ANZAC Day in Burketown

One hundred years after those young souls attempted to climb the ANZAC Cove cliffs and cross the Gallipoli soils, Burke Shire folk gathered in the predawn to remember and honour their sacrifice and bravery.

A record crowd in Burketown gathered around the cenotaph in the main street at first light for the Dawn Service. All listened to the haunting strains of the Last Post, joined in prayers and offered a minutes silence in contemplation of those who have fought in conflicts, past and present, to ensure our freedom and safety. 51 FNQR representatives attended in Burketown and a RAAF representative was present at Gregory. A tasty breakfast was then enjoyed by all.

Mid morning a small but eager troupe of marchers gathered in Burketown's Morning Glory Park representing the schools, community groups, police and armed services and proceeded to march down the street.

They were organized by Sargent Troy Crompton from our local Police and ably led by Corporal Mick Smale, Warrant Officer Stephen Malone (51st FNQ Regiment Mt Isa) and Leading Aircraftman Joshua Allanson (RAAF Townsville).

The reading of the honour rolls as well as the wreath laying for the various sections of the armed forces aid the attendees in recalling not just the acts but the human face of war.

Warrant Officer Malone delivered a heartfelt and thought provoking speech in which he highlighted the core values and traits epitomised by our soldiers, much admired by friends and foe alike, and how they were merely a reflection of those apparent in all Australian communities -



mateship, loyalty, tenacity, a strong sense of what is right and determination to see things through. As usual, the young students of Burketown did their community proud with their enthusiasm and participation in the event. From their animated marching and flag waving to their reading of "My Brother George" their contributions were much appreciated.

The success of this day was aided by the efforts of Council staff and the community volunteers, who cooked our breakfast, helped clean up after the event, or helped during the ceremony.





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ANZAC Day in Gregory

Dawn Service at Gregory Downs Station

60 people, including children, assembled at Gregory Downs Station (Planet Downs) kitchen at 5:30 am on ANZAC Day morning.

The group then marched behind the Australian flag held by the children and James Geeves on horseback with the flag pole representing the light horse to the tune of 100 Years of Anzac and Spirit of the Anzac. The crowd assembled at the flag pole for the ceremony.

Tess Arnold read the introduction and introduced the hymn "The ANZAC". Megan Munchenberg read the prayer of remembrance, while Kimberley read the address.

Gregory Downs Station, in honour of the centenary of the landing at Gallipoli, proudly erected a monument to the brave diggers that we were remembering on ANZAC Day, both those who fell and those who returned. The placing of the monument is of particular significance as the small tree beside it is a pine tree from Gallipoli, the same type as the Lone Pine which stands as a sentinel to those brave souls who rest there.

Acknowledgement was made to Megan and Jason Munchenberg and his parents Major Bruce (retired) and Lynette Munchenberg for the donation of the tree. Leading Aircraftman Joshua Allanson of the RAAF Townsville, Jason Munchenberg, long time Gregory Downs's employee and donator of the pine tree, and Ian and Tracy Forshaw unveiled the plaque.

The Blessing and bell ringing was conducted by Georgie and Bec. Tess then told us the story of the poem In Flanders Field written by Doctor Lieutenant Colonel John Macrae (1872 to 1918) of the Canadian Army. He did not want the young men he was seeing to die in vain. He penned this poem, asking our younger generation to keep the faith and be true to what these young men were fighting and dying for. The poem was read by David Arnold who then symbolically passed the flame to the children of Gregory representing the younger generation; in the hope they will carry the ANZAC tradition with pride.

The congregation was addressed by Bec, Georgie, Megan and Danielle who gave us a little insight into some personal stories and deeds by Australians during the Gallipoli campaign and the enormity of what these individuals gave with no thought to themselves.

After the hymn, Flowers of the Forest, the wreaths were laid.

 a wreath in honour of the women who nursed the wounded, drove
 trucks and jeeps, sent relief packages or just kept the home fires
 burning.

April then recited the Ode and then the Last Post was played followed by a minute's silence. After which Michael Jamieson will read the resolution. The flag was raised to top and then to half-mast when finished whilst the Reveille was played.

The crowd energetically sang the National anthem – Advance Australia Fair, and returned to the kitchen for a hearty breakfast.

As I write this Burke Shire has just been drought declared. A lack of a wet season has major impacts for many our ratepayers.

For stations it creates water and feed shortages for stock and a need to move them off as soon as possible to minimise negative impacts and allow sufficient resources for a core herd.

It affects our fishermen – professional and recreational – as the rivers need a good flush to encourage healthy stocks of fish and crustaceans. It impacts local businesses whose livelihood relies on other local businesses for support.

It also has implications for Council not only from the impacts on roads due to increased traffic to and from stations but the water shortage provides challenges for road works completion.

BOM has also recently released a report stating we are entering an El Niño period meaning rainfall is unlikely during the next few months. Whilst this not our traditional rainy period certainly some rain by the end of spring would more than be welcome.

Council is planning to hold a Tackling Tough Times event at Gregory in July at which it will have representatives from various organisations who can provide that social and mental support network.

From the Chief Executive Officer's Desk

We are fast approaching mid-year and preparations for the 2015-2016 budget are well underway. There will be a far stronger focus on road maintenance and rehabilitation in this budget as well as some exciting capital projects related to tourism, telecoms, waste management and improved sewerage treatment infrastructure.

Animal Control

A community consultation on Animal Control was recently held in Burketown (20th May). This meeting was held to discuss two problems of enduring concern – barking dogs and roaming dogs. At this meeting, Council acknowledged the need for improvement in Council's animal management practices.

Plenty of questions and concerns were raised by the audience of 30-odd people. The most common and the most pressing related to: child safety, animal safety, the process for handling dog complaints and the benefits of re-instituting the vet clinics in Burketown.

North West Vet Clinic are due to arrive on 9-10 June 2015, to provide surgical, health and well-being services to dog owners. While we are hopeful that there will be enough time to cater for everyone's needs, this particular clinic will prioritise issues related to dogs in Burketown, as this is the area of overwhelming concern at present.

Telecommunications

Council currently lobbying State and Federal governments to come to the party as this relates to the funding of improved telecommunications services in the Shire. While Council acknowledges that the NBN satellites due for release in 2016 will provide a useful service for remote properties, Council views the installation of a mobile phone base station in Gregory and the installation of optic fibre to Burketown as key infrastructure projects.

Pontoon

As you will have seen, the Burketown pontoon has been delivered to Burketown. At the time of writing, phase 2 of this project is nearing completion, with only the concrete abutment and connection of the gangway to come.

Council has been fortunate enough to receive funding from the State of Queensland (Royalties for the Regions) and the Commonwealth (National Stronger Regions Fund) for this project. Given this dual funding, Council will be able to proceed with the installation of an elevated, marine-grade aluminium walkway between the gangway and car-park, rather than the more modest design initially anticipated.

Boat Ramp & Wharf

Council have now received designs and costings for the construction of a two lane boat ramp and car park infrastructure. Council will submit it's business case to the Department of Main Roads in the very near future.

Mineral Baths & Hot Springs

Preliminary tests conducted by Simmonds & Bristow indicate that no water, soil or vegetation issues would stand in the way of the development of low-impact Mineral Baths around the Burketown Bore. Further discussions around design, development and budget need to take place before any work is scheduled. In terms of design, we have been fortunate to have students from the Queensland University of Technology (QUT) work on the Mineral Baths as a design project as part of their Town Planning degree.

Radio Services

SBS Radio is now available on 99.5 FM and Council are in discussions over acquiring another license for broadcasting KIX, a country and western radio station. Further updates on this one to follow.

Sewerage Treatment Plant

Council recently conducted some MEDLI modelling (Model for Effluent Disposal Using Land Irrigation) at the Sewerage Treatment Plant; one of the conditions of our Environmental Authority.

This modelling determines the sustainability of effluent irrigating practices by sampling soil, vegetation and groundwater quality. Council is happy to report that the modelling indicates no adverse effects to the surrounding environment.

Nevertheless, Council is looking at some long-term improvements to the sewerage treatment plants, which will provide increased capacity, reduce the machinery involved in the treatment process (thereby decreasing operational costs) and allow for the use of treated effluent to irrigate sporting fields around town.

Burke Shire Works and Services Department

Roadworks

The road crew is currently preparing another section of the Doomadgee West road for sealing under ATSI TIDS funding. This will see another 1.5km of road sealed prior to the end of the financial year. ATSI TIDS funding is unmatched by council and is funded by DTMR – this year the Burke Shire Council has received \$287,000 to improve connectivity through the Shire to Aboriginal communities. NDRRA works have commenced on the Doomadgee west road and will continue over the next six months. Works commenced in early May and have concentrated so far on areas damaged by flood in early 2014. The program will see works continue on Doomadgee West before commencing on roads around Lawn Hill and Bowthorn stations over the next six weeks. Remaining tenders for stabilisation and concrete works associated with these works will be released in June.

Parks and Gardens

The laying of turf and garden beds has been completed with turf taking up very well around the Nijinda Durlga. Council would like to thank residents for staying clear of the turf over the last few months. We would like to remind residents to make use of the dog litter bags in the parks throughout Burketown and Gregory and further remind residents to keep dogs on leashes at all times.

Water and Sewer

With the continuing warm weather and lack of rain over the wet, we would like to remind all residents of the best times to water your lawns. Getting the most from your sprinklers will be aided by watering at the most appropriate times. Consideration of wind and warm weather when coming up with your watering plans will assist you in achieving the most from your water allocations, watering in the evening and out of the wind will ensure that you are getting your water where your lawns and gardens need it the most.

Best Start Library Program

About Best Start

Best Start is a universal family literacy program aimed at creating stronger language and literacy environments for Queensland children before they start kindergarten and school.

Best Start supports parents and primary caregivers to understand their role and be confident as their child's first and most important teacher before and during formal education. Best Start programs, resources and services are rolling out across Queensland.

The Best Start program has been informed by four years of practical research and evaluation of family literacy practice in public libraries. The Best Start family literacy initiative is proudly supported by Queensland Government, State Library of Queensland and delivered in partnership with local government, public libraries and their local partners.

About parents' and caregivers' important role

Parents and primary caregivers are their child's first and most important teacher. It takes just 10 minutes a day to nurture your child's love of language by reading together, sharing rhymes, singing songs, telling stories or playing with them. This interaction is critical and can happen anywhere and anytime.

Being read to at an early age is critical in terms of a child's social, cognitive, emotional and language development, and their overall well-being. When fathers are involved with their child's literacy education from a young age, their child demonstrates increased cognitive abilities, higher self-esteem and greater social competence.

Reading with children is the single most important activity families can do with their children to help them learn to read and write once they start school. Reading is not just about the words in the book; it's about having fun, talking about what you see, responding to what your child is interested in, and spending time together.

Don't wait until your child starts kindergarten and school! It's as simple as sharing a book, singing nursery rhymes and talking to your child from birth to give them the best start in life.

What research tells us

Research shows that a child's language development before age 3 is the single most important factor in school success. Children who experience difficulties learning to read are unlikely to catch up to their peers and the gap will continue to widen.

In Queensland approximately 36% of parents of 0-2-year-olds, and 52% of parents of 3-8-year-olds do not regularly read to their children. During the first 3 years, a child's brain undergoes significant development. To provide a strong brain structure for future learning, children need experiences such as sharing books, talking together, singing songs and time interacting with important adults in their life.

Almost one in four Queensland children are not at the right language and literacy level when they start school and many never catch up. Research shows us that investing in emergent literacy skills (before children start school) is far more beneficial than attempting to treat poor literacy outcomes remedially for children when they are older.

Winter Warmers

Beef & Vege Casserole with Dumplings

Heat 2 Tablespoons cooking oil in a pan. Brown 1.5kg diced round/chuck steak, in batches, until brown then remove to a bowl. Add 8 small brown onions, peeled (or use 4 larger onions peeled but root left intact but trimmed and quartered, 4 thickly sliced carrots and 4 cloves of finely chopped garlic to the pan and cook until onions are golden and softened.

Remove from pan and place with reserved meat. Stir 2 tablespoons of plain flour into the oil in the pan and then gradually add 4 cups beef stock, stirring until smooth. Add 1 x 400g can diced tomatoes, 1/3 cup tomato paste and salt and pepper to taste to the pan and bring to the boil.

Return meat/veges to pan, reduce heat and simmer for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs or until meat is tender. Stir in $\frac{1}{2}$ cup roughly chopped parsley. Alternatively, place in a large casserole dish and cook for $1-1\frac{1}{2}$ hours @ 160° .

Place 2 cups SR flour in a bowl and rub in 6g of chilled, cubed butter until mix resembles breadcrumbs. Add 2 lightly beaten eggs, 2 tablespoons of chilled milk, 2 tablespoons of chopped parsley and pinch salt. Mix to combine and with floured hands shape into 6-8 balls. Place on top of meat mix in pan/casserole and gently simmer for approx. 40 mins until cooked.

Meat mix freezes well and you can just put dumplings on top when reheating. Serve with crusty bread and a green vege.

Mild Curry

Preheat oven to 160°. Cut 1 kg of beef/lamb into cubes. Season with salt and pepper. Add in 2 tablespoons of oil and mix well. Brown meat in batches, transferring each browned batch to a casserole dish. Reduce heat and add a little more oil to the frying pan. Put in 1 large chopped onion and 2 cloves of garlic and cook for 2 minutes.

Optional – also add 3 thickly sliced and peeled carrots and 4-6 halved and scrubbed chat potatoes. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of mild curry powder over veges and stir until coated and cook for another 2 minutes. Stir in 2 tablespoons of brown sugar and then gradually add 2 ½ cups beef stock and 400mL coconut milk. Stir until it boils and then transfer to casserole dish. Stir through meat mixture to combine.

Cover and cook until meat is tender stirring occasionally- it may take 2 ½ -3 hrs. Add water if need to keep ingredients just covered. Serve with rice and naan bread.

Syrup Dumplings

Place 2 cups water, 1 cup sugar, 2 dessert spoons butter and 1 tablespoon golden syrup in a pan and bring to the boil, stirring until sugar dissolves. While this is coming to the boil, rub 1 dessertspoon of butter into 1 cup of sifted SR flour.

Beat 1 egg and add to flour – you may need to add a little milk to help dough come together into a soft but not sticky mixture. Roll mix with floured hands until small balls and place in simmering syrup. Simmer for 15-20 mins until firm and puffed.

Serve with ice-cream and/or cream.

A group of students from Burketown State School and the School of the Air were able to fly 800km to Townsville for the 100th ANZAC anniversary with the help of Century. Meg Frisby from Century's Community team (top of stairs) made the group welcome when they transited through Lawn Hill.

When seats have been available on its commute aircraft, Century has provided seats on its commute flights for local children who are travelling for educational reasons. Over the years that Century has been in production, this support has meant that schools and families have had to bear less of a burden with airfare costs.



Big wheels turning with MMG Trucking Program

A six-month trucking program to transport approximately 450,000 tonnes of ore from Dugald River (north of Cloncurry) to Lawn Hill has commenced. The trucks, operated by contract partner Wagners using their distinctive yellow trucks, will operate on a 24/7 cycle involving a 700km round trip throughout the period of the trucking program.

Road users can expect to see increased road works during the trucking program, including the spraying of a dust suppressant material on the Gregory to Lawn Hill road. Road users should be aware of speed limit signs of 40km per hour or less at road work locations.

The Dugald River ore will be processed at Lawn Hill once the final ore from Century's open cut pit has been processed. The Dugald River concentrate will then be piped to Karumba and shipped to market. Once the current trucking program is completed in November, MMG does not have any plans to have ongoing trucking or ore from Dugald River to Century.

MMG is very grateful to people like Jo Start at the Gregory Pub, Rod and Michelle Low Mow at Adels Grove, the team at Boodjamulla National Park, Ken and Anne Stott at the Burke and Wills Roadhouse, Local Government, our grazing neighbours and Native Title representatives for helping spread the message about sharing the road safely with road trains. Gregory River Landcare Group Update

2015 looks to be a busy year for the Gregory River Landcare Group and there are some new faces on the executive committee who are looking to build on the success of previous years.

The Gregory River Landcare Group (GRLG) Annual General Meeting was held on the 28th April and saw some changes to the executive committee. Megan Munchenberg will remain as President, whilst Tony Loechte was nominated and accepted as the new Vice President.

The group thank outgoing Vice President Sheldon Brown for his continued support. Larissa Lauder was voted in as the new Secretary and will be taking over from Mark Van Ryt.

The group thank Mark for his ongoing and dedicated efforts on behalf of the Landcare group since the groups' incorporation. Jo Start retains her firm grip on the Landcare groups' finances as Treasurer.

2015 will be a busy year for the group as they will be targeting key weed infestations, supporting landholders in erosion control, providing Tourist Camping Packs, and revamping the school-based healthy food gardens.

Weed Control

In 2014 funding was successfully applied for to target isolated weed infestations on the upper reaches of the Gregory River.

These are often the source of the weed spread downstream and are located in a priority area for the Australian Government. Unfortunately, the dry conditions have prevented burning the largest infestation which cannot be effectively controlled by other means.

Several other key infestations have been chemically treated and Charles Curry has also spent hours pulling Bellyache Bush by hand. This project is supported by Southern Gulf Catchments Limited through funding from the Australian Government and GRLG acknowledge our other project partners including Paraway Pastoral Company and Lawn Hill Riversleigh Pastoral Holding Company.

The group would also like to thank the Carpentaria Land Council Aboriginal Corporation for their support in preparing and planning the initial burn site at the Carl Creek Crossing and we look forward to working with them again on this planned burn when the conditions permit.

Weed contractors have recently completed chemical treatment of infestations along the Gregory River and adjacent to the Gregory Downs Outstation and the Gregory Township.

Weeds targeted include Rubber Vine, Bellyache Bush, Calotrope, Parkinsonia, Neem trees and Parthenium weed. They also completed large scale treatment of a Rubber Vine infestation within Lawn Hill Creek located on Lawn Hill Station.

All works undertaken by the contractors were strategically planned to build on previous years' work and to ensure all weed treatment areas would complement any future or previous treatment undertaken by the pastoral landholders, GRLG and the Carpentaria Land Council's Biddungu Waanyi Rangers.

Erosion Control

Funding was obtained through the Australian Government's Regional Landcare Facilitator Program to support Lawn Hill Riversleigh Pastoral Holding Company to commence works to stop erosion of a large gully head which was threatening to join two major creek systems.

This gully poses significant threats to the nationally listed wetlands in the immediate area and also creates major pastoral management complications.

Tourist Camping Packs

With a number of project partners, Tourist Camping Packs are being developed to provide travellers to the region with information, tools and encouragement to reduce their impacts on the natural environment.

The packs are primarily aimed at reducing impacts associated with inappropriate rubbish disposal including:

- toilet activities which leave toilet paper and human waste exposed
- dumping of portaloos
- dumping of general rubbish at camping sites and road sides
- washing of vehicles, and
- disposal of cigarette butts

Pack contents will be a range of rubbish bags and utensils for physical collection and disposal of rubbish as well as information on recommended methods and disposal locations.

The packs will also contain information on how travellers can reduce their risks of spreading weeds in the region and any other relevant information. These packs are a work in progress and the group hope to have a first run of 500 bags ready for distribution in late June.

Thanks to our funding partners Regional Landcare Facilitator Program, Southern Gulf Catchments, Queensland Water and Landcarers, Queensland's Keep QLD Beautiful campaign and Burke Shire Council for their support in running this pilot project.



Other Activities

The Gregory River Landcare Group have also been active away from home trying to promote the work being done in the region and gaining knowledge from others to bring back.

Megan Munchenberg and another member will be attending the REEF, RANGE and RED DUST conference in late August and will be presenting about what the group is doing in the region. This is an opportunity to showcase what GRLG has achieved since its inception and to further promote the Natural Resource Management issues within our region.

The group have also nominated to host the Queensland Regional Landcare Facilitator forum which will bring representatives from all of the Natural Resource Management groups in Queensland as well as having a representative from the Australian Government come to the region. Additionally, Tony Loechte was sponsored by the group to attend the Australian Rangelands Society Conference in Alice Springs in April. Over the four days discussions and presentations were presented from across the northern and central regions of Australia.

Tony said, "It was good to see what other people are doing and being able to learn from other peoples successes and mistakes. I took most interest in the fire, weeds and feral presentation and I was really happy to see that

the Burke Shire Council is already trialing a moth which is thought to control Parkinsonia. "

Larissa Lauder also attended the conference as a representative of Southern Gulf Catchments and said "For me the key messages reinforced what we are already doing and also gave an indication in what areas we could get stronger in. We repeatedly heard that small nudges make big differences so yes, we should keep chipping away at the weeds and other projects."

"Also, partnerships are essential in a world where funding is harder and harder to get and the Landcare group is already doing this well. But the single core theme that inspires me at the moment is that effective land management relies on two things that cannot be separated - knowledge and values - and that both of these are intrinsically linked to people."

"There is a real disconnect between the general public of Australia and the reality of the outback and what it takes to keep the land healthy. I believe the Gregory River Landcare Group is in a position where we could effectively target this through the region's tourism."
