planning to hold consultation sessions in relation to Water Rates.

WATER RATES

Burke Shire Council, after consultation with Government departments and a ratings specialist, will introduce a two-part water tariff with a connection fee commencing on July the 1st, 2014.

In implementing this system, Council seeks to balance the tension between a) the abundance of available water in/around Burketown and Gregory; and b) the extremely high costs of treating water in a remote environment.

The introduction of this new system is an important component of Council's plan to place downward pressure on water rates by reducing treatment costs and water usage at the same time as Council and residents maintain Burketown and Gregory as green oases within the Gulf.

How can this be achieved? Council will be sending out more information on projected water bills for all residents and businesses shortly and conducting public consultations on water usage and the new rating structure very soon.

On the supply side, Council is looking at ways to reduce the \$p/kL (kilolitre) cost of treating water through better strategies around freight and the delivery of treatment inputs, employing more efficient treatment technology and through improved asset management.

In terms of water use by Council and residents, the aim will be to find a more efficient balance between water usage and keeping the townships green and beautiful.

The event was a great marketing tool for the community resulting in publicity for the Shire. The event celebrated the local community as well as the sealing of the road from Gregory to Burketown.

The Event incorporated live music, the Burketown Gift running-race, the 'Burketown rap song' – as performed by the State School children – and a range of stalls and presentations by the SES, the CWA, the Kindy and the Lands Council (CLCAC).

Gregory River Landcare Group Who we are and what we do...

Gregory River Landcare Group (GRLG) was formed in May 2006 through a "twinning" partnership with the Bulimba Creek Catchment Group (B4C) from South-east QLD. B4C supported the establishment of the GRLG by sharing members' skills and knowledge as well as providing moral support. Southern Gulf Catchments also supported the fledging group and a close relationship has existed between the three groups ever since.

Early projects focussed on community based initiatives including:

- 'Healthy food gardens' established at each school within the Gregory River Catchment-the gardens are maintained annually with support from SGC.
- Four editions of 'dream river calendar' were produced with contributions from the children of Gregory, Doomadgee and Burketown.
- Fishing clinics for local school children.

More recent projects have expanded to target catchment scale issues including:

- Multiple projects controlling weeds along the Gregory River in partnership with the Burke Shire Council, Century environment Committee, Southern Gulf Catchments and local landholders.
- Installing a 'Dump Ezy' at Adels Grove to prevent the illegal dumping of caravan toilet waste into the river.
- Native tree plantings around the Gregory community oval.
- Hosting a 'Gains from Grazing' workshop for local producers.

Membership of the GRLG is increasing and includes the pastoral sector, local business and local government. GRLG believe that working together with local communities, encouraging participation and educating people on the importance of our environment will lead to a better, more sustainable future for generations to come.

"Our goal is to increase the skills and knowledge in our remote communities so we can work together and protect our unique environment."

The Remote Jobs & Communities Program reflects the Government's view that everyone who can work should work. Remote job seekers are given personalised support to build their skills and get a job.

Those who cannot get a job participate in meaningful activities that contribute to their community and improve the job seekers work readiness. The program also helps remote-area employers to meet their workforce needs and supports communities in remote Australia to plan and build a better future.

There are 60 regions across Australia the RJCP is delivered in and each region has a single provider work with individuals, communities and local employers to help more people into jobs and build stronger communities. The program is for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous job seekers in remote Australia.

The RCJP has responsibility for services previously delivered under Job Services Australia, Disability Employment Services, Community Development Employment Projects (CDEP) and the Indigenous Employment Program.

The provider for Burketown and Gregory is Bynoe Community Advancement Co-Operative Society who are based in Normanton and also service Karumba and Croydon. Bynoe CACS was originally established to provide affordable housing to local Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander people. They became incorporated on the 29th October 1979 and are governed by a board of Directors.

Bynoe CACS continues to provide quality housing as well as delivering several other community-orientated services and businesses which include RJCP, Labour Hire, Training, an Arts Centre and Normanton Traders. For more info on Bynoe services and businesses visit the website at www.bynoecacs.org.au

Tonya Murray is Bynoe's Officer permanently based in Burketown who works out of the Moungibi complex in Bowen Street and makes regular visits to Gregory. Since starting in late 2013 Burketown the RJCP team have been mainly undertaking yard maintenance at various properties around town.

We are particularly happy to be assisting the Burketown Kindergarten with regular maintenance to keep it looking nice and safer for the kids.

The team at Gregory will soon be starting a project to fence the Cemetery at Bidunggu and possibly establishing a park for the kids and the community.

The ultimate goal is to find employment for people, however for those that aren't successful in finding work, they need to be completing training, volunteering in the community, undertaking work experience or participating in projects or activities that are arranged through Bynoe.

In 2014 we hope to work closely with all facets of the community and team up with various organisations to broaden our scope of works and contribute positively to growth in our area.

Young Gulf Trainees to Benefit

Young Gulf people in traineeships at Century Mine, including those from the Burke Shire, will benefit from the mine's new approach to trainee placements.

As Century approaches the end of open-cut zinc production in mid-2015, it has adopted a trainee employment strategy that will reduce reliance that young Gulf people have on the mine for employment, while still providing opportunities that appeal to their strengths and preferences.

Several recent graduates of Century's Work Ready, Job Ready Program at Myuma near Camooweal have been placed with host employers locations as diverse as Townsville, Cloncurry, Normanton and Camooweal. Century continues to pay trainees' wages even when they are placed with host employers.

The Work-Ready Program-is a-partnership between the Queensland Government and Century. The Government funds the training component of the course and Century pays participant's wages, living expenses and employs five full time employees to support trainees and apprentices.

Members of Century's Training team will be visiting local job networks

over the next weeks to discuss opportunities for future placements in local communities. While 17 trainees and apprentices completed their studies during 2013, Century still has more than 60 trainees and apprentices across its Lawn Hill and Karumba sites and in community-based employment.

Indigenous Fire & Weed Project

LATE SEASON RUBBER VINE WORK

Carpentaria Land Council Aboriginal Corporation (CLCAC) and Burke Shire Council are excited to announce a new 'Indigenous Fire & Weed Management Project' taking place in the lower Gulf.

The project is designed to create a collaborative early-season fire management regime across the Gulf Savannah to improve biodiversity, reduce fuel loads and maintain fire breaks. Weeds of National Significance (WoNS), such as Rubber Vine, Prickly Acacia and Parkinsonia will be targeted using chemicals and prescribed late season burning to reduce their impact on pastoral productivity and natural assets.

The 'Indigenous Fire and Weed Management Project' has been funded for four years and brings together a range of experienced partners; including CLCAC GangaliddaGarawa ranger group, the Qld Rural Fire Service, Biosecurity Qld, Southern Gulf Catchment and Burke Shire Council. Over the four years of the projects' duration major outcomes are anticipated, including:

- The control of WoNS, particularly Rubber Vine, through a reduction in the extent of weeds in the project area.
- Active management of the containment line for Rubber Vine and strategic outlier infestations, halting the encroachment of Rubber Vine into the Northern Territory.
- The protection of pasture and biodiversity values across the landscape through the prevention of the spread of wildfires.
- Building capacity for continued best practice in fire and weed management;
- Expanding the current Gulf Savannah Fire Management Guidelines for the region.

In November the Gangalidda and Garawa rangers carried out the first of the late season fire work for the project. Prescribed burning for Rubber Vine was undertaken along the coast from Massacre Inlet to Moonlight Creek, while the Normanton rangers carried out late season fire work on Delta Downs from Karumba to the Gilbert River.

The rangers surveyed areas of Rubber Vine infestation to determine the priority target areas to get the best results and reassess previous target areas of re-infestation.

To complete this component of the project there needs to be at least 50 mm of rainfall a week before the fire application, providing the required soil moisture and to dampen the mulch layers.

This methodology helps the quick return of grasses, resulting in less stress on trees helping them recover quickly. The fire is placed as a backing fire which is slow moving and gives enough cooking time to dry and split the bark on the Rubber Vine, allowing fungus to penetrate, infest and kill the plants. To apply the fire, the rangers used an R44 helicopter which had a gel torch suspended underneath controlled by the pilot allowing us to use spot fires or lay out a line of fire as required.

The rangers fly in the helicopter as navigators to spot for the pilot and record data. The fire application was a great success in both regions with plenty of great photos and film footage taken showing great fire management. Pilot Craig Gifford commented on how smooth the operation was and was very impressed with results. In particular, Craig was impressed with the destruction of thousands of Rubber Vine plants and how quickly the country has opened up and regenerated.

Congratulations to both ranger groups for their hard work and commitment with what can sometimes seem a relentless and endless task. We look forward to having a look at the results of this work in the scheduled post surveys in 2014.

As well as support from Burke Shire Council, CLCAC is also funded to undertake this work by Australian Government Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet; the Queensland Government and Southern Gulf Catchments.

Thanks must also go to all pastoralists in the region who contribute to this important project. Over the next four years the CLCAC are excited to partner with pastoralists and land managers to achieve great outcomes through the 'Indigenous Fire and Weeds Management Project'.
