

RANGER'S REVIEW



Use of SODIUM FLUOROACETATE (1080) to Control wild dogs and feral pigs in the Burke Shire

Burke Shire Council like all Local Government authorities are responsible under the *Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002* to ensure that a responsible and effective Pest Management plan is in place to target priorities for pest management of declared pests identified within the shire. Land owners also have an obligation under the Act to take reasonable steps to keep land free of declared pests unless the owners hold declared pest permits allowing the pests to be kept on their land ie Deer farming. As part of Councils activities in the management of declared pests together with local pastoral property owners/managers, under take coordinated 1080 baiting campaigns twice a year to control Wild dogs and Feral pigs in the Burke Shire, these campaigns are also coordinated with baiting in neighboring shires to get a more consistent coverage and to maximize baiting results. Baits are injected at three central baiting points within the shire.

Properties that have participated in the baiting program will have warning signs posted at all points of entry to their property.

Background

Sodium fluoroacetate (1080) is a very useful pesticide for the control pest animals and has been used throughout Australia since the early 1960s. 1080 is the most efficient, humane and species-specific pesticide currently available for declared animal control in Australia. In Queensland, 1080 is registered for use in the control of wild dogs, feral pigs, foxes and rabbits.

Properties

Some of the properties of 1080 include:

Fluoroacetate occurs naturally in about 35 species of Australian plants, such as *Acacia georginae* (gidgee). 1080 is water soluble and is readily broken down by naturally occurring bacteria and fungi. It therefore does not cause a build-up of toxic residues in soil, water or plants, nor does it bioaccumulate in organisms. Fluoroacetate can be found in minute quantities in such common substances as guar gum and tea.

Availability of 1080

1080 can only be supplied and used by accredited DNR&M and Local Government Officers for the purpose of controlling declared pest animals and **cannot be sold direct to the public,** to be accredited these officers have to undertake practical and written examinations and received approval from the Queensland Department of Health. It is required that all 1080 operators must be retrained every two years.

Guidelines for use

The use of 1080 is subject to strict regulatory control set down in the health (drugs and poisons) regulations 1996 which are administered by the Queensland Department of Health. The following is a summary of the guidelines for its use:

Baits are to be used for no other purpose whatsoever other than for the destruction of wild dogs, feral pigs, foxes and rabbits. All baits must be distributed only on the property baiting and Burke Shire stipulates that no baits are to be laid within ten kilometers of Burketown and Gregory. No baits to be laid within 50 metres of a centre line of a declared road.

At least 3 days notice of the intended laying of baits must be served by landholders on every resident and/or occupier of the land adjoining or having frontage to the holding, road or reserve whereon the poisoned baits are to be laid.

Warning signs are supplied to the landholder and must be placed at all points of entry to the property

and adjoining thoroughfares. This must be done even if the adjoining property is carrying out 1080 baiting.

Warning signs must be erected and left in place for a minimum of one month.

1 ml of 10mg/litre strength of 1080 is injected into a 250g meat bait for wild dogs/ dingoes (in densely populated areas of the east 1 ml of 6 mg/litre mix is used and for foxes it is 1 ml of 3 mg/litre).

2 ml of 36 mg/litre strength of 1080 is injected into a 500g meat bait for pigs :- Note!! Meat baits for pigs are a larger size to prevent cartage by crows/ hawks of these stronger 1080 baits.

Public notices are distributed by the Burke Shire Council in advance of each baiting campaign.

Wild game harvesters should also be notified of baits being laid, as they are required to declare for at least 28 days after the program that they have not removed feral pigs from areas where baiting has occurred. Strict monitoring and control of usage and usage rates is carried out by officers of the DNR&M

Selectivity of 1080

There is considerable variation in susceptibility between species of animals. Dogs and foxes are the most susceptible of all animals to 1080. In general, birds show considerably more resistance than mammals. Cold blooded animals such as reptiles and fish are the most resistant. There is no set time for 1080 baits to become inactive in terms of toxicity. It depends on the following factors:-

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- . What type of bait material is used?
- . Where the bait material has been placed
- . How much rainfall has fallen after baiting has occurred

Lethal doses of 1080

Lethal dose of 1080: Man (LD50 = 2-5 mg/kg body weight). Maximum dose rate for Dingo/Wild dog is 8 mls per 1 kg (10mg/ml). Therefore: 100kg person would have to eat more than 2 kg of raw bait material

Common myths about 1080

"1080 kills only domestic dogs, it doesn't kill wild dogs"

All canines (wild dogs, domestic dogs and foxes) are equally susceptible to 1080 poison. This is why it is important that domestic dogs are restrained when baiting programs are being carried out.

"Does 1080 build up in the soil and in waterways?"

Naturally occurring bacteria and fungi found in the soil, water and bait materials readily break down 1080. It therefore does not cause a build-up of toxic residues in soil, water or plants, 1080's persistence in the environment depends on rainfall, temperature and amount of bacteria present.

"What if a pest animal is poisoned with 1080 and another animal eats it? Will it affect the second animal?"

This depends on the dose used for the first animal, the tolerance of the second animal, the amount the animal has consumed, what part of the animal is consumed (the stomach contents will contain more 1080 than other organs or flesh), and how long the dead animal has had 1080 in it's system. Unlike some poisons, 1080 does not accumulate in the food chain nor does it keep on killing "the dog that eats the bird that ate the carcass of the pig that took the bait".

"There is no effective treatment or antidote for 1080 poisoning for humans"

Fact: There is no specific antidote for 1080, just as there is no specific antidote for alcohol poisoning or valium overdosing, but a range of treatments aid recovery. As with many poisons, these treatments are effective only when used soon after ingesting the poison. Emptying the stomach can get rid of most of the poison in the early stages. Sedatives and barbiturates, as well as life support measures, have also been used to give the body time to detoxify the 1080.

We trust this gives you a better insight into the usage of this important vertebrate pest control measure. Further information can be obtained from the Burke Shire Council Ranger.

Morning Glory Park Development

Lawns are looking good and help make the town look cool, neat and tidy. More landscaping has taken place with the planting of the footpath garden beds.

Work arranged to be completed:-

- ⇒ Mural on Park toilet block exterior walls designed and to be painted by Burketown school children materials have arrived and project is ready to proceed.
- ⇒ Upgrade park lighting. Includes changing 5 current park lights to 250watt watchman lights and install a further 3 along Sloman Street to adequately illuminate the park at night.
- ⇒ Replace BBQ shelter light fittings and install timer on lights so they don't stay on all night annoying residents.
- ⇒ Pond feature all equipment arrived, now need to coordinate installation.
- ⇒ Designing / planning is currently being undertaken on the kids park water feature.

Improvements to public areas

The 6 metre 6 sided Gazebo has arrived as part of the upgrade of the Burketown Cemetery; now waiting for installation. It will house 4 bench seats and include signage depicting history, a plan of the site, grave details/cemetery register. With graves dating back to 1866 this fixture will help put in perspective the recent history of our town.





Once again thank you for the welcome and I am looking forward to meeting you all in the near future.




Pest fish threaten Queenslands Gulf waterways.

Tilapia are a major threat to north Qld native fish populations and have the potential to significantly impact on our commercial and recreational fisheries. People need to remember that if "tilapia become established in a flowing river system they are impossible to eradicate. Several ways local communities could help stop the spread of tilapia -

- 1) Know what tilapia look like and report any sightings to the DPI&F on 132523.
- 2) Don't use tilapia as bait, dead or alive—tilapia can release eggs from their mouth even after they are killed.
- 3) Don't move tilapia between waterways.
- 4) If you catch tilapia, kill as humanely as possible and dispose of it away from the water.
