

Message from the Mayor

The Local Government elections were held in mid-March. I congratulate and thank Paul Poole, Tonya Murray, John Clarke and John 'JY' Yanner for their commitment to serving the community. At the post- election meeting, Cr Poole was elected Deputy Mayor for a second term.

In advance I also thank their families for, indirectly, they also become involved in that commitment – supporting them and taking on extra roles to allow them to attend meetings and travel away. I also thank the other candidates – Kelly Gardner, Kenny Booth, Annie Clarke, Rosita Wade – for their willingness to put their names forward to represent the community.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank Crs Forshaw, Duff and Lauder for their service to Council and community in the previous term.

The Wet delivered a mixed result this year. There was enough rain to give some much needed relief for our rural residents but rainfalls were down on average and many of our pastoralists still face challenges on parts of their properties as a result. Mustering has started on properties where rain has not delivered enough and cattle are on the move. There has also been an impact on the end of my, and many others' fishing lines. Perhaps the recurring years of drier wets have affected the fish population. It was not just the volume of rain but the way it fell that has also created issues. The week of wet weather in late March, sadly, forced the Fishing Competition to be cancelled. It also delayed road inspections and the subsequent opening of roads.

I know the delayed opening of roads has caused much consternation to residents, travellers and local businesses. As a business owner myself, I understand the impact delays and road closures can have. However as a Councillor, I also understand the responsibilities Council assumes for public safety and welfare and the implications when road users make choices that get them into difficulties and ultimately require others, often members of the public, to adopt risk in order to assist. It also is an expensive exercise, for emergency management, police, health services to assist and/or retrieve those in difficulty.

There have been too many accidents already this year; most of which have occurred on closed roads. Accordingly, Council is reluctant to open roads prematurely and accept liability for accidents caused by inexperienced or over-ambitious drivers. There seem to be more of these on the roads each year and a general failure to appreciate the performance levels of 'very remote' roads. The fact that DTMR was recently able to claim a Fatality Free Easter for the first time in many years is a testament to tighter controls being exercised over road openings and closures. We do offer a local permitting system to allow essential services and businesses that need to used closed roads to travel in Burke Shire.

Coming up, we have ANZAC Day, Saddles and Paddles Races and Canoe Race at Gregory, Flamenco Fire performance at the Nijinda Durlga in May and, by the time this is in your mailbox, His Excellency the Honourable Paul de Jersey AC, Governor of Queensland and Mrs Kaye de Jersey will have visited our Shire. I hope to catch up with you at some or all of these events over the next couple of months.

Drive Past a Restricted Road Permit

Local roads - Any person wishing to travel on Shire Roads past a restricted point (road closed sign) must apply for a permit to council. Restricted road use permits will be approved at Council's discretion based on reasonable needs of the community and the individual. Such reasons may include the provision and delivery of food, emergency services, emergency trade services and compassionate grounds. Permit travel is restricted to daylight hours on the day of the requested date.

State roads – Permission to travel past a restricted point of state roads must be approved by the Department of Traffic and Main Roads. The two State controlled roads in the Shire are the Wills Developmental Road and the Gregory to Camooweal Road. Despite efforts to signpost affected roads, there is still a significant amount of traffic travelling without permits past restricted points. Variable message boards have now been placed on the Doomadgee East and Gregory – Lawn Hill Roads to remind people of potential road closures and to contact the Burke Shire Council for the most up to date information.

National Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements Gulf Tropical Low – March 2016

The tropical low that impacted the Shire prior to Easter has been declared as a disaster event by the Queensland Reconstruction Authority. This will allow the Shire to make claims for the restoration of public assets (primarily roads) from damage caused by rain and flood. The works will be completed in two parts, firstly emergent works (works undertaken to ensure the safety of drivers and to re-establish connectivity of the road network) and finally, restorative works (to bring roads back to condition prior to the event). Emergency works will commence from the 11th of April. Although all efforts are made to ensure that road connectivity is re-established after any weather event, the Burke Shire Council is conscious of the safety of all road users and will keep roads closed to firstly protect all drivers (particularly visitors to the Shire) and secondly to protect road assets from further damage.

Suspicious Dog Deaths

There have been four dogs reported to have died in suspicious circumstances over the past week. If you observe that your dog is behaving unusually or erratically, please contact the Ranger or Works Manager immediately. Council continues to work with North West Vets to investigate the cause of dog deaths. Please keep your dogs in your yard or restrained at all times.

Roaming Dogs

Over the last month, Council has received a growing number of complaints about roaming dogs in Burketown. These dogs have in some cases shown aggression towards both people and animals. If a dog displays aggressive or menacing behaviour it can be declared as either a dangerous or menacing dog in line with the Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008. Once a dog has been declared it must be restrained in accordance with the act or controlled by the owner at all times if removed from its enclosure. Council supports responsible dog ownership and will continue to work towards ensuring the safety of the community by controlling aggressive and menacing dog behaviour.

Local Government Elections

Post-Election Council Meeting

Burke Shire was among the first Councils in Queensland to get back to work following the 30 March 2016 Declaration of the Election Results, holding the post-election Council meeting at the earliest opportunity on 4 April 2016. Thank you to Madison Marshall and Shannon Moren for all their hard work in preparing for the day, it was very much appreciated by all who attended! Thank you also to Doug Jones for leading the prayer at the commencement of the meeting. Council is required to do two things at the post-election Council meeting. The first is to appoint the Deputy Mayor; the second is to confirm the Council meeting schedule for the remainder of the year. The latter is usually uneventful, the former is always of considerable interest! As mentioned in the Mayoral spiel, Paul Poole was appointed to the position of Deputy Mayor.

Doomadgee to Burketown Fibre Link Project

Residents will see a range of work being conducted over the coming months as various Telstra crews head to the region to complete upgrades to the Burketown Telecommunications Tower, the Burketown Exchange and, of course, to lay the fibre optic cable between Doomadgee and Burketown. Council and Telstra will also be arranging for representatives from Telstra Retail and the Telstra Business Centre to come to Burketown to discuss how best to take advantage of the high-internet speeds and associated services that will be available once Burke is connected to the fibre optic. Updates to follow.

CEO Recruitment

The recruitment process for Burke Shire's next CEO is well underway, with Council shortlisting five candidates for the position on Thursday 7 April 2016. Interviews with shortlisted candidates took place in Cairns on 17 April 2016 with a recommendation for appointment to be made at the Council meeting on 21 April 2016.

Due to a revision of the budget, the plant replacement program has been finalised for this financial year.

Mosquitoes & You: Don't Get Bugged! Tammy Baptie

Some mosquitoes found in and around your house can cause diseases such as Ross River Virus, Barmah Forest Virus and possibly Dengue Fever. Did you know mosquitoes can also give your dog heart worm?

Mosquitoes can breed in shallow water-filled containers or objects such as buckets, pot plant bases, palm fronds, bird baths and old tyres. By simply cleaning up water holding items or emptying out containers in and around your house and yard weekly, you can help stop mosquitoes from breeding.

Other ways to reduce your risk include using insect repellent, ensure your house is screened, use mosquito zappers or coils and wear long sleeved light coloured clothing.

Biological control of Parkinsonia - establishing UU and UU2

CSIRO, with the help from Burke Shire Council, have been releasing the latest biological control agent for Parkinsonia around Burketown as part of a national mass-rearing and release project.

Eueupithecia cisplatensis, nicknamed 'UU', and the closely related *Eueupithecia* sp.2, nicknamed 'UU2', are geometrid moths originating from Argentina, part of the native range of Parkinsonia. Host-specificity testing of the moths was carried out in CSIRO's quarantine facility in Brisbane and permission for their release was granted in 2012 and late 2014 respectively. UU2 was first released in the Burketown area in November 2014. Over 25,000 larvae, which feed on the leaves of the plant, have now been released in the area.

A recent survey conducted by Andrew White, CSIRO, and Russell Cunningham, Burke Shire Council, recovered impressive numbers at the release sites outside Burketown. Biological control agents typically take many years to establish and build up populations to the level required to inflict detectable damage to the target population. The potential success of introducing these new agents into Australia for the long term control of Parkinsonia is dependent upon establishing self-sustaining populations in key areas in Qld, NT, and WA.

Australian Small Business Advisory (ASBAS) Conference

Gillian Teague and Annie Cork from Gulf Savannah Development (GSD) recently attended an Australian Small Business Advisory (ASBAS) Conference which was held in Parliament House, Canberra.

They had the opportunity to meet the Minister for Small Business and Assistant Treasurer, the Hon. Kelly O'Dwyer. As well, they met with AusIndustry and Treasury personnel and networked with other ASBAS service providers.



Gillian did a presentation at the conference on how GSD runs their ASBAS Program, which was very well received. GSD felt honoured because they were one of only four service providers chosen from across Australia to give a presentation. This demonstrates that their method of delivering the program works well, produces tangible outcomes, and is respected at Federal Government level.

Under the current ASBAS 'Business Solutions' Programme, GSD delivers small business advisory services to nine shires. The panel has 11 members, mostly consisting of expert business advisors who have been involved with GSD's small business programmes for many years. 

Century enters Care and Maintenance

After 16 years of mine life, Century Mine at Lawn Hill ended production in December 2015, with the last shipments of concentrate from Karumba in January this year.

Century's infrastructure at Lawn Hill and Karumba is now in Care and Maintenance. Key infrastructure will be kept operationally ready in the event that a future option such as tailings retreatment becomes feasible. The ongoing limited number of employees remaining onsite reflects the rehabilitation and care and maintenance priorities at Century.

The end of Century's operational life also means the conclusion of the community sponsorship program and MMG's flights in the Lower Gulf. Community members can continue to

Located at Lawn Hill, Century Mine at Lawn Hill was Australia's largest zinc mine while it operated between 1999 and 2015. MMG Ltd bought Century Mine, along with other Oz Minerals assets, in 2009.

Zinc and lead were mined and processed at Century, with the product piped as slurry along a 304km pipeline to a de-watering and shipping facility at Karumba. Product was then shipped to smelters in Australia, Asia and Europe. Century is now in a rehabilitation phase, which will be followed by a Caring for Country phase until the lease is relinquished to the Queensland Government in approximately 2046.

Over the life of the mine, over 1000 people connected to the Lower Gulf were employed at Century. For a significant number of those people, Century provided their first experience of mainstream employment.
