Australia Day in Burketown

A hotly contested match resulted in 'Phils Fiddler Crabs' ably captained by Philip Keirle winning the match by 24 runs. A consistent effort on field and at the bat saw Dylan Clemments receive Man of the Match award.

The cricket match was followed by the Car Rally. Several teams full of enthusiasm set off keen to decipher clues, answer questions and earn bonus points. The Winners consisting of Roly Sussex and three members of the Camp family – Ernie, Kylie and Zara- whilst not in the first run of teams to return won the day and a medal for their efforts. In combination with salads and bread rolls the Burketown Police – Ash and Matt- slaved over hot BBQ's to provide a small but lively crowd with a lovely lunch. Attendees also enjoyed lamingtons and pavlovas with delicious fresh fruit and cream.

After lunch winners and awards were announced by Mayor Ernie Camp, ably assisted by Cr Duff. The Lamington and Scone Bakeoff had several delicious entries with Hanna Wiles from Tirrana Springs Roadhouse declared the winner for her vibrant entry. Kady Tritton won the Australia Day colouring in Competition with a neat and colourful entry.

This year's Citizen of the Year was awarded to lan Forshaw from Gregory. Ian has lived in Burke Shire his entire life and is a member of the Gregory Downs Jockey Club, Gregory Sporting Association and the award winning Gregory SES Unit and has actively contributed to these clubs either as an executive member, with time and materials at working bees or responding to emergencies. He has assisted with RFDS evacuations for many years as well as being the Town Fire Warden. He was also a member of the Gregory P&C when the school was open.

Madison Marshall was recognised as 2015 Community Champion. Madison was recognised for consistently conducting herself as an inspiration to young indigenous women, particularly those living in remote communities such as the Burke Shire, showing what can be achieved with hard work and determination and for having commitment to family and the community.

The Gregory Community's Melbourne Cup Day celebration was awarded Community Event of the Year. The combined clubs and community have used this day not just to come together, enjoy the iconic race and each other's company but as an opportunity to fundraise for worthwhile causes close to the community's heart. Andrew Clarke who grew up at "Brinawa" and suffered a spinal injury in a car accident, cystic fibrosis an illness

suffered by Shelly Shepard a friend of many in the Gregory area and Bears for Hope in memory of baby Joshua Seymour the much loved child of Jill and Will Seymour (Will grew up at "Riversleigh" and is a regular chopper pilot in the area) have all benefited from the community's generosity with over \$22 000 being raised in the last four years.

Mayor Camp was honoured to present Professor Roly Sussex, a linguistics expert from Brisbane, with a Woolworths Australia Day Ambassador pin in recognition of his role as Ambassador for Burke Shire in 2015. Roly really enjoyed his time in the Shire, and the hospitality of residents, when visiting not just Burketown but Gregory and "Floraville". Roly joins a long line of those who came as Australia Day Ambassadors but left as Burke Shire Champions proud to advocate and promote our region. He was thrilled to be part of the winning Car Rally team. His only complaint was his failure to catch a barra during his time here.


Australia Day in Burketown

Message from the Mayor

Council has been active since the New Year writing to politicians regarding telecommunication shortfalls in the Shire and discussing those shortfalls with government and commercial interests, attending workshops, repairing and improving Council building infrastructure, progressing the Burketown ILUA and commencing the process for Gregory, looking at potential projects across the Shire, lobbying for a polling booth in our Shire and speaking with all candidates on issues of importance to our Shire and the wider region. Meetings have also been held with local contractors regarding upcoming roadworks.

Council will continue to engage, individually, through GSD and our local Regional Organisation of Councils (ROC), with relevant departments and MP's to deliver outcomes and projects and minimise, as much as possible, disruption to our plans as well as the negative effects potential policy change may make upon residents and business.

December was a busy month as well – the annual Community Christmas Party, Christmas Carols, Council Breakup, Christmas Lights Competition – providing many opportunities for us all to relax, catch up and be part of the Christmas spirit. Thank you to all you on council and in the community who organised, donated or participated in the events. My family certainly enjoyed all the events.

It was also the time for our local schools to acknowledge and celebrate the achievements of their students over the past year and farewell those going onto higher levels of schooling. From the Chief Executive Officer's Desk

In 2014, Council worked hard on breaking the back of a number of legacy issues. These included the acquittal of three years of flood damage funding (a notoriously tricky beast), the acquittal of five years of Roads 2 Recovery program funding (an even trickier beast), processing and clearing a 10 year backlog of outstanding Development Applications as well as completing a full review of Council's records and record keeping practices.

At the same time as tackling these legacy projects, Council commenced a number of new projects and continued to progress those already commenced. Below, you will find some brief insights into these projects.

MANAGED SERVICES

Council has made the transition to "cloud-based" computing, a move that will provide additional data security and improve the functionality of computer services for staff (particularly at the Management and Councillor level, where remote access is crucial). While there has been some initial teething problems, the system is subject to continual improvement. In the next 4-6 weeks, the data centre will be upgraded and additional data compression/acceleration hardware will be built into the system to improve overall speed and performance. Congratulations to Jenny Williams for bringing this project to its fruition.

RECORDS MANAGEMENT

A quality records management is integral to the success of any organisation. Burke Shire is dependent on the availability of accurate and reliable records for the effective and efficient conduct of its business. Recognising shortcomings in its records management processes, Council has recently completed a major overhaul of this core business function, which included the development of new business processes for keeping and maintaining records, the authorised destruction of obsolete records and training for staff in records keeping responsibilities. These changes ensure Council is better placed to provide evidence of actions and decisions; to make good use of precedents and of organisational experience; and to support consistency, continuity, efficiency and productivity in programme delivery, management and administration.

EXTERNAL AUDIT

Council has received an unqualified audit from the Queensland Audit Office. This was no easy feat given the scrutiny placed on Burke Shire's books after Council commenced legal action against former Deputy CEO Fred Aqvilin for a \$1m fraud. That Council was able to pass through the audit process relatively unscathed is due, in large part, to the skill, professionalism and dedication of Council's Finance Manager, Simba Chimpaka.

ROADS

On Friday 13 February 2015, Council held an information session for local contractors interested in tendering for the 2014 Flood Damage works. The assessment criteria detailed in the tender include preferential treatment for submissions which incorporate local content (i.e. local contractors). For further information on Council's works program, please see the Works Manager's report.

RUBBISH TIP

One of the last remaining legacy items for Council to address relates to the administration of the Burketown and Gregory landfill sites. We plan to knock most of the issues on the head at the Burketown landfill by August of this year. This will be done through 1) the removal of scrap metal; 2) the removal of waste tyres from the tip; 3) the complete enclosure of the tip; 4) the division of the tip into different sections for receipt of different waste



types; and 5) through the dedication of additional resources to tip operations and reporting requirements. Prior to completing the same for Gregory, Council will look to obtain the appropriate tenure over the Gregory landfill. The landfill is currently sited on a Camping and Water Reserve. The most appropriate tenure, as determined by the Department of Natural Resources and Mines, is Council freehold. This item is currently being discussed as part of broader land tenure discussions in/around Gregory.

SEWERAGE TREATMENT PLANT

Council are investigating a couple of re-designs to the sewerage treatment plant in Burketown in order to 1) reduce our reliance on machines; 2) reduce maintenance spending on treatment plant components; 3) reduce monitoring costs; and 4) explore scenarios for using treated wastewater to irrigate sporting fields.

PONTOON UPDATE

Phase 2 of the Burketown Pontoon project is due to be completed in the second week of May 2015. While it would be great for the pontoon to be installed by the time the fishing competition is run, staging the project in this way allowed Council to take advantage of pre-mobilised pile-driving equipment during phase 1 (saving of ~\$100,000) and to apply for Royalties for the Regions funding for phase 2 of the project. Council will know shortly whether the new State Government will honour the \$180,000 promised by the previous government to phase 2 of this project (installation of floating pontoons and gangway).

BOAT RAMP & WHARF

Council are in discussions with the Department of Main Roads and Transport in relation to the widening of the Burketown Boat Ramp. In order to trigger DTMR funding for this project, Council is required to establish a 45 CTU (car trailer unit) all-weather car park. Preliminary planning, including survey and car park design are currently taking place.

GREGORY LAND TENURE

Council are currently engaging key stakeholders in/around Gregory to discuss proposed land tenure changes. It is likely the variety of land tenure changes proposed will be addressed through an ILUA process. A meeting with Gregory residents has been held on the 16th of March 2015 in the Gregory Hall.

ASSET MANAGEMENT

Council will be conducting a full revaluation of all assets in line with Queensland Audit Office requirements. We will look to have this process completed by May 2015. Once completed, the information generated (financial and engineering) will assist Council in resetting it's 5 and 10 year infrastructure upgrade, replacement and renewal budgets.

GREGORY SOLAR ARRAY

Council placed a data logger at the Gregory WTP to monitor load requirements. The results of the data logging process have been collected and will be sent to GHD, who are project managing the tender process for the installation of solar power to the Gregory Water Treatment Plant. This information – on how much power is used and how that load is distributed throughout the day/week/month – will help GHD to generate the performance specifications for the coming tender.

RATES

Council's audit of all things rates-related is nearing the completion of its first stage: an historical audit of all rateable properties to identify and rectify any anomalies. Subsequent stages of this audit will include the review of all rates documentation sent to ratepayers (rates notices, explanatory material etc.), the establishment of new rating categories where appropriate (rural residential, for example) and a revision of all other rating category definitions.

Tasty Lunch Box Ideas

Mini Quiches

These can be frozen and put in the lunch box straight from the freezer – by lunch time they will have defrosted.

For each sheet of puff pastry you need $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped or grated vegetables (carrot, zucchini, corn kernels, peas, spinach, shallots, capsicum), $\frac{1}{4}$ cup thickened cream or milk, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup grated cheese, 1 egg, pinch of mixed herbs or parsley.

Cut pastry sheet in squares and place into greased shallow patty tins. Combine the remaining ingredients and spoon into the cases. Bake at 210°C for about 20 mins until golden and filling is firm.

Optional – add chopped ham, bacon or drained and flaked pink salmon. Use slices of bread, crusts removed and cut to fit tins instead of pastry (butter one side of bread and place buttered side against the pans).

Pizza Slice

Fry 1 finely chopped onion, $\frac{1}{2}$ a green capsicum finely diced and 1 crushed garlic clove in 2 tablespoons of butter until onion is softened. Crush 1 packet of Jatz crackers into a bowl. Add 125g finely chopped ham and 125 g finely chopped soft salami. Add fried vegetables. Stir in combined $\frac{1}{4}$ cup milk, 1 teaspoon dried mustard and 2 beaten eggs.

Can add in a pinch of dried oregano or some parsley if desired. Press into a greased lamington tin. Spread the top with tomato paste and top with grated cheese. Bake at 180°C for about 20 minutes.

Baked Bean Scrolls

Preheat oven to 200°C. Combine well - 2 chopped spring onions, 2-4 diced slices of either ham or salami, 220g can baked beans and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup grated tasty cheese and set aside.

Sift together 2 cups SR flour and rub in 30g of softened butter until is looks like fine breadcrumbs. Make a well in the centre and pour in $^{3}4$ - 1 cup milk (add the lesser amount first and then add some / all the remaining milk if needed) and mix to make a soft but not sticky dough. Roll out into a rectangle shape and spoon over the baked bean mix. From the long side, fold in the short sides and then roll up to enclose the bean mixture.

Cut into 12 scrolls, each about 1/2 cm thick. Place on a greased and lined tray and brush with some extra milk. Bake for 15 mins or until golden.

Energy Bars

Place 125g margarine, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar and $\frac{1}{3}$ cup honey into a saucepan and simmer for 5 minutes. Place 4 cups Rice Bubbles, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped dried apricots, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup each sunflower kernels and pepitas (pumpkin seeds) and $\frac{1}{3}$ cup sesame seeds. Add honey mix and mix well. Press firmly into a slice tin with damp hands and refrigerate until firm.

Cornflake Energy Bites

Pit and chop 1 cup moist prunes. Place in a saucepan with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup dropped dried apricots and 1 cup water. Bring to the boil, reduce heat and simmer for about 5 mins or until fruit is soft and water has been absorbed.

Add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped blanched, roasted peanuts, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoons peanut butter and 3 cups of crushed Corn Flakes and mix well to combine. Roll 2 teaspoons of the mix into balls and then in desiccated coconut. Refrigerate until required.

NOTE: check if your school has a nut free school policy before you send these to school with your children.

Second Field release of the Parkinsonia Looper Moth

On the 12th November the first release of the Parkinsonia Looper moth Eveupithecia species 2 nicknamed "UU2" was released at five sites on Escott Station by the CSIRO in an endeavour to control Parkinsonia in the Burke Shire. Parkinsoniaaculeate is native to the Americas and is recognised as one of the twenty worst weeds in Australia. It has been declared in all states and territories. The Australian weed committee approved Parkinsonia as a target for biological control in Australia in 1983. Three insect species have previously been released in Australia but only one, the seed-feeding bruchid, Penthobruchusgermaini, from Argentina, established and dispersed readily. Although the bruchid is widespread (it is present in our Parkinsonia) it has so far failed to have a significant impact.

The leaf-feeding looper caterpillar, *Eveupitheciacisplatensis* (nicknamed "UU") and *Eveupithecia species* 2 (nicknamed "UU2), were identified in Argentina, and have the potential to be an effective biological control agent for Parkinsonia. On the 6th February a second release of 18 containers of looper catepillars was undertaken at four of the selected sites on Escott station, the larvae were airfreighted in. To the untrained eye there doesn't look to be too much activity from the previous release in November last year so the second release was again at four of the first sites. These will be continually monitored.

FLOOD DAMAGE

Tenders have been called for the Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (NDRRA) flood damage works from Tropical Cyclone Fletcher last year. The works will be completed in three parts (being Earthworks, Concreting and Hydraulic Structures and Stabilisation works). The first tender (earthworks) has been called for and will close on the 16th of March. The remaining tenders will be released over the next 8 weeks.

Local contractors are reminded to submit a capability and equipment schedule to the Works Manager if they are interested in having their details disseminated to potential contractors.

A lack of substantial rain has seen the roads crew conducting maintenance on local roads sooner than anticipated this year. The lack of rain has allowed the commencement of opening grades on all Shire local roads and will see the completion of these works prior to the Easter Holiday period.


