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Message from the Mayor

This has been the time of the year for events – Barra Fishing Competition, Easter, May Day Races, ANZAC Day, the Order of the Outback Ball and the Gregory Draft.

As always it is the countless hours given and efforts made by community volunteers that make these events a success and on behalf of the community I extend thanks and appreciation to them all.

No doubt many of you have seen the work being undertaken behind the current Council office. Richardson's Building Services have commenced the construction of the new Community Hall (Ngijinda Durlga). At the time of writing it is on track to be completed by the end of October. I thank you for your patience with the building process and the partial blockage to the street.

Council has undertaken, in recent weeks, consultation with the community regarding proposed land use changes and the creation of opportunities to increase available land for residential and commercial purposes around Burketown. Following earlier consultations we have also introduced some necessary changes to the Water Rating system, which not only bring our Shire in line with our legislative requirements by charging based upon usage, but also improve our commitment to environmentally sustainable governance.

Council has also met several times recently with MMG regarding an update on the strategic transitioning of MMG's role in Burke Shire. The closing of the mine has the potential to affect the region – in terms of financial input via rating,

decreased employment and training opportunities, as well as infrastructure investment. Hope remains that another entity will make a timely entrance or that MMG's exploration activities will reveal extra ore bodies – however the best case scenario indicates that there will be, at least, a short term lull in mining/resource activities within the Shire.

MMG's input to the region over the last fifteen years through training and employment has given many people an opportunity to further their skills and knowledge. Certainly their contribution to Council rates has enabled us to progress many vital projects. Therefore Council is keen to work with MMG, government and other relevant stakeholders to mitigate, as much as it can, these impacts and also create opportunities for MMG and other resource companies to make Burke Shire an integral part of their operations in the years to come.

I welcome Phil Keirle to the position of CEO. I thank Council staff for their continued hard work and efforts to progress the Shire.



Events in the Burke Shire Council: As will be seen throughout the publication, there have been plenty of events in the Shire since last we went to print. Small communities need events and there have been plenty of opportunities to bring the community together in April, May and June. Thank you to all involved with the World Barramundi Fishing Competition, which was another massive success.

Thank you to those who organised and attended the various ANZAC Day commemorations in the Shire; it is a special day and a unique opportunity for personal and collective reflection on the meaning of family, friendship, nation and war. Thank you also to all those who set-up, worked at, attended or competed in the Gregory Races. Flick though the newsletter for a visual insight into these three fantastic events. The Order of the Outback Ball was held in Gregory on Saturday 28th June, which was another glamorous event in the township of Gregory. Check out the Events Calendar in this newsletter or the website for further details of upcoming events.

Infrastructure: Following a fairly lengthy planning process, the building of the Burke Shire Ngijinda Durlgais proceeding according to the construction plan. For those of you not in Burketown, the building's progress can be tracked on Council's website and Facebook page. The handover date is scheduled for the mid to late October.

A special mention also to Council's Utilities crew, who have installed and commissioned a new water treatment system in Burketown. This system, which replaces chlorine with salt as the key input into the treatment process, will deliver some significant cost reductions in the operation of the Burketown water treatment scheme. Our aim, as discussed at the recent Water Rates Public Consultations, is to reduce the high costs of providing treated water in the Shire.

Weeds Management: Council is fully aware of community, Traditional Owner and grazier's concerns with the spread of weeds in the Shire and the region. Accordingly, Council will be stepping up efforts to control the spread of weeds. Gregory Landcare and Kev Andersen have been active in/around Gregory during May and the CLCAC Rangers provided some additional weed spraying services in/around Burketown in June.

In addition, Council is partnering with CLCAC, Biodiversity Queensland and range of other stakeholders to institute more effective weed management strategies throughout the region. Check out CLCAC newsletters and Council updates for more information on these arrangements.

Planning: It has been and will continue to be an incredibly busy time in Council as we review, develop and adopt four of the major planning documents that govern the administration of Local Government: the budget, Operational Plan, Corporate Plan and Town Planning Scheme.

The budget and Operational Plan are revised annually, the Corporate Plan every 5 years and the Planning Scheme every 10 years. It just so happens that this year marks the end of one planning cycle and the beginning of another for our Town Planning Scheme and Corporate Plan.

Like all of Council's planning documents – including the Budget, Operational Plan and Asset Management Plan – it is crucial that Council effectively meets the requirements of the State and adopts appropriate strategies for delivering on community expectations.

The former requires Council to adhere to a range of legislative and regulatory requirements, while the latter requires Council to figure out the way it will deliver the range of economic, social and environmental outcomes expected by the Community.

The Shire's Planning Scheme, given recent changes to Planning and Development legislation, requires a full overhaul. This represents a major piece of planning work that comes at the perfect time for Council, with ILUA (Indigenous Land Use Agreement) negotiations likely to open up a host of new zoning, development and environmental protection opportunities for land in the Shire. More on this very shortly.

Training: I was fortunate enough to spend a couple of weeks with Townsville City Council, spending time with all TCC departments with a view to learning more about Asset Management, Project Management, Fleet Management, Knowledge Management, HR and Corporate Culture, Work Health and Safety, Local and Subordinate Local Laws, Economic Development, Sustainability Planning and perhaps most importantly, Corporate and Town Planning.

The experience was invaluable and it is one that we (Council, TCC and the Department of Local Government) will look at continuing into the future.

Home & Community Care

We started off the year with a small number of clients in attendance and along with our extended unit in Gregory, they have come together to enjoy structured group activities. By providing this opportunity it helps to maintain and support them, and by social interaction, encourages independent living.

The clients enjoyed an Easter Luncheon at the Gregory Hotel where they each created their own Easter Hat to wear. They were judged for their unique creativity and awarded prizes by the publican for their effort. We celebrated International Women's Day at the Burketown Pub with the local community joining the HACC clients for a wonderful luncheon. Gift bags for all who attended was arranged by Marie from the Queensland Justice Department with items from various shops of which we were grateful. A raffle was also held in support of the Drought Relief which raised a considerable amount of money.

Clients have been venturing into new crafts this year with the men showing their talent and handyman creativity, starting with small projects using balsa wood and progressing on to bigger things. They now have a work bench and have all the appropriate tools to create some great work in the coming months. At present they are giving all their attention to making shadow boxes before venturing on to more complex things. The women, not to be outdone are creating some great handiwork, these include rag dolls, fancywork, and mosaic and at present are putting together knitted and crochet squares to make knee blankets. When completed, these will be forwarded to Laura Johnson Home from the clients as one of our services for the year.

On May Day Weekend we attended the Gregory Races for the Luncheon followed by the Races. It was a full day but one that everyone enjoyed. The HACC garden is thriving under their care and we have seen some changes in the various plant life, as plants die and are replaced. Our disability table is being utilised more now for morning teas as the days are not so hot and it is quite pleasant doing crafts and games outdoors. At the end of March HACC clients embarked on a four day cruise on the Pacific Dawn to the Whitsundays along with three carers. The cruise went well with the weather holding out for us – beautiful sunny days and calm seas all the way.

Travelling by bus to Cloncurry, we overnighted before flying out with Virgin Airline to Brisbane. We were taken onto the flight via wheelchair and lift and attended to all the way. Arrival in Brisbane was a little difficult as the plane couldn't get a bay so we had to disembark on the tarmac making it a long walk for a couple of the able clients, with the drizzly rain not helping the situation. It was a pleasant surprise to find that one of our carers from Townsville, and driver had already loaded our bags into the bus. However, the biggest surprise was to find out that our "bus" was Royale Limousines and that we had a chauffeur to drive us on three occasions- to the Mercure Hotel, to the port for our cruise and then collecting us again after the cruise.

The staff at the Mercure made our overnight stay pleasant and looked after us well, making the clients feel very special, chatting to each of them. The staff hadn't expected their ages to be what they were and found it hard to believe that they were going on a cruise at their age. It was a big surprise after being back in my room when a beautiful plate of petit fours was

delivered for the carers, along with a card wishing us all a wonderful cruise. We were picked up earlier than expected the next day by the chauffeur for transfer to the ship and as we neared the port all eyes were on the Pacific Dawn. Their faces mirrored their thoughts and it was a joy to watch their reactions. The chauffeur organised the shore P&O crew who saw us all safely on board and in our respective cabins well before others came on board, allowing our clients time to adjust. When organising this cruise, to my surprise I was informed that our clients were the oldest that P&O have ever had on one of their ships so they were VIPs all the way.

Before we sailed there was the customary life boat drill which was a little daunting for the clients. To them, it looked like the real thing so a little assurance was in order. The "Sail Away Party" was in full swing as the ship pushed out from the wharf and headed down the river. Singing and dancing on the top deck; but the Haccettes were more interested in the scenery and lined up along the glass windows on deck to watch Brisbane slowly disappear into the night. As we sailed under the Gateway Bridge the captain let off a series of blasts to farewell Brisbane which almost deafened everyone.

With so many restaurants on board we had a choice on where we'd eat but settled on the down to earth restaurant which I thought more suitable for them. As it happened they preferred it and settled on having every meal there, although we ventured into several coffee bars for our morning/afternoon teas. They missed out on all the shows as they started well after their bedtime. During the day they enjoyed wandering around the shops, playing bingo, or up on deck for a coffee while watching the entertainment of the day. Some clients went along to the Art Auction but from all accounts found it beyond them and promptly dozed off for an hour or so. The ship anchored off the Whitsundays for the day but because of the difficulty in getting wheelchairs and walkers ashore on a tender we spent a relaxing day on board doing our thing. Some of them went to bingo, checked out the gaming room, caught up on rest, tried out new coffee places and enjoyed the New Zealand ice cream shop. Once the tenders returned from the day ashore we were underway again, bound for Brisbane on the return voyage.

We disembarked at 6.30am and had the same care in getting us ashore although this time there was a mix-up with our limousine as it went to another wharf and never showed up. After some frantic phone calls our chauffer eventually arrived and we got to the airport with very little time to catch our flight to Cloncurry. Thanks to Virgin Australia who were waiting on us, rushed us through and on to the flight before anyone else boarded. Our whole trip was a wonderful experience and one that will be remembered although they all returned very tired. Without the help and guidance from many people along the way, this trip would not have been possible so to them we say a huge thank you and a special thank you to Bonnie Elford, we couldn't do it without you.

On Sunday 11th May we spent a lovely relaxing Mother's Day at Adel's Grove where the clients enjoyed a Mother's Day afternoon tea with small gifts for the ladies. They spent time fishing along the bank and caught bream, and as we stayed overnight they were able to enjoy the musical entertainment that was provided.

Gregory River Landcare Group

School Kids Gardening and Fishing By Mark Van Ryt

In early May the Gregory River Landcare group completed their annual gardening trip in Burke Shire. A team of five volunteers from the Gregory River Landcare group, Southern Gulf Catchments and Bulimba Creek Coordinating Committee visited schools in the Gregory and Burketown communities.

The project was funded through the Glencore Community Program. Glencore is the company that now owns Mount Isa Mines.

"Healthy Gardening" is an initiative aimed at teaching children the importance of healthy eating and how to grow and maintain a garden as well as provide a focal point for the local communities. This year the Gregory Downs School of the Air were the lucky recipients of a new garden, equipped with an irrigation system and shade protection.

The students helped to create the garden, planting vegetable, herbs and flower seedlings using the 'no dig method.' We make a bed of layered lucerne and hay mulch with compost before planting the seedlings.


Mark Van Ryt, a founding member and volunteer of the Gregory River Landcare group has been the driving force behind the Healthy Gardening initiative within Burke Shire since its start at Gregory in 2007. Each year Mark shares his passion and enthusiasm with his fellow volunteers in caring for the environment and demonstrates how as a group they can contribute to healthier lifestyles and make a difference within the local community.

In 2009, garden beds were installed at Burketown State School, and then in 2012 Burketown Kindergarten. Again this year, the volunteers re-visited the schools, refurbishing their gardens and encouraging student participation in preparing the beds and planting seedlings. The students and teachers are happy with the prospect of nurturing the plants and later being able to eat the vegetables and herbs grown in their garden.

In conjunction with the gardening every second year Mark acquires funding through Sunfish Queensland and the Department of Fisheries to conduct "fishing clinics". This year the children at the Gregory Downs School of the Air and the Burketown State School were also treated to a fishing trip. Each student received a tackle box, handline and gear to take home.

At Gregory the fishing spot was at the bottom of a long rapid. The children caught plenty of Sooty Grunter and Sleepy Cod. It was here Alya Munchenberg caught her first ever fish – a little sooty grunter. At Burketown the fishing clinic was held on the old Albert River Bridge. Many of the Burketown kids really know how to fish; they caught lots of bream and catfish. Here Karen Chimpaka -- one of the teachers caught her first ever fish.

MMG Queensland Operations Go Pink for Breast Cancer

Real men really do wear pink, and they're proving it in the Burke Shire with high visibility pink shirts spreading like wildfire at Century's Lawn Hill mine.

Employees at Century's Port operation in Karumba and its Dugald River development project near Cloncurry are also more visible than usual, and it's all for a good cause.

The Real Men Wear Pink (RMWP) campaign, which raises funds for breast cancer research, was launched in May for Century and Dugald River. It is an Australia-wide campaign that uses the colour pink, long associated with breast cancer awareness and fundraising.

The local MMG campaign for Real Men Wear Pink is an initiative of the MMG Queensland Operations Human Resources team, with the groundwork being done by Superintendent Rebecca (Bec) Stevenson and her RMWP Committee. The campaign has formed part of MMG's Diversity and Inclusion initiatives.

Bec Stevenson says there's a good reason to have the campaign in a Fly In Fly Out mining operation. "On a remote mine site, people can have a feeling of helplessness and isolation because they feel less able to assist loved ones or those in need. The message that we are sending is that of support and inclusiveness to our employees and to really demonstrate the commitment that MMG has to our people's work and life halones."

To give the campaign a high profile, Bec arranged for high visibility pink shirts to be made available for purchase, with \$3 for every shirt sale going to breast cancer research.

The pink shirts are appearing all over site and men are not shying away. Over 600 pink shirts have been sold and money raised through shirt sales and other initiatives has reached approximately \$19,000.

All monies raised by the purchase of high visibility pink shirts and other items goes to breast cancer research.
