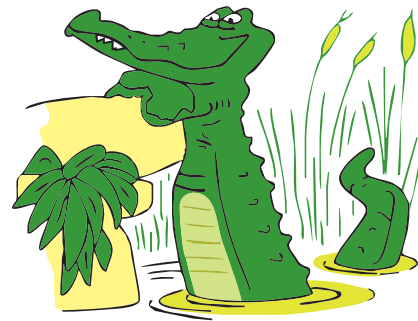

BURKE SHIRE *Order of the Outback Ball 2014*

The biennial Burke Shire Order of the Outback Ball was held at the Gregory Race Track on Saturday 28th June. Twinkling fairy lights, Chinese lanterns and multi-coloured orbs greeted the 230 attendees and provided a festive glow to the grounds and set the party atmosphere.

Revellers were entertained by poet Gary Fogarty and the smooth harmonies of Michelle Hobbs-Taylor either side of a delicious three course menu. A jumping castle and DVDs provided popular entertainment for the young children. Gregory Downs Jockey Club ran the bar and provided a tasty recovery breakfast on Sunday.

The Order of the Outback Award was established by Burke Shire Council in order to recognise and acknowledge the individuals or organisations who, through their words and/or deeds, seek to champion the outback – its people, its communities, its spirit. Previous Order of the Outback Award winners, Dr Don Bowley (RFDS) and Simon and Natalie Steele (Mt Isa Salvation Army Outback Flying Service) watched on as Burke Shire Council Mayor, Cr Ernie Camp, announced Charleville residents Brian and Nerida Egan, the founders of Aussie Helpers, as this year's award recipients. Aussie Helpers, founded in 2002, helps support Outback communities and lift the spirits of those severely affected when Nature appears to turn against them. Given the prevailing adverse climatic conditions in much of Outback Queensland the Egans' award is indeed timely and highlights the importance of support networks to struggling families and communities.

From what the Egans saw around them and heard from people in the bush, Brian and Nerida felt that no organisation, at that time, was doing anything significant to help families suffering the full effects of the worst drought in living history. Brian, as an armed forces veteran and one who lost his own farm in the 1990s from a combination of drought and personal depression, is no stranger to hard times.

Aussie Helpers have some 40 volunteers and mainly work via the ever faithful "Bush Telegraph" to find farming families who are in desperate need of assistance. Aussie Helpers work around three words "care, share, respect" which simply means that Aussie Helpers care about people in need, will share whatever assistance they have available free of charge, and will give the recipients the utmost respect and confidentiality.

Aussie Helpers raises all its own funding and is not aligned to any other charity or religious association. Unlike government-funded organisations, Aussie Helpers are all unpaid volunteers making a real difference to the lives of real people.

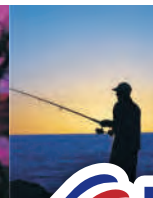

It was an honour to present this year's Order of the Outback Award to Brian and Nerida Egan the founders of Aussie Helpers – a volunteer organisation that supports individuals, families and communities suffering from the tyranny of drought. Funding was provided by the Queensland Government; Department of Communities, Child Safety and Disability Services to run this year's event.

The GSD office has now been relocated to the main street of Normanton. Board members, including Burke Shire Council, felt it timely that the organisation return to the region it supports. Look out for the GSD vehicle as it travels the Southern Gulf either providing assistance to local government or local business via the Small Business Support programme.

Recently the CEO, the Deputy Mayor and myself met with the Deputy Premier Jeff Seeney in Townsville. MMG and CLCAC also attended relevant parts of the meeting to lend support to our discussions with Minister Seeney regarding Royalties to Regions Funding and land tenure matters. The Deputy Premier was receptive to matters raised and has indicated a willingness to support Council in its dealings with State on these matters where possible.

I would like to extend my thanks to community members who have either come along and/or provided feedback following recent public meetings on the new water rating system and the proposed ILUA for Burketown and immediate surrounds. As always community input is welcomed and valued by Council.

In the coming months we will have the CWA Horse Sports at Gregory, the Burketown Campdraft and the Morning Glory Festival. Planning for the festival is well underway with music and events being organised. Dubmarine, a 10 piece band, will not only be performing but also working with the children on a Savannah Song project during the week and it will be performed as part of the festival. I look forward to seeing you when we are all out and about enjoying these local events in the months ahead.

The Burketown Indigenous Land Use Agreement

Council conducted a community consultation in relation to the proposed Burketown ILUA on Wednesday 18th June 2014. This date coincided with the Gangalidda Garawa claim meeting on the same matter.

The consultation was very well attended. During the meeting, Andrew Kerr (Council's solicitor) briefly outlined the legal backdrop to the ILUA negotiations before providing an overview of the key land tenure changes the ILUA seeks to enshrine. This included the presentation of before/after mapping of the proposed changes.

This mapping and an explanation of the ILUA-as-proposed are available online (<http://www.burke.qld.gov.au/web/guest/public-notice>) and at the Council office. Most of the questions and queries during the meeting focused on the importance of taking flood levels into account for all future development arising from the ILUA.

To date, Council has received no written submissions on the ILUA as proposed. Further updates on this process and future community consultations will follow shortly.

The Morning Glory Festival

Megan McGill, Council's new Event Coordinator, has taken to organising the MGF like a duck to water. The bands are lined up and the sponsorships are coming through thick and fast. A special mention must go out to Skytrans and MMG, who will take care of most of the flights for the performers. These contributions will have a wonderful impact on the MGF budget's bottom line. The Burketown Rodeo and Sports Association has completed the annual spring clean of the Rodeo grounds in preparation for the festival and the various busy-bees have given the race-track a complete makeover to ensure the successful return of sprint-racing to Burketown. The Carpentaria Land Council Aboriginal Corporation is pulling together an amazing show for the final night of the festival, celebrating their 30th anniversary with bands, dancers and an incredible

banquet of bush tucker. CLC will also be displaying memorabilia from the past 30 years and will offer Ranger-guided tours of the area. Clear the calendar, it is going to be a fantastic four days of entertainment. See more on the Morning Glory Festival on page 11.

Burke Shire Council and the Region

Councillors and staff will be progressing Council's interests within a range of regional and state forums over the next couple of months. In August, there will be delegations to the Regional Roads and Transport Group (Technical Committee), the Queensland Western Roads Action Plan and an Economic Development Roundtable with Mornington and Doomadgee Shires.

In September, there will be delegations to the North West Queensland Regional Organisation of Councils and to the Gulf Savannah Development AGM. In October, Council will attend the Local Government Association of Queensland Annual Conference. These meetings are crucial to ensure that all those who hold the purse strings in State and Federal Government know where we are, what we are doing and where to send the cheques.

Asset Management

Managing Local Government assets has never been more highly scrutinised than right now. Councils require detailed knowledge of asset location, asset condition and asset values in order to make long-term budgeting decisions. To ensure Council is in the best position to make these decisions, it is crucial that our Asset Data is continually updated and in constant conversation with our Financial Management System.

To ensure that this is the case, Council commissioned the most accurate mapping of all Council assets to date, incorporating an asset condition review into this project. This has now been completed and Council is currently linking all of this data to our financial system. We hope to showcase some of this work – particularly the mapping – in the coming months.

Remote Jobs and Communities Program (RJCP)

The Remote Jobs & Communities Program has been in effect in Burketown since late 2013 and we have been involved in some interesting projects around the community over the past few months.

We are continuing to service the Burketown Kindy with regular & free yard maintenance to keep the Kindy looking good and safe for the kids. Our yard maintenance service has been extended further into the community by mowing, whipper snipping and removing rubbish free of charge for seniors and at a standard cost of \$50 per yard for anyone else. If you would like to use this service please call or come and see us.

The ladies have explored their skills in jewellery making and now have a small collection of earrings, necklaces and bracelets that will soon be available for sale to the public. Recently our participants have had the benefit of spending a couple of weeks with Normanton based artist Dale Owens who came to Burketown and generously shared his many talents in painting and wood craft.

We are based at the Mounigibi Office in Bowen St and have undertaken a painting project to revive the inside of the office and planted flowers and ornamental plants in the yard which is starting to look great. We've also started a vege garden and have recently been able to harvest silver beet, pumpkins, carrots and tomatoes which we will share out with elderly members of the community.

A number of our participants have now found jobs locally and we are continuing to support them. If you are an employer or business owner and you're looking for a new staff member we may be able to help out and there are a number of incentives available to encourage people to give our

Gregory River Landcare Group

We have been busy again this year with weed control in the Gregory Town Common and camping areas. Volunteers and contract weed sprayers have again tackled Bellyache bush, Rubber vine, Parkinsonia and Calotrope in the long term fight against weeds in the area.

Funding was generously received from the Burke Shire Council for \$6000 and Southern Gulf Catchments Limited was able to provide \$20,000 which combined with the in-kind support from Paraway Pastoral Company meant that 70ha of weeds infestations were treated in key areas.

Without the ongoing support of our sponsors, supporters and volunteers, these projects simply cannot go ahead. The weed infestations will cause irreversible, long term decline in our region's vital productive land and natural ecosystems.

The Gregory River Landcare Group has also just secured \$40,000 to control Weeds of National Significance in the upper reaches of the Gregory River which have the potential to invade an additional 143 kilometres of our iconic river.

We aim to use a combination of fire and herbicides to eradicate rubber vine, lantana and bellyache bush from five isolated locations upstream of Gregory. The project was selected for funding by Southern Gulf Catchments Limited (SGC) under the most recent Caring for Our Country program because of its extremely high merits for biodiversity and cultural outcomes.

Larissa Lauder from SGC is coordinating the funding round and says "the project put forward by the Gregory River Landcare Group is really strong in terms of its outcomes for the region. This project directly affects 9 threatened species listed under the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act as well as 10 listed migratory species, and two Nationally Important Wetlands. The project also benefits the cultural values of the river, as well as reducing the economic impacts on tourism and agriculture."

This project specifically focusses on treating small infestations that we think are able to be eradicated. Getting rid of these weeds is going to be a long term process but in the selected locations we think it is achievable. We will need to go back each year for at least seven years to follow up and treat any seedlings emerging from the seed bank. This funding has given us a boost to complete the expensive first treatment. Project works will commence later this year when the weather conditions are suitable and the bulk of work will be completed by May 2016.

We certainly have a lot going on again in 2015 so if you think you would like to contribute to the important work the Gregory River Landcare Group undertakes in the region please get in contact with us.

CWA News and Recipes

Spring is coming and it is the perfect time to crank up the barbeque and start enjoying the warmer nights.

Here are a couple of recipes to try when next you get the urge to grill!

Indian Potato Salad

Place 8 medium peeled potatoes in a large pan, cover with water and bring to the boil. Simmer for about 20 mins or until tender. Drain and place in a large salad bowl to cool. Boil/Steam/microwave 1 cup fresh or frozen peas until just tender. Drain if necessary and rinse under cold water. Redrain and add to cooled potatoes. Combine 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon ground cumin, 1 teaspoon curry powder and ½ teaspoon of turmeric in a small bowl and mix well. Place in a small frying pan over a low heat for until 5 mins or until fragrant. Remove from heat and sprinkle over potatoes in the bowl. Toss potatoes to coat evenly. Using tongs, take one potato out of bowl at a time. Cut into thick slices then return to bowl. To make dressing, whisk 1 cup whole egg mayonnaise, 2 tablespoons lemon juice and 1 tablespoon water in a small bowl until well combined. Pour dressing over potatoes and toss gently to combine. Garnish with finely chopped spring onions. Serve warm or cool.

Haloumi, Sausage & Pesto Skewers

Bring a pot of water to the boil. Add 9 thick beef sausages and simmer for 5 mins. Remove cool until just warm and then slice into 4 pieces. Thread 3 sausage pieces, 2 pieces of green capsicum, 2 cherry tomatoes and 2 large cubes of halloumi cheese alternately onto 12 wooden skewers. Set aside. Make a dressing by combining 2 tablespoons of olive oil, 2 teaspoons of finely grated lemon rind, 1 tablespoon of lemon juice and 2 tablespoons of basil pesto well. Heat a large lightly oiled fry pan over high heat. Add skewers in batches. Cook for about 5 minutes brushing with dressing and turning occasionally until browned and heated through. Serve on a bed of combined baby rocket leaves and shaved parmesan. Drizzle with left over dressing.
Can substitute pork or chicken sausages if desired.

Char Grilled Steak with Chilli Jam

Chilli Jam – place 100g long red chillis – halved, deseeded and finely chopped, 1 finely chopped red onion, 2 crushed garlic cloves, 2 tablespoons peanut oil, ¼ cup water, 1/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 3 teaspoons each fish sauce and hoisin sauce in a medium saucepan. Bring to boil, stirring. Reduce heat to medium and continue cooking for 10 mins stirring occasionally. Reduce heat to low and simmer for a further 5 mins again stirring occasionally or until thick and jam like in consistency. This is enough for 4 thick fillet steaks. Cook steaks to your liking – only turning once. Rest steaks for 3 minutes before serving topped with chilli jam. Serve with tossed salad.

Distinguishing between the 'prickle bushes'

As we, the Burke Shire, have been cursed by having the four main prickly bushes established in our area it is advantageous to be able to distinguish the difference between "the prickly bushes".

Mesquite is often confused with other prickly bushes such as prickly acacia, parkinsonia and mimosa bush. These prickly bushes are also Weeds of National Significance and are to be eradicated at every opportunity.

It is possible to tell the difference between prickly bushes by the appearance of the flowers and pods. However, if neither of these is available, they can be distinguished by their bark colour and, in some cases, their leaves. As this can be difficult, a local weeds officer should be consulted. Mosquito season is here again

Protect yourself against Mosquitoes!!!

- Avoid being outdoors just before sunset and dawn.
- Wear loose fitting light coloured clothing with long sleeves, long trousers.
- Use insect repellent when outdoors and reapply regularly (repellents containing DEET are the most effective).
- Make sure fly screens on windows and doors are in good order.
- If camping sleep under a mosquito net.

There are a number of actions that can be taken by residents to prevent mosquitoes from breeding and your cooperation in attending to these is requested.

These include:-

- Mosquitoes need water to breed – get rid of surplus water and you may eliminate the problem;
- Animal water dishes emptied and cleaned regularly;
- Drain saucers under pot plants – have sand in them or do away with saucers during the wet;
- Store old tyres so they can't hold water;
- Keep roof guttering in good repair and clear of leaves;
- If there is a water tank, make sure it is securely screened with a fine good quality gauze;
- If there is a fish pond, make sure it is well stocked, preferably with native fish;
- If there is a bird bath, make sure it is drained and cleaned at least once a week.



Works Crew Update

It's been another busy month for the Works crew. Over the last month we have completed 15kms of formation and gravel re-sheeting works on the Camooweal Rd and graded the Lawn Hill National Park and Doomadgee West Roads. Works have commenced to widen the Floraville Road through Bosun Creek and will be completed by the end of August.

Council has also completed maintenance works on the Water Treatment Plant and Council housing whilst continuing to maintain the parks and gardens around Burketown and Gregory.

Over the next month, we will be involved in the construction of a new toilet and shower facility to replace the old toilet block at Gregory, and commence 5kms of bitumen work on the Doomadgee West Road.

The Shire is still awaiting the announcement of flood damage funding from Tropical Cyclone Fletcher earlier this year and continues to plan to commence these works towards the end of October.

Grid replacements have been planned for Harris Creek on the Floraville Road and the McAdams Grid on the Century-Gregory Road.

The Golden Age of Flying Returns

The golden age of flying returned to the Burke Shire recently, with the visit of a 70 year old Nostalgia Airways DC3 to Century Mine. It was carrying a group of tourists for nearby eco-tourism destination Adels Grove, but needed to land at Century to offload the passengers.

Built in 1944, the DC3 now operates out of Essendon Airport in Melbourne, 3000km away from Century. It is used for flying tours all over Australia. The DC3 was formerly used as a transport plane by the Royal Australian Air Force and after being decommissioned, was sold to the private operator.

DC3s operated by TAA and Bush Pilots were a workhorse in the Gulf Country for many years, landing at towns at cattle stations in the region.

The use of Century's airport by tourists visiting the Gulf of Carpentaria is another way that the mine's infrastructure provides valuable assistance to the wider community.

The VMR is an organisation that specialises in all marine rescues and prides itself on selecting and training the most professional staff possible so vessels and people requiring urgent assistance within the marine environment are rescued in the most efficient manner possible and reunited with their families. The VMR is made up of volunteers that range from all ages (18 and over) and a variety of backgrounds who volunteer their personal time to ensuring the safety of others who have found themselves in difficult situations when boating within the unpredictable and unforgiving seas.

The course is made up of different modules that range from navigation skills, plotting and planning a sea voyage, calculating travel time and fuel consumption, identifying all marine markers, vessel signals/flags, ship's maintenance etc.

Having been successful in passing all the requirements Terrence and I are now active Skippers of the local Burketown VMR vessel. We feel our role is very important, as do the large number of VMR members throughout our local communities and across state that we call the VMR family and are proud to be a part of. Being traditional owners in our region, both having sound knowledge of the local navigational hazards that lay within our traditional waters and being able to apply this knowledge when being deployed on a rescue mission within the region can be a great comfort to our vessel and crew.

We would like to thank the local Burketown VMR team members for their support in helping us achieve this goal, the State Trainer Robert Brock and his training staff and the CLCAC who have been instrumental in their support and encouragement. Last but not least we would like to thank all of the Gladstone VMR team members from the President, through to the radio staff through to the skippers and crew for their second to none hospitality and comforting support.

Burke Shire Council representatives decided to send one staff member each year to the conference as part of a mentoring program to show up and coming members of staff what women can achieve within Local Government roles.

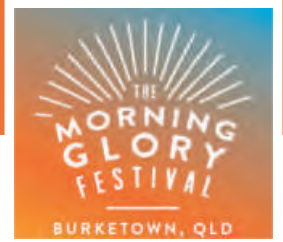
